

No to traffic help centres for fear of 'misuse'

The plan of Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP) to construct traffic help centers (THC) in the city's eighteen different points may not see light because of fear of misuse, says officials of the Dhaka City Corporation (DCC).

But DMP Commissioner Ashraful Huda believed that implementing the THC proposal is possible under the DCC's on-going Dhaka Urban Primary Health Care Project.

"Be it scorching heat or torrential rain, the traffic police stand on the roadside throughout the year to perform their duty. We haven't yet provided their basic needs including toilet facilities and shelters, which are very important during six-hourly shifts of the policemen. That's why the THC is a must," said Huda talk-

ing to Star City

"Toilets and shelters are basic needs for on-duty traffic policemen without a doubt, but the illreputation of the police department has made things complicated. Many think that they will misuse the shelter homes," said a top official of DCC who is in the committee that is reviewing the proposal.

Huda however assured that his department would take strong action against the violators if they receive any complaints after the shelter homes have been con-

structed. More than 2200 traffic policemen are working at different parts of the city. They do not have any toilet facilities or shelter from inclement weather

The DMP last month placed the THC proposal in the monthly meet-

ing of Dhaka Transport Coordination Board (DTCB). Mayor of Dhaka Sadeque Hossain Khoka, who is also the president of the DTCB, said at the meeting that the proposal would be reviewed.

The proposed points to establish THCs were Manik Mia avenue, Farmgate, Mirpur-10, Bijoy Sarani, Natun Bazar, Shahbagh, Kakrail, Motijheel, Russell Square, Fulbaria, Tanti Bazar, Mohakhali, Jahangir Gate, Abdullahpur, Progati Sarani, Khilgoan and New market.

Dispute among different gov-ernment regarding ownership of land where the THCs will be constructed is another deterrent for the proposal.

"Problems with the allotment of land is another major problem in implementation of the proposal," a DCC official said

Around 1000 delegates from about 200 organisations in Bangladesh are expected to join the six-day Fourth World Social Forum (WSF) in Mumbai, India scheduled to begin More than two lakh delegates from across the world are likely to attend the 4th World Social Forum in Mumbai aimed at 'a different world order'.

Cars, microbuses and other vehicles are parked haphazardly in front of offices and kitchen markets at Kawran Bazaar, the busiest commercial hub next to Motijheel, during office hours everyday. But there is no traffic arrangements in the area, lamented an official.

Hundreds have already left for Mumbai en route Kolkata on Monday. The delegates include NGO workers, trade unionists, health campaigners, representatives of farm workers and indigenous people.
