Full use of WTO clause to yield billions

Projects CPD study on manpower exports

Bangladesh can earn around US\$ 11.57 billion a year by exporting 200,000 professionals alone, if it utilises, methodically and fully, the provisions of the WTO initiative Temporary Movement of Natural Persons' (TMNP), projects the Centre for Policy Dialogue (CPD).

The CPD research paper released at a press conference yesterday made a set of policy recommendations for Bangladesh to implement as well as to pursue in World Trade Organisation forums, including the next month's meeting in Geneva, to achieve that end.

The provision, by the fullest use of which Bangladesh can reap such a huge benefit, is enshrined in Article 9 of the Special Modalities of Negotiations on Services Trade Liberalisation for Least Developed Countries, which had been adopted

by the WTO on September 03, 2003. For that, the paper said Bangladesh needed to categorise the employment structure of its overseas workers as per the ISCO-88 (International Standard Classification of Occupation) code.

It suggests Bangladesh to pre-

pare a proposal to be placed in the WTO to add the ISCO-88 as a categorisation of service providers, like that of services. The paper titled 'Temporary Movement of Natural Persons: Identification of Opportunities for Bangladesh' also stressed developing a comprehensive plan with different time dimensions for promoting export of service providers through the TMNP.

League (AL), now agitating for snap polls, plans to boycott the race while the former BNP legislatures are also unlikely to contest. Resigning from the JS, both Mannan and Mahi joined hands with

former president Badruddoza Chowdhury and formed Bikalpa Dhara (Alternative Political Stream), as a prelude to formation of a new political party. Asked about running the polls,

Mannan, now member secretary of the political platform, averted a direct reply expressing skepticism about fairness of the election.
The EC fixed May 12 as the last

date for filing nomination papers while the same for withdrawing candidature is May 20.

Look at the sky for a celestial fiesta

People who are superstitious won't find it easy for the next month or so. If they look into the sky one night next week, they may see... a red

Blazing across the heavens will be two fiery stars -- the first comets of the Millennium that are expected to be visible by the naked eye.

Then, in June, Earth, Venus and the Sun will all be directly aligned, staging a cosmic eclipse that no human alive today has seen. Not for nothing have keen astron-

omers around the world pencilled this as the time to take their annual vacation and place nightly orders of pizza in order to devote their fullest gaze to The show kicks off on Tuesday

May 4 with a total lunar eclipse, which occurs when the Moon, the Sun and Earth are all in alignment. The Moon will slide into the cone of shadow of the Earth cast by the Sun but it will not become invisible, for it will be tinged by residual sunlight

that is deflected by Earth's atmo-

part of the spectrum, the Moon often turns coppery, orange or even brown.

"The eclipse will be widely visible from Europe, Africa, Asia and Australia," says NASA expert Fred "North America will miss the entire event, but most of South America will


witness the last stages of the eclipse

which will already be in progress at moonrise. Similarly, the Moon sets in eastern Asia and Australia during various stages of the eclipse. In easterly time zones, the date will be May 5 (total eclipse is from

1952 to 2108 GMT on May 4). Total lunar eclipses usually occur every couple of years. But planetary dynamics mean that we are right in a splurge of them: there were two in 2003 and there will be a fourth on

In the meanwhile, two major comets, both of them spotted only within the last few years, will be sliding into position for good viewing from Earth as they race past us on their elliptical track around the Sun.
