Prime Minister Khaleda Zia yesterday said some political parties and individuals were conspiring against Bangladesh with the intent of jeopardising democracy and warned them that the four-party alliance along with people would foil the

BGMEA slates bomb attacks on Mannan's factories

UNB, Dhaka

Bangladesh Garment Manufacturer and Exporters Association (BGMEA) has condemned the recent bomb attacks on the readymade garment industries owned by Sunman Group in Chittagong.

Without mentioning the name of Major (retd) Abdul Mannan, who owns the industries, the Board of Directors of the BGMEA in its first meeting in Chittagong yesterday sought government intervention to prevent recurrence of such "terrorist

Mannan resigned from parlia-ment and the ruling BNP on March 10 in protest at what he said was a serious failure of the coalition government. Later, he joined the alternative political stream of former President Badruddoza Chowdhury as its member secretary.

Held at the BGMEA office in the

port city with its new President Anisul Haq in the chair, the meeting vented serious concern at the deteriorating law and order and "unstable political

DEFAULT LOAN RECOVERY

Govt's share poses problem for NCBs

The intense loan recovery drive the nationalised commercial banks (NCBs) launched recently appears stumbling at the very beginning as the government alone holds about half the total outstanding loan lying with their top defaulters.

Different government bodies have 42 percent of the total of the four NCBs' top 20 default loans outstanding with them.

The top government loan defaulters include the food ministry (Tk 430 crore loan with two NCBs), Bangladesh Textile Mills Corporation (Tk345 crore with three NCBs), Adamjee Jute Mills (Tk 126 crore), Khulna Newsprint Mills (Tk 74 crore with one NCB) and Bangladesh Shipping Corporation (Tk 60 crore with a bank).

The remaining 58 percent of NCBs' top 20 default loans, lying with the private sector, is also almost beyond their reach as most defaulters have already obtained stay orders from the High Court on the banks' loan recovery attempts.

Defaulters at present hold up Tk 10,575 crore in outstanding loans

Janata and Agrani banks. Of them, the top 20 defaulters of the NCBs together have Tk 3,488 crore or 33 percent of the total.

The public sector borrowers that are on the top 20 lists have been holding up loans for a maximum of 13 years and minimum of four years.

Bankers allege recovery attempts by the NCBs appear to be overlooked by the government borrowers. "All we can do is repeatedly urge the government offices concerned to return our loans," says an official of Rupali Bank, with which the government has Tk 295 crore default loan. "If the government doesn't repay us, we've nothing to do," he

A finance ministry official noted, "There had been no discussion at our level on how or when these default loans will be repaid. We have sought assistance from the World Bank in this regard under its Banks Modernisation Project."

Blair planning snap polls later this year

British Prime Minister Tony Blair is considering a snap general election later this year, around 20 months earlier than the deadline for the poll, a newspaper report said yesterday.

Blair has warned senior officials in his ruling Labour Party to be ready for a possible election in October, said the generally Labour-supporting Daily Mirror newspaper.

The early election is being considered due a mood of increased optimism that the party could be returned to power for a third consecutive time, the paper said.

Labour lawmakers had been ordered to make sure that all their campaign literature is up to date by

the summer, one told the Daily Mirror. "There is a growing sense that October is no longer out of the question," the unnamed parliamen-

Blair must hold a general election by mid-2006 at the latest, but is able, like all British prime ministers, to pick his own date for maximum electoral advantage.

Although Blair's popularity has taken a battering over his support for the US-led war in Iraq, opposed by many Britons, opinion polls show that the main opposition Conservative


He however had to shift the venue of strike from the National Press Club to the main gate of the Supreme Court (SC) due to police obstruction.

Cash-strapped DCC seeks anti-mosquito drive funds

Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) has sought an allocation of Tk 25 crore from the finance ministry in the face of a fund crunch in carrying out a round-the-year mosquito eradica-

Recently the DCC has sent a Demand Order (DO) to the finance ministry, with a view to securing a fund for operating the anti-mosquito drives, a DCC official said. Mosquito control was once a

responsibility of the Department of Public Health.But later the DCC was assigned, without any additional monetary allocation, to do the job.

Though the city's civic service provider requires Tk 50 crore every year to achieve success in anti-mosquito drive, it manages to spend Tk.12 crore in this regard, only to continue the drive in a pretty limited scale, DCC source said.

DCC does not tax the city dwellers for its mosquito eradication programmes, rather it depends on its own source of revenue, the source

Under the mosquito eradication plan 2003-2004, DCC has purchased one lakh and 50,000 litres of adulticide, 21,000 litres of larvicide, and 50,000 litres of Malaria Oil-B to


