Bangladesh finally logs on to submarine cable

Dhaka signs deal with 12 other countries March 27

After four years of dilly-dallying, Bangladesh is finally signing on March 27 a submarine cable agreement with 12 other countries that will open a high-speed, low-priced internet and telecommunications gateway to the users from June 2005.

Bangladesh's entry to the 13-member consortium, SEA-ME-WE-4 in acronym, will slash internet and long-distance telephone call costs and greatly boost browsing speed. The county will have a 10-gigabyte data transfer capacity a second, 68

times more than the current capacity. The capacity is considered adequate for the next 10 years and the submarine cable has a life of 15 years. State telecoms monopoly Bangladesh Telegraph and Telephone Board (BTTB) and over 100 internet service providers (ISP) between them now have a 150megabyte data transfer capacity

"The BTTB alone commands 83-megabyte capacity," said a BTTB official, wishing anonymity. The ISPs will no longer have to depend on Singapore-based costly satellite data transfer, as BTTB will offer them with lease facilities

The consortium -- South East Asia-Middle East-West Europe-4 -seeks to begin the cable connection from Singapore running through Malaysia, Thailand, Bangladesh, India, Sri Lanka, Pakistan, a number of middle eastern countries and will

Constitution change bill tabled in JS

The much-talked-about bill seeking 14th amendment to the constitution was placed in the Jatiya Sangsad yesterday and subsequently sent to the parliamentary committee on the law ministry for scrutiny within two

Law, Justice and Parliamentary Affairs Minister Moudud Ahmed tabled the bill that proposes among other things, 45 reserved seats for women in parliament and display of portraits of the president and prime

minister in the government offices. The bill was placed ignoring the demand of women rights' groups and mainstream opposition parties for direct election to the women's

Business leaders worried, watching Mannan events

Apex bodies sit today, make public statement on the attacks on March 21

Business leaders are watching with concern the wave of attacks on 11 enterprises of MA Mannan following his resignation from the ruling BNP and will take a position on the politically-sensitive issue after discussions at the highest business

Representatives of the leading trade and business bodies however told The Daily Star yesterday their silence on the attacks and freeze on bank accounts of companies owned by the retired army major is not ter their protest, but because they want to have a better grasp of the recent events before they make

"We are not avoiding the matter; we are trying to come to terms with reality and then we would like to deal with the matter seriously," said Abdul Awal Mintoo, president of the Federation of Bangladesh Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FBCCI), the country's apex trade body.

"We want to look at this matter separately from other incidents.

Politicians change parties thousands of times, this is natural, but when the attacks that followed after Mannan's resignation and even businesspeople, are trying to measure the state of democracy here."

Mintoo added businesspeople will soon make statements on the issue and the FBCCI is scheduled to sit with other apex business bodies today to discuss and share views on the present political climate, including the attacks on Mannan's enter-

Cab owner gunned down, wife injured

Miscreants yesterday gunned down a taxicab owner and shot and injured his wife as she tried to save her husband from the shooting before their Mohammadpur resi-

Led allegedly by Mohammad Ali, a gang of six on three motorbikes sprayed bullets on Alamgir Hossain Patwary, owner of two black cabs shortly after 11:00am when he was talking to his wife Rabeya Begum,

Rabeya suffered bullet wounds in the hand as she tried to safeguard the 35-year-old father of two sons and a daughter.

"The gang including Ali, Jabbar, Jafar, Bakar, Foyez and Kadir -- all were friends of Alamgir once -opened fire when he was talking to me after handing down the car key to one of his drivers," an injured Rabeya told reporters at Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH).

"He ran towards the house to save himself from the bullets, but collapsed on the ground receiving bullets in the chest and stomach,"

They were rushed to the DMCH where doctors declared Alamgir dead at 12:00pm. Rabeya was later shifted to the Orthopaedic Hospital. Ali threatened to kill Alamgir two

days ago over a long feud on some of her husband's rented-out rooms at Bizli Mohalla in Mohammadpur, Rabeya alleged. Ali also stabbed Alamgir and

Dhaka can up its GSP share to \$400m, says Wills

UNB, Dhaka

Bangladesh could raise its share of US GSP facilities up to \$400 million under an economic development programme, visiting US Assistant Trade Representative for South Asia Ashley Wills said while talking on the EPZ union issue yesterday.

The textile and apparel industry now receives the facilities equivalent to \$33 million, which could be jacked up to that extent by strength ening the textiles sector, he told a meeting with Bangladesh Export Processing Zones Authority (Bepza)

He said the US has an economic development programme for three least developed countries --Bangladesh, Nepal and Afghanistan -which will be implemented very soon. SEE PAGE 11 COL 3

Dhaka, Washington agree to sign Tifa in 2-3 months

Dhaka and Washington have agreed to sign the Trade and Investment Framework Agreement (Tifa) in two to three months.

"We had a very fruitful discussion with Bangladesh officials and we hope that Tifa would formally be signed within next two to three months," visiting US Assistant Trade Representative for South Asia Ashley Wills told reporters after the hourlong official talks at the commerce ministry in Dhaka.

"There are still some discord between us regarding the wording and phrasing of the text of the agreement which I hope would also be

Wills, however, denied having any major dispute with Bangladesh over signing the agreement. "I would talk to my colleagues back in Washington and inform Dhaka about our position," he said.

The agreement is seen to expand manifold economic ties between the two countries and provide both sides the opportunity to hold periodical negotiations on trade- and commerce-related issues.

Commerce Secretary Suhel Ahmed led the Bangladesh side while Wills headed the US delegation. Michele Labonte, political and labour official

Strain on 11 parties over agitation plans

Amid efforts to secure an alliance in the anti-coalition movement, signs of a divide have put the 11-party left alliance in disarray, as a difference of opinion surfaced over future oustgovernment strategies, including hartal, and an alternative platform.

The relations were strained by the opposition of Gano Forum and Bangladesh Samajtantrik Dal (BSD) to the hartal called separately on March 6 by fellow 11-party members, Communist Party of Bangladesh (CPB), and Workers' Party (WP) that threw their weight behind the main opposition Awami

Sources close to the Gano Forum and BSD said they opposed the

hartal on separate grounds. The

Gano Forum opposed the general

strike at an 11-party meeting appar-

ently because of its anti-hartal The BSD was at odds with the

CPB and WP, as it said the AL would reap most of the benefit of the hartal and calling the hartal the same day might mislead people into thinking of a possible alliance between the leftists and the AL.

The Gano Forum and BSD rejected proposals to call another hartal by the left alliance in late March or early April to protest what it said was high-handed repression of the opposition by the government.

Sources close to the CPB highcommand said the launch of the National Platform for Unity by Dr Kamal Hossain, Gano Forum president, on March 14 and open support by the BSD and WP prompted CPB hardliners to question the commitment of the three to the alliance.




