Open dialogue with govt 'by any means'

Business leaders also ask Hasina to shun hartal

Business leaders at a discussion with opposition leader Sheikh Hasina vesterday asked the government and opposition to open dialogues 'by any means' to fight violence together and shun hartal as a politi-

They said the country is witnessing a grim law and order situation and hartalis hitting business hard.

organised by the Awami League (AL) on Tuesday, saying it is a good substitute for hatral to register protest.

The meeting was held at a city hotel after the AL had called a countrywide back-to-back dawn-to-dusk hartal on April 7 and 8 demanding immediate resignation of the government and snap polls.

ated the human-shield programme cal stability, the two major parties -ruling BNP and opposition Awami League -- must sit together to thrash out their disputes," remarked Annisul Haq, president of Bangladesh Garments Manufacturers and Exporters Association (BGMEA).

"I never felt so insecure as I feel now," he said, remarking that the situation was not so grave during the 1996-2001 rule of the AL, though it

Strike jerks Old Dhaka to halt

1 lakh shops shut, political intimidation alleged

A half-day strike yesterday whisked Old Dhaka to a standstill, as businesspeople shut over one lakh shops in protest at a spate of killings of traders over the last few months, shrugging off political intimidation.

In the outrage triggered by the grisly killings of Shamsul Haq and his son Russell Sheikh on Friday, the demonstrators turned a matrix of roads abuzz with rallies and processions in Kotwali and Sutrapur.

Sources alleged political interference in the form of threats from the ruling BNP stopped some leading businesses in Lalbagh joining the strike under the Sammilita Oikya Babosayee Pracheshta (SOBP).

Demanding urgent steps from the government, the demonstrators in procession shouted slogans --"Why Did Our Brothers Die?" and "Break the Black Hand of Extortion," on their way to Nawabpur Road where they held a huge rally at about

1:00pm.
"How would you like to be asked for money at gunpoint every day? How would you like to leave home in the morning fearing death closer to you than expected?" asked an angry Jahangir Alam, a businessman from Radhikamohan Basak Lane.

The sudden appearance of main opposition Awami League leader Sayeed Khokon sent a ripple of murmurs among the crowd at the rally conducted by Nawabpur Dokan Malik Samity President Kamal Hossain.

"I am here as a businessman of Nawabpur and I think it is my duty to protest the killings of nine businessmen in the past one and a half months," Khokon said. Khokon slated Mayor Sadeque

Hossain Khoka and said: "Since he (mayor) described the murders of Shamsul Haq, Russell and Selim Reza as business-related, not as part of law and order downslide, he is SEE PAGE 11 COL 7

Edn commission for radical reforms

Prescribes single-discipline secondary schooling, decentralisation, watchdog for private universities

The National Education Commission asks the government to go for radical educational reforms including a single-discipline secondary education, raising teacher-student ratio, decentralisation of administration, satisfactory salary structure for teachers and setting up a regulatory body for private universities.

The commission in its final report recommends for a singlediscipline education all through the secondary schooling instead of the current division into science,

humanities and commerce groups from class eight.

The commission, formed in January last year with former Dhaka University vice-chancellor Mohammad Moniruzzaman Miah as its chairman, handed over the report to Prime Minister Khaleda Zia at her office yesterday.

The report maintains the current multi-disciplinary secondary education system creates socio-economic and intellectual divisions among the students coming from all strata and thus acts against social unity.
