

## Book fair draws huge crowd despite hartal

The Amar Ekushey Book Fair drew a huge crowd on the sixth day yesterday despite countrywide dawn-to-dusk hartal.

Although there were fewer crowds in the afternoon, the book lovers flocked to the Bangla Academy premises, the fair venue, in large numbers after the break.

However, fewer new books came to the shelves at different stalls yesterday. The organisers said they brought fewer books to the fair fearing that hartal might hamper their business.

Forty-four new books were put on display yesterday. Publishers said they would showcase more new books today as they expected a rise in the sale.

The selling of children's books were at the top yesterday.

Less gathering was seen at the Writer's Chattar in the evening as popular writers were absent.

A large number of Dhaka University's residential students made up the bulk of the visitors as the university was closed due to hartal.

The demand for books by Dr Humayun Azad, Humayun Ahmed and Dr Muhammad Zafar Iqbal was higher, the organisers said.

Majority of the female students asked for books by Humayun Ahmed, they added.

There was also a great demand for 'Bangladesh: Paribartan Rekhachitra' by FBCCI President

Abdul Awal Mintu and 'Dharmabubhutir Upakatha O Onyanya' by Dr Humayun Azad.

'Sakaley Uthiya Am Mone Mone Boli' by Amirul Islam, 'Bhoot' by Ahsan Habib, and 'Pakh-Pakhalir Chhara' by Ali Imam were also sold in a large number.

The Annya Publications published four books while the Laboni Publication, the Sahitto Bilash, the Jagriti Publication published three new books each.

The Agami Publication, Bangladesh Press Institute, the Ahmad Publishing House, the Hasi Publication published two new books each.

At the Little Magazine Chattar, Saidur Rahman Bayati unveiled the cover of a new book titled 'Mangol Sandhya Series 2004'. New writers have contributed to this series.

A discussion on 'Centennial tributes: Practising of science and culture of Kazi Motaher Hossain' was held at the fair venue, followed by a cultural programme.

Shahida Rafique was the key speaker. Presided over by Muhammad Ibrahim, the discussion was addressed by Moyukh Chowdhury, Nashid Kamal and Syed Ziaul Haque.

The book fair will remain open from 2:00pm to 8:00pm daily and from 11:00am to 8:00pm on weekends, Bangla Academy sources said.

On February 21, the fair will remain open from 8:00am to 9:00pm.

Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) yesterday refuted the allegation that it was dismantling billboards in the capital city in violation of court order.

The Outdoor Advertising Owners Association levelled the allegation at the DCC at a press conference on Tuesday, the DCC said in a statement.

Rather, some advertisement firms are putting up billboards despite the status quo imposed on the DCC and the firms, it said.

On the one hand, such practice was sullying the beauty of the city and creating hindrance to traffic management, and on the other, the corporation was being deprived of huge revenue, the DCC said.

the shortage possible time as well as the judges are constitutionally obligated to ensure justice accordingly," he said while he was addressing the inaugural function of a two-week training course for the assistant judges here.

The Judicial Administration Training Institute (JATI) organised the training at its auditorium.

Acting Director General of JATI Azizul Haque presided over the function participated by 30 assistant judges.

The law minister said the dignity of judiciary depends upon the judges and lawyers. If they fail to perform their duty the litigants will suffer and ultimately image of the whole judicial system will be affected, he added.

He said it takes year to settle a case in the court of law, and consequently the people get frustrated on judiciary.

The minister said to end such delays, Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) system has been introduced by amending the civil procedure code (CPC) for quick settlement of the disputes.

He said the aim of introducing new laws and amending old laws is to save litigant's money, time and to restore their confidence in the judicial system.

Moudud said the government has a strong political will to end

harassment of the litigants and sincerity of judges and lawyers is necessary to make the ADR system and other new laws effective.

### Programme to rehabilitate acid victims

The government has taken steps for implementation of the rehabilitation programme for acid-burn women and disabled persons up to the upazila level.

Tk 25 crore were allocated for implementation of the programme in the current fiscal, Social Welfare Ministry sources said.

The sources said the government has taken up the project to make the acid-burn and disabled helpless persons self-dependent by providing them soft-term and interest-free loans.

The government has also taken steps to implement a three-year project at an estimated cost of Tk five crore for the welfare of burn victims.

Acid and chemical-burn victims will get treatment, rehabilitation, financial and technical facilities from the project.
