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Free anti-graft body bill passed after change

Govt approval not needed to prosecute public servants

The Jatiya Sangsad last night passed the much-talked-about Anticorruption Commission Bill, 2004, in an amended form, making way for institution of an independent body to fight graft.

A last-minute amendment to the bill took the yet-to-be-formed independent anti-corruption commission out of government control unlike its predecessor the Bureau of Anti-corruption (Bac).

Now, the commission would not require government approval beforehand to launch a probe and prosecute a public servant for graft

charges.
The House passed the bill, introduced on July 10 last year, amid a continuous parliament boycott by the main opposition Awami League and the second largest opposition, Jatiya Party (Ershad). The lone opposition lawmaker present at the time -- Kader Siddiqui of Bangladesh Krishak Sramik Janata League -- walked out in protest at

said Kader after staging the walkout at 8:45pm, barely half an hour before

The House rejected several other amendments brought by Kader and independent lawmaker MM Shahin. It also turned down by voice vote Kader's proposal for sending the bill to the search committee and eliciting public opinions on it.

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TIB slams

The anti-corruption commission bill does not reflect people's demand for a free and neutral commission, Transparency International, Bangladesh (TIB) said hours before the bill was passed in parliament with a last-minute amendment yesterday.

"We are disappointed at the bill that we fear will not let the commission work freely and neutrally as the nation expected. So we are not accepting it," TIB Chairman Professor Khan Sarwar Murshid said at a press conference at the corruption watchdog's office in Gulshan.

Fertiliser factory gas leak kills 100 cattle

CUFL releases waste into pipelines

Nearly 100 cattle, mostly buffaloes, died from toxic gas poisoning following a leakage at Chittagong Urea Fertiliser Limited (CUFL) at Barasat Union in Anwara Upazila on Monday noon.

Sources said the animals died between 12.00 and 3.00pm Monday after drinking poisonous water of a canal directly linked to the CUFL pipelines to release industrial waste.

The CUFL authorities used to pump out industrial waste through

the pipelines that end in the canal,

"The authorities generally take precautions such as warning the neighbourhoods on the loud speaker to prevent environmental hazards or casualties before releasing the industrial waste but this time they ignored the precaution," alleged Barasat UP Chairman Mohammad Hasan Chowdhury while talking to The Daily Star on

the phone yesterday afternoon. "As a result, the canal water had developed concentration of ammonia gas and became toxic soon and

the animals died after drinking the water," he said. At least 40 families were affected by the incident, he

A CUFL official on condition of anonymity denied any negligence and claimed the incident as a mere accident. "One of the underground pipelines through which we release industrial waste leaked suddenly and the canal water might have become a little bit poisonous due to this mixing," he reckoned.

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Ten 'robbers' lynched in Fatikchhari

The boys of Australian coach Richard McInnes relied on the raw pace of Shahadat Hossain and the international experience of left-arm spinner Enamul Haque (Jr) to shoot Scotland out for 95 in 30.2 overs. Nafees Iqbal and Naeem Islam

Nuke rivals agree on Kashmir talks

Nuclear-armed rivals India and Pakistan yesterday reached a broad agreement on the timetable for sustained peace talks on disputed Kashmir and other tough issues separating the South Asian neighbors, diplomats from both sides

Pakistan's foreign ministry said "a broad understanding was reached for the modalities and timeframe" of future talks. The agreement will be formalised today during a final meeting between the two nations' foreign secretaries.

Neither side would reveal the specifics of the timetable, but diplomats close to the talks said technical level discussions about a bus service in divided Kashmir and another bus and train route from Pakistan's Sindh province would take place next month. With Indian elections scheduled for April, no major breakthroughs were expected from the peace process anytime soon. However, Indian Prime Minister Atal Bihari Vajpayee was expected to win the vote and continue the dialogue.

The three-day talks are expected to establish eight groups to settle issues that have festered for a half century and led to three wars, and almost caused a fourth in 2002 before international mediation averted the conflict.

with Pakistani Foreign Secretary Riaz Khokhar yesterday and reviewed the progress made in the talks so far.

The two delegations then drove to Murree, a hill resort 30 miles northeast of Islamabad, the Pakistani capital, for luncheon talks, where the agreement was reached. Future talks will focus on

Kashmir, confidence-building measures in the nuclear field, terrorism and drugs, economic cooperation and a river dispute. The agenda for resolving decades of enmity was first agreed to in 1997 but failed to make any headway.

Even before the timetable agreement, there was optimism about a

"newmomentum" in their talks. "There is realization in India and Pakistan that war is not an option, that you have to look at ways to find a peaceful resolution of the outstanding disputes between the two countries," Pakistani spokesman Masood Khan said Monday after a meeting between Foreign Ministry officials of the two countries.

Vajpayee and Pakistani President Gen. Pervez Musharraf agreed to resume the dialogue last month. A July 2001 summit in Agra, India, failed to make any progress.

The talks represent the first real test of flexibility on longentrenched positions, such as the disputed Kashmir region -- the cause of two of the countries' three
