Biggest US union demands trade sanctions against China

The largest US workers' union filed an unprecedented petition with the government Tuesday demanding trade sanctions against China for alleged rampant violation of workers rights.

"We're taking this action because the Chinese government's persistent pattern of violating international standards of workers' rights is inflicting great hardship on working families in both our countries," said John Sweeney, president of the American Federation of Labor and Congress of Industrial Organisation (AFL-CIO) CIO).

He charged that workers in China were being forced to work for wages up to 86 percent below what they should be, with little health and safety protection and no right to join or form free trade unions unions

In the United States, he said, up to 1.3 million workers have seen their jobs shipped to China. "Their lives have been wrecked because of the unfair cost advantage caused by these violations," Sweeney told a press conference.

Representing 13 million work-ers, the AFL-CIO filed the petition under a US law which authorises President George W. Bush to take action against countries that impose "burdens" on US com-

merce by engaging in "unreasonable trade practices. In filing the 103-page petition at

World cellphone market to grow 10pc this year: Siemens

The German electronics giant Siemens expects the global market for mobile phones to grow by 10 percent this year, the head of Siemens' mobile phone division Rudi Lamprecht said Wednesday.

"Our aim is to continue to grow faster than the market," Lamprecht told a news conference at the CeBIT computer trade fair here.

In order to achieve that goal, Siemens was counting on new products, with the group planning to launch 30 models this year, Lamprecht said.

Quizzed about new handsets built to use third-generation mobile phone technology (Universal Mobile Telecommunications System or UMTS), the Siemens board member said he was "very confident" that here would "a number of handsets" on the market "at the end of this year and the beginning of next year."

And by 2010, "all phones sold will use UMTS technology," he predicted

Lamprecht nevertheless played down the importance of such technology, which was simply "a means for making applications possible".
