

89 undercover cop teams in action

Plainclothes police carry arms, Rab also joins anticrime combat

Eighty-nine armed undercover police teams swung into action last night with 40 of them under the much-talked-about elite Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) to restore law and order amid scenes of growing violence in Dhaka.

The deployment of Rab, a day

after joint forces of paramilitary Bangladesh Rifles, armed police and police were pressed into action, marks its entry to the government's efforts to fight crime.

But members of the defence forces who contribute 40 percent of the Rab strength are not taking part in raids. "They may supervise the action," said a top police officer who

would not give his name.

"Each plainclothes police team of six operates in a ward and the joint forces will be carrying out block raids until further order," the officer said, quoting an action plan laid out on March 16.

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Prominent labour leader bombed to death in Mongla

A prominent labour leader was bombed to death in southwestern Mongla town last night in a drive-by attack, sparking angry protests and political backlash, police and witnesses said.

Assaults with apparent ties to an outlawed outfit smashed the head of Mohammad Abdul Baten, 50, president of Bagerhat district Jatiyatabadi Samik Dal and former chairman of Mongla Pourasabha near his Madrasa Road house at about 8:00pm.

Businessmen to try to put an end

Top business leaders yesterday decided to pursue an agenda to get political parties including the ruling BNP put an end to violent political confrontation in the wake of a wave of attacks on business enterprises to settle political scores.

At a meeting of the Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industries (FCCI) in the afternoon, business leaders shared their common fears that politics would only

become more volatile unless something was urgently done.

They also discussed possible strategies for action and decided that a plan of action would be adopted at Sunday's meeting of the apex trade body. Representatives of country's all chambers and business bodies will finalise a joint statement at another meeting on Sunday.

The FCCI leaders met at an office of a business leader in the wake of attacks on a dozen enterprises of Mannan whose resignation

from the party enraged the BNP.

FCCI President and BNP leader Abdul Awal Mintoo met Prime Minister Khaleda Zia after the meeting and conveyed his concerns about the attack on the enterprises of renegade BNP leader Abdul Mannan and the volatile political environment.

"I have urged the prime minister to provide protection to industrial units and factories," Mintoo told The Daily Star, "besides, I have asked

Hamid asks Bhuiyan to arrange Khaleda-Hasina talks

Deputy Leader of the Opposition Abdul Hamid said yesterday he had asked ruling BNP Secretary General Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan for initiating a dialogue to end opposition's parliament boycott.

Talking to newsmen at his Sangsad Bhaban office yesterday, Hamid said he asked Mannan to tell Prime Minister Khaleda Zia to talk to the Leader of the Opposition Sheikh Hasina for a dialogue.

He acknowledged getting phone calls both from Mannan Bhuiyan and Salauddin Quader Chowdhury about sitting for talks with the government to end main opposition Awami League's parliamentary boycott since June 25 last year.

"I told Mannan Bhuiyan to ask the leader of the house (Khaleda) to talk with the leader of the opposition (Hasina)," said Hamid.

On SQ Chowdhury's proposal to AL to sit across the table for talks first and see if it should go back to parliament, Hamid said, "If there

is a pre-conceived notion that talks would not be fruitful, then what's the point of holding talks."

Hamid also said, "We've made a three-point demand in writing long back to the government and if it comes up with its position on these demands only then can we consider (the offer)."

On March 13, Bhuiyan made a telephone call to Hamid offering the AL to hold dialogue for resolving the parliamentary stand-off due to the main opposition party's indefinite House boycott since June last year.

Bhuiyan asked Hamid to convey to his party high command the ruling party's request to join parliament and sit for talks, if needed.

In January last, Bhuiyan had made a similar offer to Hamid for talks to end the stalemate. But the talks did not take place as the AL termed the offer just an eyewash.

On Wednesday last, Khaleda's parliamentary affairs advisor Salauddin Quader Chowdhury repeated the same offer of dialogue to Hamid.

AL calls it wanton disregard for president's office

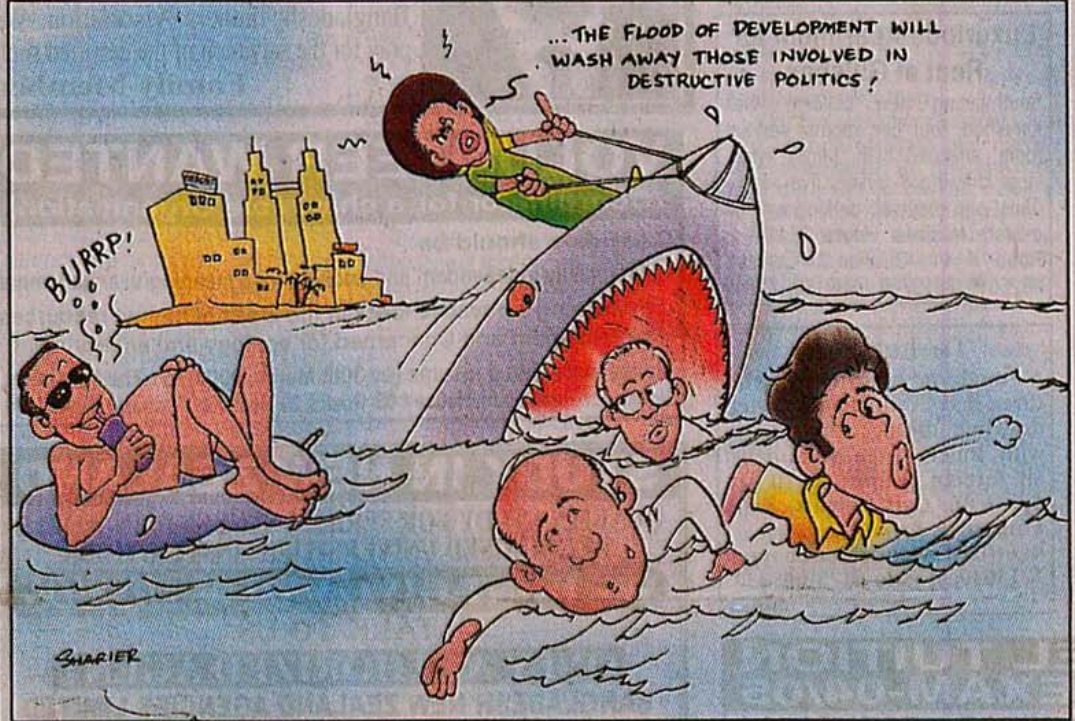

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US embassy launches finger scans for visa seekers

She exchanged greetings with the Hindu pilgrims who came to join the fair, an annual event attended by thousands of people from across the country.

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Conspirators' black hands will be smashed: Khaleda

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Pakistan to get elite military status

US reward for support in terror war

The United States will reward Pakistan for its support in the war on terrorism with an elite military status despite concerns about nuclear proliferation, US Secretary of State Colin Powell said yesterday.

Powell said US President George W. Bush would soon designate Pakistan a "major non-Nato ally," a move that will significantly enhance military cooperation between the two countries and make it easier for Islamabad to acquire certain armaments from Washington.

"I advised the foreign minister

this morning that we will also be making a notification to our Congress that will designate Pakistan as a 'major non-Nato ally' for the purposes of our future military to military relations," Powell told reporters after meeting his counterpart Khurshid Mahmud Kasuri.

The designation means Pakistan will join an exclusive club of nations -- including Argentina, Australia, Bahrain, Egypt, Israel, Japan, Kuwait, New Zealand, South Korea, Thailand and the Philippines, which are given preferential treatment in the areas of foreign aid and defense cooperation.
