MIRPUR RALLY TODAY

#### 200 welcome arches for Khaleda

Ruling BNP leaders have built over 200 welcome arches on Mirpur roads ahead of Prime Minister Khaleda Zia's public rally today, ignoring an official order and her office's requests to give up such

The premier's recent political rallies in Dhaka have seen a growing competition of putting up the bamboo arches, each costing Tk 15,000 to Tk 20,000, and gathering of schoolchildren to line up roads hampering their academic activi-

Such excesses have fuelled public outcry and brewed resentment even in BNP ranks.

An official circular issued by the Prime Minister's Office (PMO) on April 20, 2002 barred all government, semi-government, autonomous and private organisations from putting up ceremonial gates to greet the premier

It also prohibited gathering of schoolchildren for the prime minister's visits upsetting their academic routine and offering of gifts, bouquets to the head of the government SEE PAGE 11 COL 1

### Power cuts make life miserable

Acute power crisis amid rising summer heats has brought sufferings to people, disrupting treatment facilities, stopping irrigation and plunging cities and towns in pro-longed brownouts across Bangladesh.

The crisis, triggered largely by the breakdown of 450-megawatt (MW) capacity Meghnaghat power plant and glitches at 200 Ghorashal power plant, resulted in 500 MW power cuts yesterday, a weekly holiday when demand usually drops. Power authorities said 2,780

MWs of electricity were generated yesterday, against the demand of 3.300 MWs.

They said the crisis would continue to smother life for a week during which they expected the glitches would be fixed.

The Meghnaghat power plant that produces 450 MWs of electricity stopped operation on Tuesday because of a glitch that could not be found out until yesterday.

A 200 MWs unit of state-run sixunit Ghorashal Power Plant was shut

A 55 MWs gas-turbine unit of the plant was also hit by technical faults yesterday, but its authorities said they would overcome the problem later in the day. The unit was inoperative until writing of this report last

Power Development Board sources said the 700 MWs Ghorashal plant had been producing 500 MWs sinceWednesday

CANDLELITAUTOPSY

Frequent power cuts hit hospi-tals and clinics in big towns and cities yesterday and forced country's largest treatment facility, Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH), to perform candlelit autopsies on 11 bodies in the morgue verandah amid a nine-hour outage from 8:00am.

The DMCH operated a 200-KV generator to ensure minimum power to essential units.

PDB Chairman Syed Abdul Moveed said: "The PDB was planning to raise the numbers of brownouts in cities and towns outside Dhaka to ensure supply to irrigation pumps for boro crops in the north-

#### Policymakers divided over tele-talk tapping

Bugging by intelligence agents seen to breach civil rights

Policymakers are divided on the issue provide for intelligence agencies to tap telephone calls and pryemails.

Officials of post and telecommunications ministry and Bangladesh Telecommunications Regulatory Commission (BTRC) are under pressure from security agencies to change the Bangladesh Telecom Act 2001.

"But no-one except for the agen-cies wants to change the act," a senior government official said.

It will breach privacy of all -- be those in power or in the --, opposi-tion, said a telecoms ministry official, asking not to be named.

"It's not acceptable. The move will infringe on civil rights. It's an encroachment on the freedom of

communication," Professor Serajul Islam Chowdhurysaid. The academician fears it may abuse civil liberty and people may be harassed. Nor will the law helptrace real criminals.

The move is also detrimental to the growth of ICT (information and communication technology), designated as a thrust sector, Professor Chowdhury pointed out.

Impatient at the delay in amendment to the law and in a bid to bug telephone conversations for "national security", security agencies asked the BTRC to make police verification mandatory for getting new cellphone connections.

The National Security Intelligence (NSI) wants the telecoms regulator to obtain undertaking from the wouldbe subscribers to the effect that they will not object to security agencies tapping their telephonic conversa-tions for the sake of national security.

### Bush defends but people, allies split over his role

One year after ordering the first military strikes against Iraq, President Bush marks the anniversary with a fresh defense of his actions for a voting public that remains split over his decision and international allies who are growing weary of continued postwar violence in that country.

Bush's speech yesterday in the East Room of the White House ends a weeklong administration effort to boost support for the war on terrorism at a time when cracks are forming in the US-led alliance that top-Saddam Hussein from por

The president was offering a favorable progress report and issuing a call for support in a "time of

Aides said Bush's remarks would echo the warning he delivered Thursday at Fort Campbell, Ky., when he said the deadly train bombings in Madrid showed that SEE PAGE 11 COL 7



Pakistan, who were themselves struggling at 173-6 in the 35th, prospered through an unbroken stand of 74 for the seventh-wicket between Abdul Razzaq and Moin

Razzaq followed his 2-44 in India's innings to remain unbeaten on 53 off 52 balls. Moin made 22 not out.
