

Restaurant fire kills 4 waiters

Four waiters, three of them relatives, were burnt to death when a fire broke out at a restaurant at Pallabi early Thursday.

The waiters, two only 12 years, were trapped inside the small kitchen of Hotel Sheba and Restaurant at Section 7 on Road No. 3 during the fire as they could not open the steel door they had locked from inside.

Pallabi police recovered the charred bodies of Babul Hossain, 30, his cousin Mohammad Sumon, 12, Sumon's nephew Ismail Hossain, 12 and 16-year-old Mohammad Elias and sent them to Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) morgue for autopsy.

Hailing from Balarampur village of Muladi thana of Barisal, all of them worked in the hotel as waiters.

Tagore's Nobel medal goes missing

In a daring burglary at the Uttarayan complex of Visva Bharati University in Shantiniketan, the Nobel Prize medal, a watch, a bangle and important citations belonging to Rabindranath Tagore were stolen from the museum Wednesday night.

West Bengal Chief Minister Buddhadev Bhattacharjee ordered a CID inquiry into the theft.

Describing the incident as 'dangerous', Bhattacharjee told reporters at the state secretariat here today that the theft was detected this morning when the University re-opened after a day's break.

The burglars sneaked into the museum breaking open the window railings, state ICP (Law and Order) Chayan Mukherjee here said adding that some people including the guards were detained in this

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Blair, Gaddafi pledge to fight al-Qaeda

Prime Minister Tony Blair yesterday sealed Libya's return to the international fold with an historic handshake with Muammar Gaddafi and an agreement to fight al-Qaeda together.

After more than an hour of talks, Blair said Libya's rejection of banned weapons and rapprochement with the West could act as a template for other Arab nations to turn their back on Islamic extremism.

"We are showing by our engagement with Libya today that it is possible for countries in the Arab world to work with the United States and the UK to defeat the common enemy of extremist fanatical terrorism driven by al-Qaeda," he told reporters.

"It is a very, very important signal for the whole of the Arab world."

On the first visit to Libya by a British leader since 1943, Blair was whisked to a ceremonial tent outside Tripoli to meet the Libyan leader once condemned by former US President Ronald Reagan as the "mad dog of the Middle East".

There the pair symbolically shook hands for the cameras before vowing to work together to oppose militant Islamic groups. "You are looking good, you are still young," Gaddafi told Blair, speaking in English.

Blair said Gaddafi recognised "a common cause with us in the fight against al-Qaeda, extremism and terrorism, which threatens not just the western world but the Arab world also".

Blair promised not to forget "the pain of past actions" after the 1988 Lockerbie bombing which killed 270 people but said Libya should be welcomed back into the international fold.

"In reaching out the hand of partnership today, we do not forget the past," he said. "But we do try in the light of the genuine changes happening to move beyond it."

Gains to British business from the diplomatic thaw were being notched up even before Blair arrived. An official on the premier's plane to Tripoli said oil giant Royal Dutch/Shell had won a \$200 million gas exploration deal with Libya.

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Govt may delay EPZ TUs by 2yrs

The government is thinking of delaying introduction of trade union (TU) rights in the exclusive industrial zones by two years following requests from the foreign investors, according to sources.

The foreign investors, particularly the South Koreans, however, have been demanding a delay of three years before the law on limited trade union rights at the export processing zones (EPZs) comes into force.

But the government considers two years' time enough for them. "We think two years' time for them will not be unreasonable, though investors are demanding three

years," said Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman yesterday, emerging from a review meeting on the draft law.

"The review committee will sit again on Sunday to decide on the timeframe," he said.

Transparency International (TI), in its Global Corruption Report, uses the list to show how political corruption and private bribery hurt development.

Suharto's alleged haul of \$15-\$35bn in 31 years of rule, TI said, demonstrated how abuse of power "undermines the hopes... of developing countries".

Close behind is Zaire's Mobutu Sese Seko, who allegedly looted \$5bn.

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Outlaws slay five in Chuadanga

Extremists killed five people in three separate incidents in sadar upazila Wednesday night.

Locals said outlaws picked up Muazzin of a mosque, Motiar Rahman, 40, of Sambhunagar and Abdul Bakkar, 35, of Mohamadjuma at gunpoint at 8:00pm. They took them to a pond at Boalia village and stabbed them to death.

In another incident, outlaws slew Abdur Rahman, 55, of Boalia Eastpara and Ashraful Haque, 40, of Sambhunagar at the same time in an adjoining field.

In Sorajnagar, the outlaws forcibly took Maola, 40, of Jadabpur village and chopped him to death near a petrol pump.

Police recovered the bodies and sent those to hospital for autopsy.

Deputy Inspector General of Police M Aziz Sarkar visited the villages yesterday but he declined to talk with journalists.

The recent deaths brought to seven the number of people killed by the outlaws in last two days. A tense situation is prevailing in the affected villages, which most men have deserted in fear.
