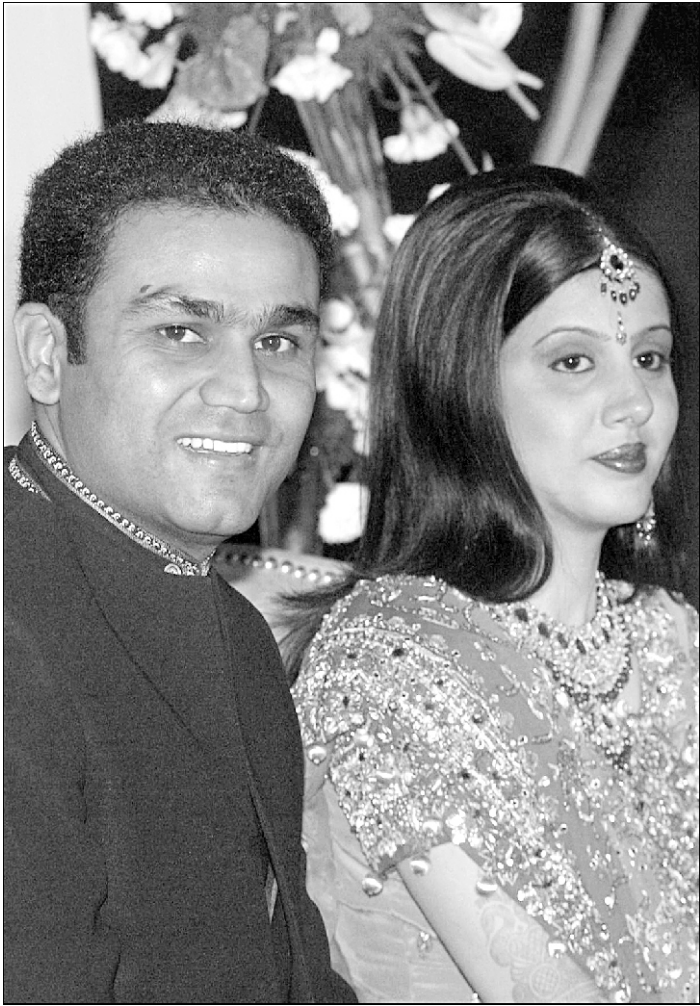

The other members of the Bangladesh contingent are swimmers Rubel Rana, who won the 100m backstroke gold medal at the 9th SAF Games in Islamabad earlier this month, and Dolly Akhter and Commonwealth Games gold medalist in shooting Asif Hossain Khan, the 17-year-old who also clinched a gold at the recently concluded Islamabad SAF Games.

"We are still trying to include female shooter in the squad. We have received only one wildcard entry for Asif. There will be no more but if we can convince the organising committee into giving us another wildcard, we will take Suraja Akhter with us," Zafar added.

BJMC sprinter Shamsuddin, who won gold medal at the national championships last year, failed to qualify for the finals at this year's meet.

On the other hand, Chumki, who holds the national record for both the 200 and 100m sprints, was dethroned by 16-year-old Ishrat Jahan Iva last week in the nationals.

2nd ODI rained off

Rain forced the abandonment of the second one-day match between West Indies and England after 16 overs on Saturday.

West Indies were 57 for two with Ramnaresh Sarwan not out on 11 and Ricardo Powell not out on eight when the rain that has been lashing the twin-island state of Trinidad and Tobago for the last few days arrived.

Prior to the match, Bryan Davis, the former West Indies batsman, who supervises pitch preparation at the Queen's Park Oval, was concerned that more rain would leave the outfield in an unplayable condition.

Several parts of the outfield were underwater when umpires Darrell Hair of Australia and Billy Doctrove of Dominica made the decision to call off play for the day around 1700 GMT.

Damp conditions delayed the start by an hour with the umpires concerned about the bowlers' run-up at the Queen's

Park Cricket Club End.

They inspected around 1:30 p.m. and were satisfied that the conditions had improved enough. The overs were reduced with each side allotted a maximum of 46.

Steve Harmison, whose stock has risen on this visit to the Caribbean, exploited the conditions to maximum effect and made the breakthrough when West Indies left-hander Shivanrine Chanderpaul, opening the innings, was caught behind for three with the last ball of the eighth over.

James Anderson, the forgotten man of England cricket in recent weeks, struck with his third ball when Chris Gayle was caught at point for 20 in the 11th over before the rain came.

Both sides made one change to their lineups for this match.

For West Indies, captain Brian Lara was passed fit from a finger injury that prevented him from playing in the first ODI and replaced Sylvester Joseph.

For England, James Anderson replaced fellow fast bowler James Kirtley.

England lead the seven-match one-day series 1-0, after

winning the opening game last Sunday at Georgetown by two wickets with three balls to spare.

The third match of the series will be contested on Sunday. England won the preceding Test series 3-0.

Schuetzler kept his head in the first set tiebreak against 1998 champion Moya, taking it 7-5, and the 2003 Australian Open finalist maintained his grip in the second set to seal victory in one hour 43 minutes.

Fed Cup

Clijsters hits form

World number two Kim Clijsters made a winning return for Belgium in the Fed Cup against Croatia though both Japan and Australia had trouble, dropping 2-0 behind in their away matches.

Belgium's Clijsters, out for five weeks with an injured left wrist, celebrated her comeback with a 6-1, 4-6, 6-1 win over Jelena Kostanic in this World Group first round match.

"I'm very happy," Clijsters said after the match.

"I knew my rhythm was off so I was not surprised I struggled. After more than a month away, it's impossible to come straight back and perform at the same level."

Clijsters ran away with the first set 6-1 though struggled in the second set and Kostanic shot to a 3-0 lead. The Belgium levelled at 4-4

but could not stop Kostanic winning it 6-4.

In the end, the final set became a mere formality for Clijsters as she romped through the third set 6-1.

Croatia's Karolina Sprem easily overcame Kirsten Flipkens 6-4, 6-0 in the second singles with Sunday play including a doubles and a further two singles matches.

Australia found there was no Fed Cup miracle as they slipped 2-0 down to Russia.

Anastasia Myskina gave Russia a 1-0 lead with a straight sets 6-4, 6-1 victory over Samantha Stosur.

Stosur rallied from a break down to level at 4-4 in the opening set, but the Russian number one was too powerful for the 20-year-old from Brisbane running out a comfortable winner.

In the second rubber, Australia number one Alicia Molik battled hard for nearly two hours against Svetlana Kuznetsova. But after rallying strongly in the second set she eventually went down 6-4, 3-6, 6-4.

Aussies 4-nations champs

Australia won the men's field hockey Four-Nations Challenge here Sunday with a 7-1 win over Malaysia, repeating its win in the Four-Nations Challenge in Canberra last week against the same teams.

South Africa upset India, winning 1-0, to take third place. Adam Commens and Jamie Dwyer scored doubles for Australia, Troy Elder converted a penalty corner and Andrew Smith and Michael Brennan added field goals in the one-sided match.

Long periods of play had 21 players inside Malaysia's defensive half as Malaysia played a half-court defence.

Malaysia broke out three times and earned two penalty corners with

Kuhan Shanmuganathan firing wide and into Australia's goalkeeper successively.

The third breakout landed Malaysia its only goal from a free hit by Kuhan just outside the circle, deflected high into goal by Boon Huat Chua in the first minute of the second half.

Barry Dancer, Australia's coach, commended the quality of his team's performance on Sunday.

"There was more cohesion and more consistent control today which is what we have been aiming for since we started playing in Canberra," Dancer said.

He said he believed the quality of the play has made it harder for him to select his Olympic squad in June.

"The performances in the eight matches (in Canberra and Sydney) have made it more difficult. The squad is a more even squad after this fortnight," Dancer said.

In other matches, France led Germany 2-0 at Amiens, Italy led Czech Republic by the same score at Lecce, Austria were also 2-0 in front at Sankt Pollen, and Switzerland and Spain were all square at 1-1 in La Manga.

Remembering Senna

Gerhard Berger completed an emotional three laps of the Imola circuit here on Sunday to mark the 10th anniversary of the deaths of Ayrton Senna and Roland Ratzenberger.

Berger completed three laps of the track in the Lotus Senna, one of his closest friends in Formula One, drove to pole for the San Marino Grand Prix here in 1985.

Berger flew the Brazilian flag with Senna's picture on it from the airbox of the Lotus, and also wore a badge of fellow Austrian Ratzenberger's helmet on his overalls.

"That was very emotional for different reasons," Berger said.

"Of course to remember Ayrton, of course to remember Roland. I think it is a great way to remember my colleagues.

Senna's sister Viviane, who runs the Ayrton Senna Foundation in Brazil, was present at the finish line along with the three-time world champion's nephew Bruno.

Schumacher in control

Michael Schumacher cruised to his fourth consecutive victory at the San Marino Grand Prix after brushing off Jensen Button's challenge.

Button led for nine laps after starting the race from pole position, but the Ferrari was much faster and the Englishman had to settle for second.

Juan Pablo Montoya was a distant third for Williams, ahead of the Renaults of Fernando Alonso and Jarno Trulli.

David Coulthard was 13th after damaging his front wing at the first corner.

Coulthard's McLaren teammate Kimi Raikkonen, who started from the back of the grid following an engine failure in qualifying, scored his first point of the season.

The Finn inherited eight place when Takuma Sato's BAR-Honda retired with engine failure with four laps to go. It was the first time Raikkonen had finished a race in 2004.

Alonso made up three places in the closing stages to grab his fourth place.

The Renault passed both Trulli and Rubens Barrichello's Ferrari with some strong driving around his stop, and then passed Ralf Schumacher in a controversial move on lap 50.

The Spaniard made a late dive inside the Williams at Tosa and the two cars collided, pushing Schumacher into a spin.

Although there will be four camps, but the BFF will be giving more focus on the tribal players who are naturally tougher than the rest.

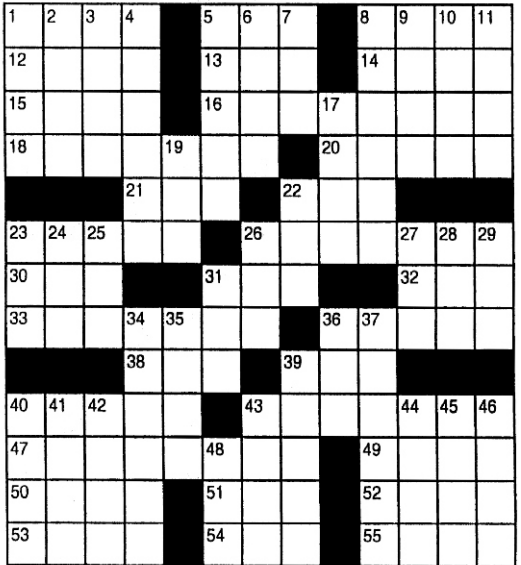
