20 AL workers in Bhola injured by BNP men

Administration says attack on Hasina's motorcade stray incident

At least 20 people were injured in incidents of violence in Bhola in the wake of Thursday's attack on the motorcade of Awami League (AL) President Sheikh Hasina in Barisal, local AL leaders said yesterday.

Hasina was on the last leg of her three-day tour of Barisal and Bhola when alleged BNP (Bangladesh Nationalist Party) activists damaged a vehicle at the tail of the motorcade at Charkawa ferry ghat.

In Daulat Khan, alleged BNP cadres injured at least eight AL activists Thursday night. Four of the injured, including critically wounded Anwar with broken limbs, were rushed to Bhola Hospital.

The same night, 12 others were injured after alleged BNP cadres attacked the Bhola AL office in the town at about 7:15pm. They hurled bombs and looted valuables after breaking into the office, sources said.

The attackers set all furniture on fire after dragging them out on the office premises. Locals extinguished the fire and police recovered two fresh bombs from near the spot.

The Bhola AL held a press conference yesterday morning and blamed ruling party activists for the violence and plunder. President of district AL Mofazzel Hossain Shahin, Secretary Fazlul Kader Majnu Molla and Member Abdul Momin Tulu spoke at the press briefing.

The AL leaders said they would lodge court cases within a day or two against the terrorist activities of ruling party cadres.

Police are patrolling the town where tension is running high, sources said. Mallick Fakrul Islam, Bholia superintendent of police (SP), said the situation is under control.

Sheikh Hasina left Barisal for

Beyond the years of neglect

Kanchan's hands do not show the hazards of his father's profession -- no rough and calloused hands from years of cleaning sewers and sweeping the streets of Tangail. The hands hold pens and pencils instead. His eyes beam the hope of a community's dream for respectable and comfortable standards of living.

Kanchan like many children of the 127 families that comprise the minority communities of the Horion, Rabidas and Chauhan in Horjonpoli in Tangail sees his dreams come true, as he attends

the Ideal Primary School.

The school was established in 1997 as a place where the socio-economically disadvantaged children from the locality could receive free education. With 185 students from playgroup to class 5 enrolled, it is attended by children largely from the three castes of the locality alongside disadvantaged children from adjacent areas.

The idea to set up the school was born when social workers ventured into the forgotten community and found the children's circumstances reflected a widespread problem faced by impoverished children across Bangladesh

-- the children were taken to assist their parents at work not only because the parents earned a meagre Tk 700 a month, but because the parents did not value school education.

Especially for the community, attempts to participate in society, culture or politics were limited because of the stigma attached to them due to their profession and because the community was Hindu and largely spoke Hindi.

"Society neglected us because we were mere sweepers and we couldn't present ourselves because we could neither write

POVERTY-FREE SOUTH ASIA BY 2010

'Better governance, steps to root out corruption preconditions'

The Independent South Asian Commission on Poverty Alleviation (Isacpa) has set a target to halve poverty by 2010 in the region and urged the political leadership to take effective steps to improve governance and law and order and fight corruption.

"A poverty-free South Asia is not an impossible dream," according to the executive summary of a com-

mission report discussed at a semi-

nar at Brac Centre yesterday. "Such a dream has already found roots in millions of hearts in the villages and in the towns, in the fields and in the factories, in offices and in homes across ... South Asia."

The South Asia Centre for Policy Studies (Saceps) and the Centre for Policy Dialogue (CPD), a civil society think-tank, co-organised the discussion with economists, experts and other civil society members of

South Asia to highlight the commission's target five years ahead of the United Nations Millennium Development Goal to halve poverty by 2015.

Prime Minister's Principal Secretary Kamal Uddin Siddiqui, speaking as the chief guest, said the commission identified problems facing governance, transparency and accountability as common obstacles to cutting poverty.

Devise software, interfaces to computerise Bangla

Experts at seminar urge

Speakers at a seminar yesterday underscored the need for developing effective interfaces and software for computer processing of Bangla to enable about 250 million Bangla-speaking people use their mother tongue in computation and computerised communications.

The experts also called for extensive research to solve a multitude of problems related to Bangla compound alphabets and coding in Bangla font as well as to develop suitable keyboard arrangement, method for sorting and searching of Bangla characters and Bangla

software.

School of Communication of Independent University, Bangladesh (IUB) organised the event on the occasion of International Mother Language Day on its Baridhara campus, attended by academicians and experts in computer and information and communication technology.

At the inaugural session of the national seminar, M Abdul Mottalib, head of Department of Computer Science and Information Technology, Islamic University of Technology (IUT), presented the keynote paper, titled "A Review on Computer-Based Bangla

CCCI urges PM for 3rd Karnaphuli bridge

Chittagong Chamber of Commerce and Industry (CCCI) in a letter to Prime Minister Khaleda Zia yesterday asked for construction of a bridge over the Karnaphuli river.

In a fax message, the CCCI also put forward the Dutch and Swedish governments' proposal for setting up the bridge over the river for consideration.

The letter signed by CCCI President Amir Humayun Mahmud Chowdhury said as the other two bridges -- about century-old Kalurghat and Shah Amanat -- of the district require repair works and are not sufficient for communications with rest of the country, the region needs a third one.

The CCCI had information that the Dutch and Swedish governments approved grant and soft loan for the construction of the bridge that is likely to bring down financial involvement of Bangladesh to only 10.5 percent, the letter said.

Kashmir CM escapes grenade attack

Jammu and Kashmir Chief Minister Mufti Mohammad Sayeed yesterday escaped a bid on his life as terrorists fired two rifle grenades at his rally in Beerwah, killing one person and injuring two others, official sources said.

The grenades landed about 300 metres away from the venue of the rally which was also attended by some of Sayeed's cabinet colleagues, the sources said.

Three persons, two women and a CRPF jawan, were wounded in the blasts. The woman later succumbed to her injuries, they added.

The Chief Minister was immediately whisked away by security personnel. A few minutes later he, however, returned to complete his address.

30 killed as train, truck collide in West Bengal

An Indian passenger train collided yesterday with a vehicle travelling to a wedding in India's West Bengal state, killing 30 people, a railways spokesman said.

"Thirty people have died," spokesman M.Y. Siddiqui said. "A marriage procession was travelling in a truck. The main casualties are in the truck."

The Kanchenjunga Express hit the vehicle at an unmanned railway crossing near New Jalpaiguri, 600 km north of the state capital Kolkata.

Railway officials said the train engine was damaged in the smash but that casualties in the train had still to be determined.

The train was travelling between the West Bengal towns of Sealdah and New Jalpaiguri when the accident happened, the official said.
