Donors to press govt for more tolerance in politics

BDF MEET

Donors at the upcoming Bangladesh Development Forum (BDF) meeting will press Dhaka to address the issue of political confrontation as they believe the government should be tolerant toward peaceful protest and respect freedom of thought, association and

In the discussion note prepared by Local Consultative Group of the BDF, the donors have expressed

support for holding the national elections in 2006 under a neutral caretaker government.

They however have criticised the 14th amendment to the constitution that deals with women's reserved seats in parliament. "Any constitutional amendments should be preceded by full consultations and widespread support. This is even more pertinent given the ruling coalition's large majority in parlia-

Stressing the importance of more constructive dialogues (between the

conflicting political parties) through democratic channels, the development partners have asked the government to respect people's right to wage new political movements or float platforms, hinting at the government's intolerance toward former president AQM Badruddoza Chowdhury's new political plat-

The donors have also expressed concern about the government's fresh application for a further extension of the time limit for the imple

Public life is under threat: says Dr Kamal

National Platform for Unity (NPU) President Dr Kamal Hossain yesterday said public life is under threat for illegal gunrunning, mass arrests, corruption, violence and price hike

The incidents of mass arrests, torture and harassment to general public in the name of resisting opposition's movement were a violation of the people's basic rights and antidemocratic, Dr Kamal said at a meeting with activists of the NPU.

Awami League's political gambling by capitalising on the public miseries is unexpected, he said, adding both the main opposition AL and ruling BNP have failed to govern the country.

"Bangladesh has become the champion of corruption and these parties should be held responsible for this humiliating position," he

"We've already done this with Sri Lanka and now we want to make similar efforts with Pakistan and Bangladesh," the prime ministersaid.

Vajpayee said his government, if voted back to power in the ongoing parliamentary elections, will press on with the peace initiatives with

ALLEGATION AGAINST PROSHIKA

Government yet to build conspiracy' case

The government is yet to gather hard evidences of the conspiracy against the state by leading NGO Proshika even after police raided its headquarters twice.

The NGO Affairs Bureau on Sunday filed a case against 12 Proshika staffincluding its President Qazi Faruque Ahmed, accusing them of financial irregularities. "They misused funds of an approved

Director General (DG) of NGO Affairs Bureau Mizanur Rahman.

The DG however said he knows nothing about allegations of Proshika's playing anti-government role, but home ministry sources said the government will continue operations to unearth the NGO's antigovernment activities and sedition charges might be pressed against it.

The government earlier filed sedition charges against two

Proshika officials but the High Court acquitted them.

Now the government is looking for ways to take stringent steps like filing more graft and sedition cases against Proshika Manobik Unnoyon Kendro, one of the largest nongovernment organisations (NGO) of the country, according to sources.

The government is also planning to have Proshika President Qazi Faruque Ahmed removed from his

Garment factories virtually become death trap for their workers in case of fire or other accidents mainly because the workers do not know how to make use of the safety measures including emergency exits, industry sources say. Lack of knowledge on the part of

workers about tackling an emer-

gency situation has rendered meaningless whatever safety measures the factories have provided. Moreover, most of the garment

factories keep their main gates locked and that is why workers cannot move out quickly even during an emergency, they pointed out. Many of the factories have emergency exits but in most of the cases
