The five-member mission was formed during last Commonwealth Summit in Abuja, Nigeria, to help resume the stalled WTO talks.

During their visits to Europe and Asia, the mission will hold separate meetings with their counterparts.

They will also hold talks with secretary general of World Trade Organisation (WTO) and the commerce affairs/commissioner of European Union (EU).

DCC, Jica preparing master plan for waste management

The master plan for proper management of increasing volume of solid wastes in the city is nearing completion, said DCC Chief Conservancy Officer Sohel Faruque.

Dhaka City Corporation (DCC)

with the help of Japan International Cooperation Agency (Jica) has been preparing the master plan.

The master plan for 15 years would take into consideration all aspects of waste management such as collection, local dumping, sorting, recycling and final dumping, the conservancy official said.

With the growth of the metropolis. volume of kitchen wastes would

increase manifold within a few years. Without a master plan, waste management would become extremely difficult.

On the basis of the master plan that is likely to be completed within a year, the DCC would start running several pilot projects at different wards of the city.

At present, the city dwellers generate more than 4,000 metric tons of wastes every day. With its present resources, the DCC is able to clear only about 40 percent of the wastes.

Large amount of carbon dioxide at Mutwail dumping site

A Dutch team has recently discovered a large amount of carbon dioxide at Mutwail dumping site in the city, which can be used to produce enough methane gas to run a 'small power plant'.

The Dutch experts who conducted a study on the dumping site said the gas could be used for generating electricity. They came to

Dhaka in May last year to explore possibilities of recycling wastes.

"We have cleared the project and are now waiting for an investor to come forward," said Sohel Faruque, chief conservancy officer of Dhaka City Corporation (DCC).

Bulk of the 4,000 metric tons of biodegradable wastes produced in the city has been dumped over a large area at Mutwail daily since independence.
