## Some donors may quit Hasina urge all

"Some donor partners who are out there doing programmes on the ground may withdraw if the (security) situation in the areas where they are working becomes worse." Patel said.

Patel added, however, that the World Bank and the majority of donors would remain in the country working towards poverty eradication.

"There is no scenario for stopping what we are doing ... but if the situation improves the country can expect to get much more donor support," he

Representatives from 32 donor countries and agencies took part in the annual Bangladesh Development Forum in Dhaka. Prime Minister Khaleda Zia told

the donors yesterday her government was working hard to tackle many law and order problems, which she blamed on the previous govern-

She listed some of the initiatives taken as fast-track courts, rapid reaction police units and monitoring of serious crime cases by a central government cell

Our Staff Correspondent adds: Development partners yesterday called for a national consensus in the key areas of politics and governance as the government said the factors presented key barriers to faster growth in future

The donors also called upon the political leaders to resolve the root causes that contributed to confrontational politics at a press briefing at Sonargaon Hotel

"The road to Bangladesh's economic progress will be really bumpy if we continue the politics of confrontation," Finance and Planning Minister M Saifur Rahman said.

Patel said Bangladesh's growth and service delivery successes could not be sustained without resolution of the root causes of confrontational

"Many of us expressed concern that Bangladesh's dysfunctional politics may be an even sharper constraint. We urged the government to build a national consensus on the reforms most critical to poverty reduction. Our message of national consensus is a message equally targeted to the opposition," he added.

"We should not get involved in internal issues here. But the issues came up in the discussion like improving governance, law and order and infrastructure need to be addressed. Bangladesh's economy can grow six or seven or eight percent but these are the key factors for which the country is not getting desired progress," he told the brief-

"We stand by the government to provide a strong support for implementing the PRSP (Poverty Reduction Strategy Paper) programme to alleviate poverty. I was assured that different issues including security of the citizens would be looked into. No additional support will be extended if nothing is improved."

"Before the BDF meeting, an invitation to the opposition political leader was sent for a pre-consultative meeting, but we did not get any confirmation. The role of both the ruling party and the opposition political party is important. We hope all political parties will play a constructive role." he added.

On the government-NGO relations, he said in response to comments of civil society and donors, the government was re-looking into a bill that would oversee the relations.

Saifur, also a co-chair of the BDF, said: "If we don't have the confrontational politics and can internally mobilise resources, we won't have to depend on donors so much."

The donors would have got a different perception if the government and opposition party had discussed the BDF issues, he said.

There is no basic difference between the ruling party and the opposition about reforms in different areas. But it is unfortunate that when they are not in power they think nobody has the rights to be in office, "We cannot reap the harvest of

Despite being on the death row, he sings 'songs' which he has composed in his heavily-guarded condemned cell almost every day and never says his prayers unlike the other convicts. The jail officials find the songs of petty thief-turnedpowerful politician funny and often talk about them

One of his songs made way back in 1999 soon after his arrest goes like this: 'You are the puppet master. You have joint evebrows. You live in palace and I in jail.

Jail sources say his songs mainly parody his political godfathers of Jatiya Party, BNP and Awami League, some of whom he has killed.

A sombre mood hung yesterday in the Khulna District Jail that houses 2.500-plus prisoners, more than five times its capacity. At 11:00am, a doctor examined 60-kilo Ershad's health and found him fit for execution. The law stipulates that a sick convict cannot be hanged.

At midday, he met his first wife Khodeia, the sons and the daughter and asked them about the fate to his clemency petition. After they told him that the president has turned down his plea for clemency, he cried before his daughter.

Ershad then returned to his cell and had heavy lunch. "He has been eating more than what he does for the last few days," said a jail official, "normally he eats two plates of rice But recently he is eating double that quantity." He took a nap in the

"The jail guards try to keep him cheerful," said an official, "and he tells them tales of his good old days when he used to cruise around on a steamer with politicians and movie actresses."

Frshad's sister Selina meanwhile told the press that after his arrest Ershad spent crores of taka bribing six politicians, a dozen journalists, a number of police officers and 35 businesspeople.

She also claimed that two of the politicians belong to the BNP and four to Awami League and that two of them have been killed Selina said she had lobbied with political godfathers for his release, but they drove her out. "A leader in Bagerhat was given seven lakh taka and a car and a leader in Dhaka was given eight crore taka," she claimed.

A major chunk of Ershad's illgotten money -- which is more than Tk 100 crore -- remains frozen at various banks since his arrest. But an account of Ershad's wife with Tk

Hasina mentioned the names of other slain AL leaders such as former MP Momtaz Uddin Ahmed of Natore. Adv Monzurul Imam of Khulna and Samsul Islam Suruj of Lalmonirhat.

## Scientists claim

University (ANU) have become the first on this particular planet to demonstrate the sharing of secrets via teleportation using quantum

Who cares? Well, a lot of big businesses. because their discovery has moved unbreakable codes, superfast computers and communications inaccessible to cybercriminals a step closer.

What the team's find hoils down to is that, using a laser, they can teleport to a network of recipients a signal which can only be reassembled by a majority of the recipients. Any less and the signal cannot be reconstituted.

The team's leader. Chinese-born Ping Koy Lam, was building on work done by the university in 2002, when they teleported information using a laser beam.

But Ping described the latest achievement as "a much more complex form of information teleportation in the sense that it involves multiple recipients."

Teleportation is defined as the production, disembodiment and successful reconstruction of a signal, which in this case was a high frequency sound to three participants. The message in the future may be spoken or typed.

The researchers used crystals. lenses and mirrors to produce a pair of "entangled" laser beams that are then used to carry fragile information in the form of quantum states.

"These quantum states cannot be measured or copied, making eavesdropping impossible." Lance said in a statement released by the university. "The transmission of the light beams constitutes a secret communication scheme with guaranteed security.

The process of secret sharing is

said to be a fundamental part of present day telecommunication, computer and banking practices.

Such network communication can be enhanced using the laws of quantum physics to protect the information, a process called quantum state sharing.

"The benefit of this technology is that the encrypted message can only be decoded by a majority of recipients.

"For example, if an encrypted message was sent to a spy network containing 15 individuals, a minimum of eight agents would be needed to access the message limiting the chances of the message being infiltrated or deleted by a double-agent."

The ANU team spent more than a year working through their theory, which has been published in the latest edition of the scientific journal Physical Review Letters, then proving it worked on a large tabletop apparatus, involving multiple lasers, mirrors, lenses and computers in the optics laboratory.

The work was performed at the ANU by Chinese-born Ping Koy Lam, Belgian post-doctoral researcher Thomas Symul and Australian doctoral student Andrew Lance in collaboration with professor Barry Sanders of Canada's University of Calgary.
