Country set to enter mining era

Commercial production of coal, hard rock from October

Against many odds, the first two mines in the country are coming into commercial operation in October, opening up two new sectors -- coal energy and granite

The North Korean built Maddhyapara Hard Rock project and Chinese built Barapukuria Coal Mine project of Petrobangla will also employ thousands of people directly in the industrially

backward northern region.

"Both these projects saw many hurdles. But both of them have now come to a final shape with more than 80 percent work completed," said a top official of Petrobangla. "We can now confidently say they will come into operation in October if nothing

The impact of operation of the Tk 1431-crore coal mine project will not be felt immediately as its main consumer -- the 250 megawatt Barapukuria Power Plant-will start operation several months after the mine is ready

for commercial production. The mine has 64 million tonnes of high quality coal, which in terms of thermal value

Reforms fail to rein in unemployment

Joblessness rises 3.3%, employment 1.6% a year in 1990s

Despite various economic reforms throughout the 1990s, there was little improvement in employmentgeneration situation in the country.

From 1990 to 2001, unemploy-

ment in Bangladesh increased by 3.3 percent a year, said the 'Report on Human Development in South Asia-2003,' prepared by Human Development Centre, a Pakistanbased regional think-tank, and launched yésterday at a meeting organised by Centre for Policy Dialogue (CPD).

Quoting the International Labour Organisation (ILO), the report showed that during 1995-2000 annual growth rate of gross domestic product (GDP) in Bangladesh was 5.1 percent, labour

force 2.6 percent and employment only 1.6 percent.

"Economic reforms even left negative impacts on employment growth in some cases," said CPD Trustee M Syeduzzaman, presiding over the meeting, "partly due to obligatory compliance with conditions imposed by funding coun-

Adverse impacts of trade liberalisation, economic reforms in wrong order, gender inequity, reduction in public expenditures and lack of effective programmes to develop income generating skills have all led to a shortfall in job opportunities, the CPD trustee

Boro harvest might suffer if the spell continues

The country is facing a drought-like situation due to scarce rainfall in the last three months, forcing farmers to depend on ground water ever receding to deeper depths for Boro cultivation this season, Met office sources said.

The country experienced a drastic fall in rain this year with 73 percent less rainfall than expected in January-February while the shortage was 53 percent till March 20, the sources said

prepare for additional irrigation measures for Boro cultivation.

"Drought has not set in yet, but

we are closely monitoring the situation," said Arjuman Habib, deputy director of Bangladesh Meteorological Department.

Boro accounts for nearly 50 percent of the country's total rice production of 1.3 crore metric tons. An official from the agricultural

department said although rain is not crucial for Boro cultivation, which is largely dependent on irrigation, low rainfall is likely to harm normal production.

Besides, price hike of diesel used to run irrigation pumps coupled with power shortfall lower prospects requesting anonymity.

But uninterrupted irrigation is essential for good production.


