### More arson in Natore

## Over 100 BNP musclemen torch 15 more houses, 12 shops in wake of Gama killing

Over 100 arsonists allegedly led by a deputy minister's relatives and BNP activists looted and torched 15 more houses and 12 shops at the Awami League-dominated Shahpara and Amtali Bazar in the village yesterday morning, creating a reign of terror in the area.

People of Shahpara were living in insecurity since February 7 when BNP activists torched some 16 houses in retaliation for the murder SEE PAGE 11 COL 1

## Angry traders threaten to stop paying taxes

Trade bodies warned yesterday of stopping tax payments if the slide in law and order continued, while traders of three Mirpur wards kept shops closed and took out a procession demanding arrest and trial of killers of a local entrepreneur.

Unidentified gunmen shot dead Anwar Hossain Babul, 40, treasurer of Mirpur Benarasi Tanti Samity and a contractor, on Zoo Road in Rainkhola at around 7:30pm Monday.

The same day in the afternoon assailants killed travel agent Mostafa Kamal, 35, at his Kazi Nazrul Islam Avenue office over a denial to pay tolls.

#### Dhaka confirms death of 3 Bangladeshis in Riyadh

Dhaka on Monday confirmed the death of three Bangladeshi expatriates near Riyadh last week in a brush fire by their employer's son who is also a member of Saudi royal family.

According to a Saudi source, the yet to be named killer and a member of the royal family of Ameer Abdullah Bin Fahad sprayed bullets on Kamal Hossain, brothers Abdur Rashid and Sirajul Islam, all from Alokpur village under Brahmanbaria Sadar upazila.

Three other foreign workers from India, Pakistan and Sudan also died in the shootout at an agricultural farm house, some 100 km off the Saudi capital, the source added.

However, the motive behind the killing could not be known immediately.

To conceal the gruesome murders, the killer also tried to set fire on the bodies after pouring petrol on the dead, according to information provided by Bangladesh embassy in Riyadh.

### Six to die for killing cop

A speedy trial court yesterday awarded death penalty to six people and life imprisonment to four on charge of killing a police officer in the capital in 2001. The convicts with death penalty

are M Maksudur Rahman alias Saikat, 30, Nazrul Islam alias Naju, Rezaul Islam Iqbal alias Rezaul, 28, Azizul Islam alias Aziz, 26, Sukkur Ali alias Rana and Mujibur Rahman alias Rifle Mujib, 32.

Tribunal judge Shahed Nooruddin also fined them Tk 50,000 each.

#### BNP MPs decry fertiliser price hike



## Team goes to Yangon next week for survey

A team of engineers will go to Myanmar next week to survey an area to construct a 30-kilometre long highway directly linking Dhaka to Yangon

to Yangon.

The team will conduct a comprehensive survey to assess the cost and requirement for the highway from Guandung in Bangladesh to Buchidongin Myanmar.

The highway will be built as part of the Asian Highway traffic network among 38 Asian nations linking them to Europe via Turkey, according to sources.

The Bangladesh team will submit a project proposal after the survey and the construction will start once the government approves the proposal, said a high official.

He said according to preliminary assessment Bangladesh will have to spend at least Tk 15 crore on build SEE PAGE 11 COL 7

# NGOs blast govt for regulatory step

#### ADAB, FNB call it unconstitutional, inappropriate

Non-governmental organisations (NGOs) irrespective of their relations with the government yesterday took a swipe at the ruling coalition for its move to amend an NGO regulatory ordinance.

They described the Foreign Donations (Voluntary Activities) Regulation (Amendment)
Ordinance, 2004 as unconstitutional
and inappropriate for private voluntary agencies.
The Federation of NGOs in

Bangladesh (FNB) and the Association of Development Agencies in Bangladesh (ADAB), two apex bodies of development organisations, said the government took

the move to tighten its grip on the NGOs and dubbed the proposed bill as a blueprint to harm them.

The bill intended to modify the 1978 ordinance is nowlying with the parliament secretariat and will be placed in parliament next week, sources said.

The FNB and ADAB say the move

# 50 killed as bomb rips thru' Iraq cop station

A massive car bomb yesterday ripped through a police station south of Baghdad killing about 50 people, in the latest deadly attack on Iraqis seen as collaborators with US occupation forces.

The attack came after US officials said an Islamic militant with links to Osama bin Laden's al-Qaeda network was plotting to ignite a civil war in Iraq to undermine efforts to hand over power to Iraqis.

"There are around 50 martyrs, 30 of whom have been identified, and dozens wounded," Dr Tahsin Ahmad told the news agency at the hospital in Iskandariya, 25 miles south of Baghdad.

The hospital's director, Razak Jannabi, said: "Thirty dead have been brought here, I believe that number is rising. I believe it's at 49."

A reporter said he had counted at least 20 bodies outside the building. Inside the hospital, staff frantically tried to mop up pools of blood with soap and water.

"It was a car (bomb) that was parked outside the station," said policeman Sadeq Khodeir. "It SEE PAGE 11 COL 7


## Asia faces four challenges
