Seaman in retirement land

Arsenal manager Arsene Wenger paid tribute to England goalkeeper David Seaman after the Highbury great announced his retirement

from football on Tuesday. Seaman, 40, decided to quit after suffering a recurrence of his longstanding shoulder injury while playing for Manchester City in their 4-2 defeat away to Premiership rivals Portsmouth on Saturday.

Wenger, who oversaw the second half of Seaman's 13-year stint at Arsenal before letting him leave on a free transfer to City in June, said: "I feel personally a big loss. It was a fantastic career.

"But I think it came to the point where he (Seaman) realised if he were to go on, he'd damage his health," the Frenchman told Sky Sports.

"I would personally like to thank him for what he has done for English football. He was not just a great keeper he had a great attitude.

Seaman retired on the day City signed current England number one keeper David James from West Ham, a deal encouraged by Seaman.

In a statement issued on the City website Seaman, who won the last of his 75 caps against Macedonia in October 2002, said:

have reached this difficult decision after much discussion with my family and those in the game whose views I respect. 'It has become clear to me that

this type of injury will not quickly disappear and I think now would be a good time to hang up my boots, rather than at the end of the season as planned.'

James will make his debut for struggling City against Blackburn nome on Saturday. Meanwhile Seaman, who made

City appearances, said: "I elieve I have had a fantastic career playing at the highest level.

"I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those people who have stood by me and supported my career, especially during the tough times, the players who I will miss for their professionalism and friendship and the fans who have inspired my enthusiasm for the game.

City manager Kevin Keegan England coach for part of Seaman's international career said: "This has been a difficult decision for David but I fully respect it. "It says a lot about the man that

he has been incredibly helpful to

us as a club in finding a successor at such a testing personal time for him. "His record is incredible and

his achievements unbelievable but most importantly I will remember him as an ultimate professional who cared about others," Keegan, whose side are hovering above the relegation zone after failing to win in their last 14 matches, added.

In his last international against Macedonia. Seaman was criticised for the corner Artim Sakiri curled straight into the net during the 2-2 Euro 2004 qualifying draw at Southampton's St Mary's Stadium.

It was one of a series of highprofile errors in recent seasons which obscured an otherwise impressive career that saw him win league, FA Cup and European Cup Winners Cup medals at Arsenal.

In the Gunners' victorious FA Cup campaign last season Seaman made important saves in both the semi-final against Sheffield United and the final against Southampton.

But for many fans their abiding mage of the pony-tailed keeper is likely to be the sight of him left stranded by Ronaldinho's 40metre lob as Brazil beat England 2-1 in the 2002 World Cup quarterfinals in Japan.

A hero after all

Britain's press Wednesday saluted David Seaman after the former England goalkeeper announced his retirement from all football but there was widespread agreement that he had played on too long.

Seaman, 40, quit Tuesday after suffering a recurrence of his long-standing shoulder injury just 12 minutes into Manchester City's 4-2 Premiership defeat away to Portsmouthlastweekend.

"For David Seaman these last six months have unfortunately proved an undistinguished curtain call to a previously distinguished career," said the tabloid Daily Express.

It argued that Seaman, Arsenal solkeeper for 13 years, should have stayed at Highbury as goalkeeping coach rather than left on a free trans-fer in June to have one final season with Ćity.

The Daily Telegraph, recalled the merits of the mustachioed and pony-tailed Seaman, saying that "for many years, his command of the penalty area and ability to reduce the target for oncoming attackers set Seaman apart as an outstanding keeper."

Even so, he did concede some amazing goals.

Topping the list, because it hap pened at the 2002 World Cup, was the near 40-yard free-kick from

Ronaldinho that sailed over Seaman's head and gave eventual champions Brazil victory in a 2-1 quarter-finalwininJapan.

Under the headline 'Forget The Gaffes. Remember The Genius," the tabloid Daily Mirror said: "I wonder if he wishes he had called it quits at the end of last season when he captained Arsenal to victory in the FA Cup final.

In that match, against Southampton, Seaman made a vital save just

he had done in the semi-final to deny Sheffield United.

Meanwhile broadsheet The Times said that his habit of signing autographs 'Safe Hands', a nickname that became popular during the 1996 European Championships in England where Seaman excelled in helping the hosts into the semifinals, was "never a good idea for a goalie"

But it added: "He wasn't one of those goalies who made 14 impossible saves and then let one through his legs. With Seaman you got competence at the highest possible



Senegal's magical ride at the 2002 World Cup means the country's foreign legion of stars will command around 70,000 dollars each should they win the African Nations Cup for the first time.

With a budget for the champi-onship of around three million dollars, the country's football chiefs are determined to give their players, quarter-finalists at the last World Cup and with a famous win against holders France to boast of. as many incentives as possible.

But national coach Guy Stephan, who succeeded World Cup hero Bruno Metsu, is determined to keep his players' feet on the ground.

"Everyone in Europe has the impression that Senegal is a strong football country but this is not true," said Stephan.

"The country has around 10 million people. The pool of players of a high level is not unlimited here and in 23 Nations Cup tourna-ments, Senegal has played in just nine of them with a final appearance in 2002 and a semi-final in

Stephan's caution is understandable - 2002 was a benchmark

year for Senegal, their performance at the World Cup matching the previous best for an African side when Cameroon reached the last

Hotel workers threaten strike

Portuguese hotel workers have threatened to go on strike during the Euro 2004 football finals unless their demands for higher wages are met.

"If employers do not start showing a more serious attitude at the negotiating table, we will develop ways to fight for our demands, including a strike which could take place during Euro 2004," a spokes-man for their FESAHT union, Joaquim Pires, told the Lusa news agency

The union is demanding pay rises of five percent as well as a gradual reduction in the work week to 35 hours from the current 40.

Pires said the pay rise demand was reasonable if the huge rise in prices for hotel rooms during the championship is taken into account.

Last week Portugal's hotel association AHP said prices for rooms during the three-week football finals, which begin on June 12, had risen by an average of 25 percent.

Up to three million people are expected to travel to Portugal this year because of Euro 2004, the largest sporting event ever held in the country.

Fulham deny

Fulham have denied claims by Louis Saha that the French striker will sign for Manchester United after a 9.8 million pound (18 million dollar) deal had been agreed.

"There has been no fresh bid, so no bid has been accepted and the player does not have permission to hold talks," a Fulham spokesman told the BBC Sport website.

Fulham rejected an 8 million pound (14.7 million dollar) offer ast week

But Saha told the Daily Mail: "I am very happy now that we are about to complete the deal."

Fulham manager Chris Coleman had even been linked with a move for Celtic's John Hartson as a potential replacement.

Saha, who hopes a move will attract the attention of the France coach Jacques Santini, said: "I have wanted to go to United for a month and now I must prove I can play in the team there.

"This is a big step up in my career and I know that I will have to show that I'm good enough."

Coleman and Fulham owner Mohamed al Fayed have insisted they would not be forced into selling the forward who has inspired Fulham to the brink of a Champions League place this season

"You just get that feeling that we're being bullied into selling one of our players, but I don't like bullies and I don't like to be bullied so that's why we're so determined to hang on to Louis Saha,' said Coleman

Saha, who joined Fulham from Metz for 2.1 million pounds (3.8 million dollars) three years ago, scored his 15th goal of the season when he converted a penalty in the 2-1 win over Everton on Saturday.

Metz would earn one million pounds (1.8 million dollars) from Saha's transfer to Old Trafford under a sell-on clause in the deal that saw him come to London.

"Ronaldo made the trip without the permission of the club and the appropriate sanction was applied," Valdano told Telemadrid Radio.

Kahn won't be a game!

An appeals court ruled Tuesday in favor of Germany goalkeeper Oliver Kahn in his bid to prevent his name and image from being used in a U.S. company's computer game without his permission.

Hamburg's highest state court upheld a similar verdict by a lower court against Electronic Arts, the maker of the computer game, which is based in Redwood City, California.

Kahn's lawyer, Matthias Prinz, told reporters the ruling could open the way for Kahn and other players whose names and images were used to sole damages. to seek damages.

However, a lawyer for the com-pany, Volker Meinberg, said he planned to take the case to a federal court.

Meinberg said the company had obtained a license from the interna-tional players' union for its FIFA 2002 game and argued that it was within legally guaranteed artistic freedom. freedom

The Hamburg court ruled, how-ever, that Kahn's personal rights had been violated.
