CCL comes alive

After an uninspiring start on Tuesday, the first-ever GrameenPhone Corporate Cricket League sprang to life yesterday.

The eventful second day marked a tied match between GrameenPhone and BCB Development Squad at the Bangabandhu National Stadium.

At the Dhanmondi Cricket Stadium Minhazul Abedin showed why he was considered the best batsman in domestic cricket with a terrific half-century to present MM Ispahani Limited a five-wicket win against Gazi Tank.

National discard Moniruzzaman might have missed the chance of becoming the first player to hit a ton in the CCL by two runs but his effort was decisive to give CityCell a 12-run victory over Acme Laboratories at the Fatullah Stadium.

But there was no match to the drama that unfolded at the 'big bowl' where the BCB Development Squad, who were there only for exposure, almost upstaged a star-studded GrameenPhone side before tumbling in the final over.

Need only four runs from the last six deliveries to topple GrameenPhone's 224 for 8 in the stipulated 50 overs, the youths could only finish on a par with their opponents with two wickets in hand after Mazhar Uddin failed to sneak a single from the last two deliveries of left-arm spinner Abdur Razzak.

A nippy Razzak, one of the two uncapped players picked for the West Indies tour, not only held his nerve in the final over but also removed dangerman Nazmul Hossain. The number nine batsman struck a 21-ball 30 to take the Development squad within three runs of the target, but mistimed an attempted lofted drive in the second ball of the final over only to be caught at mid-off by Anwar Hossain.

Mazhar remained stuck on 45. Earlier, the GrameenPhone total was built around a fine 84 from Anisul Hakim and Tushar Imran's run-a-ball 41.

But the star recruits of the country's largest cellular phone operators Shahriar Hossain (12), Alok Kapali (16) and captain Khaled Mahmud (20) failed to make any impact.

GAZI TANK-ISPANAH

In a Group A match at Dhanmondi, Minhaz struck a captain's knock of 87 as Ispahani overhauled Gazi Tank's challenging total of 258 with more than three overs to spare.

The 38-year-old right-hander wasted little time to fulfil the pledge of Ispahani boss Salman Ispahani, who set a target of winning one game in the competition, clobbering ten fours and two sixes in his 82-ball knock.

The former national captain launched the assault from where opener Abdul Ahad and one-down Mahabubul Karim had left.

Ahad hammered 52 off 59 balls with eight fours and one six while Mahabubul hit a 71-ball 59 that featured four boundaries and three

sixes.

Earlier, Sheikh Nizamuddin scored a sparkling 94 not out for Gazi Tank. The number-three batsman anchored the innings but missed a deserved century. His 116-ball knock was punctuated by eight fours and a six.

ACME-CITYCELL

While their cellular rivals were struggling at the BNS, CityCell showed no such jitters at the Fatullah Stadium. The last minute entrants baffled national captain Habibul Bashar-led Acme in their first outing.

The upset win by CityCell was fashioned by Moniruzzaman, whose fine 98 was the cornerstone of an impressive total of 257-6.

The right-hander from Mymensingh hit six fours and two sixes in his 141-ball knock before being unfortunately run out. He put up 111 runs for the second wicket with opener Imran Ahmed, who chipped in with 47 off 75 balls.

Country's top batsman Bashar scored a 71-ball 50 and national opener Hannan Sarker made 75 off 86 balls for Acme. But contributions from others were few and far between as Acme could only manage 245 for eight before exhausting their share of 50 overs.

Orchard now Aussie ump

Dave Orchard is among six umpires named by Cricket Australia in their national panel for the 2004-05 season. The 55-year-old Orchard represented South Africa in the ICC's elite panel and has officiated in 44 Tests – including two matches in the recently concluded series between Sri Lanka and Australia – and 107 one-day internationals.

However, he has been an Australian resident for the past seven years and is expected to be granted Australian citizenship soon. His contract with the ICC ended earlier this year.

The appointment makes Orchard eligible to officiate in Pura Cup, ING Cup, and national second XI competitions, and also in some international fixtures like Australia A games and tour matches.

A left-handed batsman and a right-arm medium-fast bowler, Orchard scored 1634 runs and took 47 wickets in a first-class career which lasted 11 years, before he took to umpiring. Over the years, he gained a reputation for being among the less conservative umpires, often giving batsmen out lbw when they stretched forward to spinners without offering a stroke.

NFL in mid-June BFF swinging into action

The Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF) has decided to start the 4th National Football League (NFL) in the third week of June.

BFF's executive committee in a meeting yesterday evening made the decision.

There have been unconfirmed reports that NFL's sponsors Nitol-Tata have lost their interest in staging the competition but BFF's general secretary Anwarul Haque Helal dismissed those fears and confirmed that the league will be sponsored by Nitol-Tata.

"We still have a contract with them and there is no reason for them to abandon us mid-way through the agreement," Helal said after the meeting.

"The NFL committee will decide on how the teams can be accommodated in the competition," added Helal.

Helal informed that the BFF has

McGrath back for Australia

Fast-medium bowler Glenn McGrath has been recalled to Australia's Test and one-day team for their tour of Zimbabwe that begins next month.

Australia's selectors also named all-rounder Cameron White in the Test squad for the first time after leg-spinner Stuart MacGill made him self unavailable on moral grounds.

McGrath has not played for Australia in almost a year because of an ankle injury but has proved his fitness.

"Glenn's 100 per cent fit and ready to go so it's sensible that he returns to the squad given his prior status as the premier fast bowler in the world," chairman of selectors Trevor Hohns said in a statement.

"With the short nature of the tour, it's a good opportunity for Glenn to ease his way back into competitive cricket and it gives us an opportunity to assess how well he is going in a view to the next 12 months and what lies ahead for the Australian cricket team."


MacGill's decision not to tour prompted the selectors to name White as the back-up to Shane Warne.

England's Zim tour likely

England appear likely to tour Zimbabwe in October despite reservations about the host country's government after a meeting at Lord's on Tuesday with Zimbabwe Cricket Union (ZCU) chairman Peter Chingoka.

"It's fairly certain that England will have to honour the commitment so long as it's safe and secure," England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) chairman David Morgan told the BBC.

Chingoka, who attended the brief meeting with ZCU member Oziias Bvute, expressed optimism that the tour would take place.

"We had the opportunity to state our case very clearly to the ECB," Chingoka told reporters. "We're hoping in a couple of weeks' time they'll come up with a decision that's correct and that's a decision to tour as scheduled in October and November."

Morgan's statement on Tuesday follows an uncompromising stance by the International Cricket Council (ICC), which has threatened international suspension and a 2-million-dollar fine for teams who refuse to tour unless there are either legitimate safety or security concerns or they
