Plan to bomb **British football** stadium foiled

British police have foiled a plot by Islamic extremists to bomb a football stadium, possibly the Manchester United ground, following the arrest of 10 terror suspects, newspaper reports said Tuesday.

Police arrested the 10, including a woman, in a series of raids Monday in northern and central England and they are being held on suspicion of committing or preparing acts of terrorism. The Sun tabloid reported that police had foiled a suicide bomb attack planned at Old Trafford, the home ground of Manchester United, one of the world's best-known football teams. The newspaper said intelligence chiefs believed several al-Qaeda extremists planned to blow themselves up in separate parts of the stadium during a match on Saturday and had already bought tickets for the game. "If successful, any such attack would have caused absolute carnage. Thousands of people could have been killed," an unnamed police source told the paper. SEE PAGE 11 COL 3
