## Tk 60 lakh smuggled clothes seized

Bangladesh Rifles (BDR) jawans seized Indian clothes worth over 60 lakh taka from a truck at Bagancha Bazaar in Sharsha, Jessore on Wednesday.

BDR sources said a team of 12 Rifles Battalion, Sathkira recovered the clothes from a Dhaka-bound timber-laden truck. Those were smuggled into Bangladesh from India en route to Dhaka. The clothes comprising saree, three piece and garments were hidden under the timber.

The clothes were deposited to Sathkira Customs authorities.

A case was filed with Sadar thana.

## CARE to help promote child, woman rights

An agreement was signed between CARE Bangladesh and Community Development Centre (CDC), a local Non-Governmental Organisation, on Wednesday to implement 'Manusher Jonno' project in the coastal belt of the country.

The project aims at establishing child and woman rights.

CARE Bangladesh team leader Shahin Anam and CDC Executive Director Dr Khurshid Alam signed the agreement on behalf of their respective sides at a simple ceremony held in Dhaka, according to a press release.

The project will be implemented in the coastal areas of Chittagong, Luxmipur, Patuakhali, Barguna and Bagerhat.

Five programmes based on child and woman rights have been taken up for implementation under the three-year term project.

The programmes are: (1) Development of women organisations and solidarity with women, (2) Creation of alternative employment for women, (3) Local arbitration system and legal aid, (4) Raising awareness on child rights and (5) Technical and practical education for children and adolescents.

## Token hunger strike in Rangpur

Their demands also include restoration of 750 diploma engineers in their jobs in Bangladesh Agriculture Development Corporation (BADC), Bangladesh Jute Mills Corporation (BJMC), Bangladesh Chemical Industries Corporation (BCIC), fixation of time scale and selection grade for diploma engineers working in government and autonomous organisations.

Diploma engineers and polytechnic students of eight districts have been united to realise their demands. They threatened to go for a greater agitation if the government does not realise the demands immediately.

## A jobless youth now raises hopes in many

## Shaumen makes fortune from vegetable cultivation

Life is now meaningful to Shaumen Bain, once a jobless and frustrated young man. He is now wealthy by cultivating vegetables.

Strong will and hard work made him successful. Son of farmer Chhatta Ramjan Bain of Raghunathpur village in the Sadar upazila, Shaumen could cross school due to poverty. He is now 27.

Fortune smiled on the family in 1999 when Gopalganj Horticulture Centre (GHC) selected

Raghunathpur village as their working area. Shaumen took part in a two-day training on winter vegetable cultivation. GHC set up a demonstration plot on his two-bigha land.

He earned a profit of Tk 2,50,000 by cultivating tomato, cabbage and cauliflower on his two-bigha land. This was beyond his imagination and a great surprise for the villagers.

Shaumen took more training.

Next year, Shaumen leased seven bighas of land from others. The horticulture officials advised

him to rotate crops. He grew cauliflower and earned about Tk one lakh profit.

In 2001, he grew tomato and earned around Tk one lakh.

Last year, he leased five bighas of land and cultivated tomato. He made a profit of Tk 1,50,000.

In the same year he also earned Tk 80,000 by producing vegetable seedlings in cooperation with GHC.

This winter, Shaumen brought eight bighas under tomato cultivation.

He proudly said many villagers now follow him and come to him for advice on vegetable cultivation.

## PM's March 14 Syedpur visit postponed

The visit of Prime Minister Khaleda Zia to Syedpur on March 14 has been postponed, district administration sources said yesterday.

She was supposed to inaugurate the 'Uttara Housing Project' at Syedpur. Sources at the office of Additional Deputy Commissioner (general) said they got a message from the Prime Minister's Office in Dhaka on Tuesday postponing the visit.

Bangalees in Syedpur have been agitating against the local authorities' decision to allot houses in the project only to Beharis (Urdu speaking people) and are demanding houses for them also.

They have been holding rallies and bringing out processions in the town against the decision.

They also called for the Prime Minister's intervention in the matter.

Bangalees claim that the local authorities' decision violates an earlier government decision regarding allotment of 1000 houses in the project, the largest one built by the government for low income people.

A gazette notification published on May 12, 1997 had said that distressed freedom fighters, victims of erosion by river and land recession, divorced women, landless farmers and Bangladeshi citizens were eligible to apply for the houses.

But the authorities did not accept any application from any Bangalee, they alleged.

The leader of the agitating Bangalees, Abul Hasan Bulu, in a statement thanked the Prime Minister for postponing the visit. He also urged the Prime Minister to intervene so that distressed Bangalees also get houses in the project.

## Rangpur Sugar Mills lay-off Rail blockade at Mohimaganj

Several hundred workers and sugarcane growers laid a siege to Mohimaganj railway station on Thursday protesting the government's decision to lay off Rangpur Sugar Mills at Mohimaganj.

The demonstrators detained Santaher bound 492 down train for one and half hours at the station. As a result, Padmarag Express coming from the opposite direction was also detained at the next station.

A police contingent led by a magistrate and Gobindaganj Upazila Nirbahi Officer (UNO) restored rail communication.

The Chinese engineers informed the Power Secretary that they were bringing a 15-member team of experts from China soon for the overhaul.

When contacted, Chittagong PDB Chief Engineer Liqat Hossain Barobhuiyan said, "We are trying to minimise the load shedding".

Around 580 MW power is generated in Chittagong when all the plants -- 420 MW Raigan Power Plant, 2300 MW Kaptai Power Plant and 60-MW Burigum Power Plant are in full operation.

Power Secretary SM Shamsul Alam during a day-long visit to Chittagong on Tuesday last inspected the overhaul work of Raigan Power Plant.

He directed PDB officials and Chinese engineers engaged in the work overhaul to complete the work by March 31.

grid. Load shedding is unavoidable as the shortfall is substantial.

The overhauling may be completed this month, they said.

City areas plunge into darkness several times every night. Power Development Board (PDB) sources say immediate end to the crisis is unlikely.

PDB officials say there is an average load shedding of 40MW in Chittagong city since February 25 due to generation shortfall as one of the two units of 420 MW Raigan Power Plant is shut for overhauling.

Overhauling of an 210 MW unit began in the first week of January, bringing down average power generation to around 300 MW against the daily requirement of over 420MW, they said.

A portion of the shortfall is met by power supply from the national

## Handicapped Salma crawls to school

Indomitable mental strength has made physically handicapped Salma different from others. She is determined to be educated and not to remain a burden on her parents.

Now a student of class ten at

Alamsar High School, Salma, daughter of a day labourer, has been struggling since her childhood.

"I want to be educated and self-reliant", 15 year-old Salma told this correspondent during a recent visit to her house at Alamsar village in Sreepur upazila.

She was attacked with polio at

the age of two. Poor and illiterate Sohrab Hossain could not arrange

her quick treatment. The disease

made her two legs and the right hand paralysed and deformed. Hell befall the family.

"As I am poor and illiterate I could do nothing for my daughter's treatment except shedding tears," Sohrab said.

At her insistence, he carried her on his shoulders to a primary school in the area. This was a turning point in her life.

She continued to go to school riding on her father's shoulder. Sohrab could not buy her a wheelchair.

In 2000, her father somehow managed to buy a wheelchair. She went to school alone using the wheelchair.

But one of its wheels broke this year. She now crawls to school.
