Australian cricket authorities appealed to the public Friday for help in catching thieves who stole a batch of prized autographed cricket

The 43 stolen bats were signed by Australian and international sides from matches dating back a decade, including the 1999 World Cup won by Australia, Cricket Australia said. Cricket Australia chief executive

James Sutherland said the theft of the bats from a Melbourne storage facility was discovered in August and police had failed to track down

Sumathipala remanded

A Colombo magistrate Friday remanded Sri Lanka's cricket chief and head of the main telecommunications company after formally charging him with breaking immigration laws, a court official said. Thilanga Sumathipala was

ordered to be remanded in custody for 10 more days pending further police investigations, the official Sumathipala appeared before

the court on Friday, 11 days after he was remanded following allegations that he helped a criminal travel abroad on a forged passport.

The magistrate refused him bail and fixed the next hearing for early next month. Sumathipala is the president of

Sri Lanka Cricket, the governing body of the sport as well as chairman of Sri Lanka Telecom, the main carrier partly owned and fully managed by NTT of Japan.

Sumathipala had been accused of aiding and abetting Dhammika Amarasinghe, a man implicated in nore than 28 murder cases and with previous convictions, to obtain a forged passport and travel to London to see a cricket match.

It boomerangs on Abbas

A Pakistani judge reprided a man Saturday for seekin, order to stop national cricket hero Wasim Aktam from coaching Indian bowlers, and issued him a hefty fine.

"Wasim has been a national hero and a legend and unnecessary inconvenience and harassment has been caused to him and the case is dismissed," civil judge Anwar Gondal said in his judgement against Syed Najmul Abbas. Gondal fined Abbas 15,000

rupees (250 dollars). Abbas filed his case in September last year after media reports that Wasim was coaching Indian bowlers and was to sign a deal to formalise

this arrangement.

Abbas wanted Wasim stopped, while the cricketer denied he was passing his skills on to rival India. The storm of controversy over the



issue subsided when the Indian cricket board hired former Australian pacer Bruce Reid as their bowling coach in November last year.

Wasim, who retired from international cricket in May last year with a world record 502 one-day and 414 Test wickets, is a television commentator in Australia where India have wrapped up a Test series and are playing a tri-nation tournament with Australia and Zimbabwe.

Pakistan's coach Javed Miandad reignited the controversy last week when he said he hoped Wasim had not given Indian batsmen tips about playing reverse swing, for which Pakistani bowlers are famous.

The Pakistani media have also questioned Wasim's loyalty to Pakistan and involvement with Indian players ahead of a much-SEE PAGE 14 COL 5

Top of the world and seemingly untouchable, Roger Federer is a redhot favourite to slay Russian goliath Marat Safin in the final of the Australian Open on Sunday.

After becoming the first Swiss man to reach number one, second seed Federer will be anxious that his ascent to the top of the world rank-ings does not fall flat against a resurgent Safin.

The Wimbledon champion pulverised third seed Juan Carlos Ferrero 6-4, 6-1, 6-4 after convincing wins against Lleyton Hewitt and nemesis David Nalbandian.

However, Federer knows the danger posed by Safin. Now ranked 86th after an injuryplagued 2003, Safin won five-set

battles against top seed Andy Roddick and defending champion Andre Agassi to reach his second Melbourne final. "Marat has definitely got the

game to win these tournaments," said Federer, who is playing his first

Swedish coach Peter Lundgren. "Marat's a nice guy... and it's good to see him back. We're all happy. But we're scared at the same time." Former world number one Safin,

Australia will face the full might of India's batting line-up in their oneday cricket match here on Sunday, but it is the bowlers that have standin skipper Adam Gilchrist just as

Gilchrist, who will fill-in for rested captain Ricky Ponting, said there was no magical formula for handling what was rapidly becom-ing the world's most formidable battingline-up.

"It's been an issue all year, they've played so well," he said ahead of the triangular VB Series

match at the Western Australian Cricket Association Ground.

"I'm not going to say we've come out with a secret plan that we're

certain is going to do the job.

"But we've continued to assess it and got our thoughts together about what way we want to try and execute our plans this time and we'll see how it comes out."

Gilchrist said India's tour of Australia had also unveiled the strength of its previously underrated bowling attack.

"What they've done on this tour is prove that they've got some quality bowlers," he said '(Anil) Kumble has come into his

own on this tour where previously he hasn't done well overseas or certainly in Australia. '(Ashish) Nehra, (Irfan) Pathan ...

Ajit (Agarkar) have bowled wonderfully well all tour. Their bowling line-up has certainly proven that they've got a

bit more fight than what's been

shown before. They have been

successful against everyone."

India have included fit-again batting maestros Sachin Tendulkar and Virender Sehwag in their squad, which already boasts the talents of VVS Laxman, Rahul Dravid and Yuvraj Singh.

Gilchrist said there was no easy way to counter such a potent line-up but trial and error had taught the Australians they needed to be con-

"It's about the execution, not so much the end result whether Laxman gets another hundred or Dravid keeps getting runs or Tendulkar or any number of those guys," he said.

Pakistan want to play matches in the contentious venues of Karachi and Peshawar in the series against India.

South Africa and New Zealand refused to play there last year because of security fears but the Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) saysit is safe.

"We should not deprive millions of cricket-starved people of these two big cities from watching exciting cricket," said PCB chairman Shaharyar Khan.

The respective boards have yet to finalise a schedule for the series It is due to take place in March

and April and will be India's first Test tour to Pakistan for 14 years. Shaharyar met Indian ambassa dor Shiv Shankar Menon for talks on

"It is a positive sign that cricket is being revived and both the boards are working to sort out the details," the Press Trust of India quoted

Menon as saying. "Cricket can add to the peace process both countries have initiated, and as a keen follower of the game I keep my fingers crossed for exciting cricket.

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
