Economy can't afford Banglapaedia CD launched hartal: US Senator

UNB, Dhaka

Visiting US Senator Richard J Durbin has found that the best thing for Bangladesh would be no more strike (hartal).

In an exclusive interview with the UNB yesterday, he said all the people suffer because of strike. "Your economy is affected due to strike that you cannot afford," he said.

"I was fortunate enough that there was no strike call during my stay in Dhaka. But I feel and understand the strike is very painful for you," said Durbin who came here to join the micro-credit summit.

"I heard both the parties have been doing this," he said without specifically mentioning that BNP had also enforced strikes while in opposition

The Senator, elected from Democrat Party, smilingly men-tioned that there is no hartal in the United States and said there were President Bush and the Democrats, but they waited for the election.

Asked whether election is the only option for the opposition, he said: Election is the end of the process that goes through educating people why the change is needed.

"If your ideas are stronger, your candidate is good; you will win the election," he added.

Asked to comment on the main opposition's boycott of parliament. he said: "I'm not an expert on Bangladesh... People will not vote for me if they don't see me in the Sen-

ate. I'll not get paid too." He continued: "For you, the parliament should be the centre of discussing all matters and opposing the government's unacceptable policies and moves."

Durbin was impressed by NGO activities in Bangladesh. "It's a great programme being carried out by NGOs, including BRAC and Grameen Bank in micro-credit, health, education and other sec-tors." tors.'
