

Laloo Yadav to lead goodwill mission to Assam

India's RJD chief Laloo Prasad Yadav will lead a goodwill mission of parliamentarians to Assam shortly. This follows last week's anti-Assamese violence in Bihar.

"Bihar has had extremely cordial relations not only with Assam but also with other states of the region," he said. "I will take a delegation of MPs to ease tension between the two old friends."

Though Laloo had not chalked out the itinerary, he confirmed his visit to Assam Chief Minister Tarun Gogoi on Monday. Laloo also assured adequate security to all passengers from the Northeast during their train journey through Bihar.

Laloo has already acceded to the Assam government's request for a CBI probe. Assam had sought either a CBI probe or a judicial inquiry into the incidents "in view of the hurt sentiments of the Assamese".

US redoubling efforts to find Laden

Two years after President Bush said Osama bin Laden was wanted dead or alive, America's new Afghan envoy said on Tuesday the United States is redoubling efforts to find him and other leaders of both al Qaeda and the Taliban.

The new US ambassador, Zalmay Khalilzad, an Afghan-born diplomat who is to be sworn in on Monday and depart for Kabul on Tuesday, said more help is needed from Afghan citizens particularly along border regions of Pakistan that the elusive bin Laden and top aides might be crossing into.

"We're going to redouble our efforts," Khalilzad told a group of reporters. With new funding for Afghanistan approved by Congress, the United States plans to "take the fight to the Taliban extremists and to go after the al Qaeda leadership," he said.

The Arabic television station Al Jazeera a month ago broadcast two audio tapes purportedly from bin Laden that vowed more suicide attacks inside and outside the United States and warning that all countries backing Washington over Iraq were targets.

Palestinian policeman arrested over killing of Israeli soldiers

The Palestinian Authority has arrested a Palestinian policeman accused of carrying out a shooting attack in the West Bank on Tuesday which left two Israeli soldiers dead, a Palestinian security source said.

Jibril al-Akhras, who was originally from Gaza, was arrested overnight in the Bethlehem area, the source told AFP on Wednesday.

"He has admitted carrying out the attack," the source added.

The two soldiers were killed early Tuesday after a single gunman opened fire with a Kalashnikov assault rifle at a major military barrier along the so-called "tunnel road" which links Jerusalem to the southern West Bank.

The gunman approached the barrier carrying a prayer mat in which he had concealed his weapon, Israeli military sources said. After shooting the pair, he then fled by foot but the Israelis believe he then jumped into a waiting car.

Turkey names synagogue bombers

The two assailants who detonated car bombs outside Istanbul synagogues, killing themselves and 23 others, have been identified as two Turkish men in their 20s who might have been linked to the al-Qaeda network, the city's governor said on Wednesday.

Police established that the two suicide bombers who detonated huge bombs while driving past the Neve Shalom and Beth Israel synagogues during Sabbath prayers on Saturday were respectively Gokhan Elatuntas, 22, and Mesut Cabut, 29. Governor Muammer Guler told a televised press conference.

"Taking into account the target, the way the attacks were perpetrated and the contacts of the assailants, we assess that the attacks parallel terrorist acts across the world claimed by al-Qaeda. Security force continue to work on this," he said.

The governor said both bombers were from the mainly Kurdish southeastern city of Bingol, where underground Islamist groups have been active in the past several years.

13 Biharis killed in Assam violence

Army deployed as mobs go on rampage

Indian army troops patrolled parts of the northeastern state of Assam on Wednesday after eight people were killed as rampaging mobs burned the homes of hundreds of settlers from the eastern state of Bihar.

Several local organisations, among them a key separatist guerrilla group, gave migrants from neighboring Bihar a deadline of seven days within which to leave Assam, as a dispute triggered by competition for jobs flared into violence.

"You can say many parts of Assam are on fire," said a senior police officer who declined to be identified.

Four women and two children belonging to one family were hacked to death and their home set alight in the town of Dibrugarh, about 250 km (155 miles) from Guwahati, a key city in the oil- and tea-rich state of Assam, a police spokesman said. About 10-15 persons, armed with

knives, stormed into the house of Uma Kant Tewari, a small businessman, at Kheronipathar under Tingkhong police station and hacked to death his wife, two minor daughters, a son, a niece, and a nephew, police said.

The assailants set the house on fire before escaping, police said, adding, Tewari managed to escape unharmed.

Thousands of people sought shelter in police stations across Assam, which is also torn by a 25-year-old insurgency, as crowds targeted Biharis, setting fire to their homes built of wood and roofed with tin.

Reports were also pouring in about clusters of huts belonging to Biharis in different parts of the state being torched, their shops looted, physically assaulted and petty amounts of money extorted from them.

In the busy commercial town of Tinsukia, a large group of angry Biharis people pelted stones on the students of Senairam Higher Secondary School on Tuesday leading to a clash between the mob and the students.

In neighbouring Tinsukia district, two bodies of Hindi speaking people were recovered from Tinsukia town while another was killed at Makum when miscreants set ablaze a liquor bottling plant on Tuesday.

In another incident on Tuesday night, two armed ULFA militants came on a motor-cycle to a highway dhaba at Baxirhat under lower Assam's Dhubri district and opened indiscriminate fire on truck drivers killing four Bihar truck drivers and injuring seven.

Iran offers political aid to Iraqi Governing Council

Iran has offered Iraq a package of political and security assistance, after a landmark visit here by top members of the Iraqi Governing Council that also yielded a trade pact set to boost Iranian economic clout in its US-occupied neighbour.

Iranian state media said Iran's Interior Minister Abdolvahed Mussavari had offered top Kurdish leader Jalal Talabani, the current chair of the US-appointed Iraqi body, assistance in matters ranging from border security to drafting a new constitution.

"Since we have organised 23 elections we are ready to share our experiences in the framework of drafting a constitution, setting up an assembly and setting up polling stations," he added.

The reports did not say if Talabani, who also heads the powerful Patriotic Union of Kurdistan (PUK) and has at times enjoyed close ties with Iran but is now seen as being close to the United

States, gave any detailed response to the each of the offers.

But the BBC said on its website Talabani had told it Iran had agreed to help fight "terrorism" in Iraq, and had accepted that the current wave of attacks against US-led forces was not resistance to occupation but "the work of indiscriminate killers."

Iraq's interim Foreign Minister, Hoshyar Zebari, said Iran had agreed to help tighten control along the long border between the two countries and try to prevent infiltration, according to the BBC.

During the Iraqi visit, Iranian President Mohammad Khatami for the first time Monday expressly recognised the US-backed interim Governing Council after meeting with Talabani, the spokesman said.

Nepal to seek India's help against Maoists

Nepal's Prime Minister Surya Bahadur Thapa will visit India next week to seek further military assistance to combat a Maoist insurgency, officials and sources said yesterday.

He will also visit Sri Lanka and Bhutan in his capacity as the outgoing chairman of the South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation (SAARC), officials said.

"Prime Minister Thapa will be seeking India's cooperation in controlling the Maoists crossing over to Nepal from India as well as transportation of arms and ammunition," a foreign ministry source said.

"Nepal is seeking more military assistance for combating the Maoist rebels," the source added.

India is Nepal's main military supplier and recently supplied two bullet-proof helicopters to help the

battle against the guerrillas. The Maoist rebels have been fighting for a communist republic in Nepal since 1996 during which more than 8,200 people have been killed.

There has been a surge in violence since the rebels pulled out of a seven-month ceasefire and peace talks on August 27.

Thapa will also discuss with Vajpayee expanding Nepalese exports to its huge neighbour and further Indian economic assistance to develop Nepal's hydropower.

India recently agreed to build a billion dollar hydropower project in western Nepal.

Thapa will also hold meetings on proposed resolutions to be approved by the SAARC summit in Islamabad in early January, particularly on economic cooperation, the control of terrorism and drug trafficking.

Chandrika criticised in parliament

There was uproar among her supporters as he accused her of abusing power.


Although parliament reopened on Wednesday, there is no sign of a resolution of the country's constitutional crisis.

1 killed, six injured in battle near Kashmir army HQ

A policeman was killed and six security force members injured in a fierce gunbattle between Indian troops and Islamic militants near the army headquarters in Indian Kashmir, police said Wednesday.

The policeman was killed and three of his colleagues injured when rebels opened fire and hurled grenades Tuesday evening at a police base near the army headquarters in the summer capital Srinagar.

Reporter exposes lax in Palace security

An undercover reporter has exposed flaws in royal security by gaining a job as a footman at Buckingham Palace by using a false reference.

The Daily Mirror said Ryan Parry worked for two months at the Palace despite unprecedent security for the visit of US President George Bush.

Mr Parry, who had access to private suites, claims he could have assassinated the Queen or Mr Bush.

Buckingham Palace said it was conducting a full investigation.

Scotland Yard has put in place a £5m operation which will see more than 5,000 police on the capital's streets for the state visit, while hundreds of armed US security staff will also guard the president.

The Daily Mirror story includes pictures by photographer Phil Harris from inside the palace of the bedroom used by Mr Bush and his wife, The Belgian Suite.

There are also pictures of the Queen's breakfast table and the Duke of York's room.

Mr Parry wrote: "Had I been a terrorist intent on assassinating the Queen or American president George Bush, I could have done so with absolute ease."

"Indeed, this morning I would have been serving breakfast to key members of his government, including National Security Adviser Condoleezza Rice and

US Secretary of State Colin Powell.

"Such is the shocking incompetence at the heart of the biggest security operation ever in Britain."

In August, Mr Parry responded to a job advertisement on a recruitment page of the Buckingham Palace official website.

On his CV, he left out any mention of his journalistic career and included one fake reference and a real one, the newspaper claimed.

Mirror editor Piers Morgan said the paper used "very basic subterfuge and got incredible access".

"To our surprise and then mounting horror we discovered that our man with no training, no experience at all, no real vetting was in very close proximity to the most important people in our country," Mr Morgan told BBC Radio 4's Today programme.

He described the reference checking as "scandalous" and "shoddy".

Mr Morgan alleged that someone from the palace rang Mr Parry's local pub where he had given a name as a character reference.

Mr Morgan said they had decided to pull Mr Parry out of the palace once the president arrived as "we did not want to genuinely compromise any ongoing security issues that might arise while the president is here."

Iraq 90 percent normalised, says Bremer

Koizumi re-elected as PM

Prime Minister Junichiro Koizumi was re-elected yesterday at the start of a brief parliamentary session as Japan grappled with the touchy question of when to send non-combat troops to help rebuild Iraq.

Koizumi's second term became a certainty after his ruling coalition won a stable, although reduced, majority in a November 9 election for parliament's Lower House.

Topping his agenda is the question of when to dispatch troops to Iraq, whose worsening security situation has prompted Tokyo to back-pedal on a plan to send an advance team.

Tokyo had been expected to commit about 150 non-combat troops to Iraq before the end of the year but the plan was put on hold after an attack last week in southern Iraq killed 18 Italians.
