## Dr Kamal launches new political platform Sunday

Oikya Procheshta, a socio-political organisation, will launch a 'national unity platform' on Sunday with politicians and socio-cultural leaders in an effort to fight crimes and corruption, sources close to the move said yesterday.

The new platform to be declared at a national convention at Paltan Maidan coincided with former president Badruddoza Chowdhury's efforts to go ahead

with his alternative stream of politics in protest at what he said was a serious failure of the ruling coalition.

Dr Kamal Hossain, convenor of Oikya Procheshta, spearheaded the unity-building move, denouncing crime and corruption that he said spread their tentacles wide in society.

He spoke loud against the rise of an informal power centre during the 30-month-old administration

of Prime Minister Khaleda Zia, who allied with three other parties, including Jamaat-e-Islami, and was voted into office in 2001.

Political leaders, academics, journalists and civil society members will be invited to the convention with Dr Kamal in the chair, Mafizul Islam Kamal, convenor of the national convention preparation committee, told The Daily Star yesterday.

## 3 Iraqis, GI killed in Iraq

Two Iraqi women employed by a unit of US oilfield services company Halliburton were shot dead late Wednesday in this southern port city, while an Iraqi and a US soldier died in separate bomb

The violence directed against collaborators with the US-led coalition continued in Basra late Wednesday when four assailants gunned down two women on their way home from work amid a wave of targeted killings.

"The assailants stopped their car and shot them dead," said coalition spokesman Dominic d'Angelo yesterday of the women, employed as laundresses by Halliburton subsidiary Kellogg, Brown and Root (KBR).

The women's driver told AFP on condition of anonymity that four men stopped the car and warned him not to intervene.

"They pulled the first women out of the car and immediately shot her, and did the same with the second, shooting her in the head," he said.

The women's families said they believed the killers belonged to radical Islamist groups.

Coalition officials have warned that the threat of violence in Iraq now stems less from loyalists of

Saddam Hussein than from Islamic
