Musharraf vows to 'eliminate' al-Qaeda

Militants kill 8 Pakistani soldiers

Pakistan President Pervez Musharraf vowed Friday that he would "eliminate" al-Qaeda and said that the terror network's second-in-command, Ayman al-Zawahiri, was on the run.

Musharraf spoke during an interview with ABC News, one day after an audio tape -- attributed to Zawahiri -- urged Pakistan's military to support al-Qaeda and sweep Musharraf from power.

Musharraf's interview followed execution of eight Pakistani soldiers taken hostage in fighting by al-Qaeda-linked militants near the Afghan border, officials said yesterday, raising the temperature in an offensive on Islamic radicals.

"Now as far as if he's taunting me well, I would like to say that I'm going to eliminate all of them," Pakistan's leader said, referring to Zawahiri and al-Oaeda lovalists.

"I mean, Zawahiri is on the run. For heaven's sake, it's just one tape. Let's not get excited," Musharrafsaid.

"It's very clear we'll eliminate them, and the tribal elders are cooperating," he added.

The call was made in a tape broadcast by the Arab Al-Jazeera television network late Thursday and attributed to al-Qaeda deputy Ayman Al-Zawahiri in a recording described by US intelligence as probably authentic.

The tape called on Pakistan's military to "not obey orders" and overthrow Musharraf's administration, which it calls a "traitor vernment.

Furious Islamists took to Pakistan's streets Friday to protest the 11-day military operation against tribal fighters and al-Qaeda militants along Pakistan's north-ern border with Afghanistan, as rebel tribesmen at the centre of the battle refused to hand over hostages until troops withdraw.

EXECUTION OF 8 SOLDIERS

The executed soldiers, their hands tied behind their backs and apparently shot at point-blank range, were found in a ditch on Friday near Wana, the capital of the South Waziristan area in Pakistan's semiautonomous tribal territories.

They were likely taken hostage and killed shortly after their convoy SEE PAGE 11 COL 8

Women to soon take security jobs abroad

Bangladesh women will soon take up security guards' jobs abroad under a government initiative, a government official said yesterday.

The government will send trained women such as members of the Village Defence Party (VDP) to Saudi Arabia and other countries as security guards of girls' colleges, dormitories, hostels and other predominantly women workplaces, a high official of the expatriates' welfare and overseas employment ministry said.

The initiative was taken after Prime Minister Khaleda Zia's recent visit to Shafipur Ansar ernment would take a plan to send women VDP and Ansar members

The expatriates' welfare ministry sat with the home ministry to work out the plan in the wake of the premier's meeting.

The government has already allocated Tk 7.30 crore for setting up a modern training centre at Shafipur Ansar Academy to train women defence force members planning to take jobs abroad.

welfare ministry official said.

"There are over 22 lakh trained women Ansar and VDP members in Bangladesh, many of whom could get jobs abroad with a good salary," he said.

Women workers will have to spend not more than Tk 15,000 each for getting such a job, sources said, adding employers would bear all their travel, food and accommodation expenses.

According to the plan, government agency Bangladesh Overseas **Employment and Services Limited** will start the process and private recruiting agencies will come up

AL govt survived 88 BNP deadlines

Hasina claims to Barisal lawyers

Awami League (AL) President Sheikh Hasina said yesterday BNP as an opposition had announced at least 88 deadlines for dislodging her government during its 1996-2001 term.

"We formed the government in June 1996 and since then they [BNP] issued repeated deadlines for unseating the Awami League government. The BNP chairperson warned to oust our government within three months of taking over. Failing to meet the deadline, she [Khaleda Zia] issued several more deadlines during our five-year term," the leader of the opposition in parliament said while addressing the new office bearers of Barisal Bar Association at her party's Dhanmondi office.

Hasina, however, did not mention her party's April-30 deadline to topple the BNP-Jamaat-led alliance government through mass upsurge. AL General Secretary Abdul Jalil, referring to a decision by his party's highest policy-making body, recently s id the alliance government would be overthrown by April 30.

The AL president said, "Despite their repeated deadlines, we did complete the full term and worked for people's welfare."

Sundarbans blaze rages on

The blaze that broke out last Wednesday in the Sundarbans engulfing compartment No. 27 under Dhanshagor station of Chandpai Range is yet to be

The raging fire has burnt down over 4,000 trees of different species within two and a half kilometres area on the eastern wing of Sundarbans Forest Division

The flames are spreading fast, affecting 50 more spots despite strenuous efforts by foresters and people living in neighbouring localities to put out the fire. Assistant Conservator of Forest (ACF) Md Rafiqul Islam, who is in charge of the eastern wing of the SFD, however said the blaze has been extinguished, a claim eyewitnesses contradicted saying the situation is alarming. They added the inferno is likely to engulf

eral thousand trees with wind

blowing over the forest at a speed of over 20 to 30 kilometres an

Rafiq said the fire originated from torches (smoking devices) used for dislodging bees from the hives by unauthorised honey collectors. Hundreds of used torches and other objects have been recovered from the place of occurrence. Sources however said the fire originated from ovens used by unauthorised woodcutters for cooking.

Eyewitnesses Sufia, Yunus and Emdadul of Nishankhali village said fire has destroyed part of the forest covering an area of over three kilometres. Over 7,000 sundari, bain, passur and garan trees have been burnt to ashes,

According to unconfirmed sources, a vested quarter set the trees on fire with the help of Mouals or honey collectors

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18 killed in Iraq violence

Bombings and shootings across Iraq have left 18 people dead, including a Marine and an ABC cameraman killed in fierce fighting between American forces and guerrillas armed with mortars and

In the center of the capital yesterday, a bomb exploded on a street as a convoy of sport utility vehicles passed, wounding five Iraqis, US Army Lt. Col. Peter Jones said. It was not clear who was in the cars. US troops sealed off the area after the blast.

In the city of Fallujah, about 35 miles west of Baghdad, seven Marines were wounded, besides the one killed, in clashes Friday, a US spokesman in Baghdad said. Footage from Associated Press Television News showed American troops carrying a comrade in a stretcher shortly after an explosion during combat.

The Marines and guerrillas fought for hours in the alleys of the city, which has resisted American efforts to pacify it since the ouster of Saddam Hussein a year ago.

The 1st Marine Expeditionary Force issued a statement saying it was "conducting offensive operations ... to foster a secure and stable environment for the people." It went on to say that "some have chosen to fight. Having elected their fate, they are being engaged and destroyed."

and killed while filming the clashes. It was unclear who killed "We are trying to confirm all the details surrounding his death and have asked the US military for an investigation," ABC News

President David Westin said in a

statement from New York. Witnesses said Mazhour and other journalists were taking cover behind a wall, with the Marines in front and the insurgents behind. After rebels fired a barrage of grenades at the US troops, Mazhour peered around the wall and a bullet struck him in the forehead almost

instantly Four other Iraqis were killed and six wounded in the fighting, said a doctor at Fallujah hospital Divaa al-Jumailee. Witnesses said the dead included a shop owner, a customer and two bystanders.
