Khaleda warns AL

"Resist the trouble-mongers," she asked people in a speech to a public rally at Chhatak High School

Sounding the warning to the AL, she said: "You will face stringent action if you damage public property," adding, "Law enforcers were asked to treat the chaos-mongers

Politics on coercive course over hartal

Politics takes a coercive course as the government and the Awami League (AL) flex their muscle over

Prime Minister Khaleda Zia at a Sylhet rally yesterday said police would go tough on pickets, a warning echoed by Home Minister Altaf Hossain Choudhury in parliament the same afternoon.

Deputy Leader of the Opposition Abdul Hamid at a press briefing yesterday warned that they would go for more hartals if their activists were attacked during today's hartal. The AL plans to gradually inten-

sify hartal, from 12 hours today to 24 hours and then to 48 hours. Simultaneous actions to barricade rail tracks and roads have only heightened people's fear of disruption of normal life.

The AL has got support from a number of left-leaning and pro-gressing parties in its antigovernment action including the Gono Forum, the Communist Party

of Bangladesh and Workers Party.
As politics has rolled onto the roads, parliament virtually lacks any

opposition members except two lawmakers Anwar Hossain Manju of the Jatiya Party (Manju) and Kader Siddiqui of Bangladesh Krishak Sramik Janata League.

The AL has been trying to woo the two members out of parliament into their movement fold. AL President Sheikh Hasina contacted Manju and tried to convince him, sources in her party said. The party also reached Kader Siddiqui through Gano

Organisers ask AL to call off hartal, govt for security

A four-day conference on microfinancing in Asia, set to explore programmes to provide 100 million ultra-poor with microloan, begins in Dhaka today in a downbeat mood because of a hartal.

Organisers of the Asia Pacific Region Microcredit Summit at the Sheraton Hotel yesterday expressed disappointment over the general strike, called by the Awami Jubo League for today in the wake of police action against demonstrators in earlier strikes by the main opposition Awami League (AL).

Bina, her old rickshaw, and microloan

As microfinance champions rally behind their cause at today's conference, troublesome questions will eat away at their enthusiasm. Is this the most effective tool to fight poverty? What else should be in place? Are the ultrapoor getting the benefit?

In the villages far from 1,400 delegates meeting in Dhaka, they are more than mere academic questions. They wonder why the poor are not loaned enough to start a business that could raise them out of poverty, while those who are already well off get generous

Bina Rani, 28, wanted a Tk 7,000 loan from Brac, an NGO with about four million households getting its cradle-to-grave services, for a new rickshaw for her husband. But the Gorma villager in Netrokona, Barhatta union, could

only get Tk 3,000 -- enough for a used rick-

"It is an old thing and needs repairs now and then," says Bina. "Before this, my husband used to rent a rickshaw for Tk 20 a day. Now, we have to repay Tk 85 in weekly install ment and about Tk 10 on repair every day. This has hardly improved our life.

"New rickshaws need no repair for at least seven to eight months. We could have seen some real income then.

Microcreditis a useful tool to fight poverty says Shafiqul Islam, head of Asa, one of the Top Four NGOs, with an outreach of 2.3 million borrowers. "But it alone is not enough. It has to be supported by a number of critical things such as health service and improved lawand order.'

Tk 47 lakh gold seized at ZIA

However, the ruling coalition leader BNP thinks AL's forming an alliance with the smaller parties ahead of the general elections may not hit the ruling alliance as the smaller political parties do not have a vote bank as such. Still, the BNP bigwigs believe a

street movement by a united opposition may damage the government image and are desperate to resist any move to float an alliance with the Awami League, the sources Several BNP policymakers are in

constant contact with the leaders of Left-leaning political parties like Workers Party, Communist Party of Bangladesh, Bangladesher Samajtantrik Daland Gono Forum. They are also in touch with the

top leaders and parliament members of deposed president HM Ershad-led Jatiya Party.

Several top leaders and minis-

ters, who had once pursued Left politics, have continued contact at personal level with the heads and policymakers of the Left parties, BNP insiders said.


Similar talks are also on with other smaller rightwing political parties and BNP leaders, who had once belonged to the Right.

Meanwhile, efforts are underway to further split the Ershad-led Jatiya Party, BNP sources said. They said there are two camps within the JP -one pro-BNP and the other pro-AL. Discussions aimed to keep the JP away from the AL have taken place at different levels of the party, they

The home ministry has instructed the intelligence agencies to review the files on all pending cases against Ershad and the secret agencies have mounted watch on the deposed president.



Ban on hydraulic horns, bar on loud speakers likely

The Ministry of Forest and Environment has drafted an amendment to the Noise Pollution Control Act 2004 that will bar or restrict the use of hydraulic horns, mikes, loud speakers, brick grinding machines, generators and other loud machin-

The use of microphones and sirens for religious purposes like calls for prayers and predawn meals during Ramadan, state functions and during emergencies will be outside the purview of the law.

Environment minister Shajahan Siraj disclosed the decision at a press conference yesterday.

alternative to hartal. The country's apex body of businessmen will submit a set of recommendations to the ruling as well as the opposition political parties this week, advising them to sit together and start a dialogue on how to overcome the present politi-

"We have discussed the issue at our extended emergency board meeting today and decided to recommend the opposition political parties alternatives to hartal and to seek their support in stopping violence," FBCCI First Vice President Kamaluddin Ahmed told reporters after the meeting.

The FBCCI in conjunction with other business leaders will submit its recommendations to the general secretary of ruling Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP) so that the government takes an initiative to SEE PAGE 11 COL 7


