Most of the injured workers have become disabled. Poor safety system, use of old method in cutting giant ships and the lack of precau-tionary measures are responsible for the explosions, said the speakers at a conference in the port city

The Young Power in Social Action (YPSA), a non-government organisation, arranged the confer-

Although the government has been earning a revenue of Tk around 700 crore a year from the ship-breaking industry, it pays no attention to it, the speakers said.

The ship-breaking industry also supplies 60 percent of the total demand for iron in the country.

The YPSA has taken up a project, funded by the Manusher Jonno, a donor organisation, to make recommendations on the develop-ment of the ship-breaking industry.

The speakers said around 1.5 lakh families are directly involved in this industry, but the yards are unhygienic and dangerous, causing damage to the environment.

The YPSA conducted a preliminary survey that identified 54 prob-lems of the workers such as threat of accident, lack of precautionary tools and safety system, drinking water crisis and wage disparity.

Chief Executive of YPSA Arifur Rahman, programme officer Abdullah Al Mamun and associate programme officers Mohammed Ali, Nahid Sultana, Kaniz Sumaiya, Mahfuza Akhter and Shafiul Alam were present at the conference.
