

City breeding epidemic by not treating excreta

Wasa can meet only 10pc of Dhaka's sewerage needs

The capital runs the risk of raging epidemics with its groundwater being increasingly infested with hordes of disease germs from untreated human excreta, a seminar in the city said yesterday.

The Dhaka Water and Sewerage Authority (Wasa) currently can meet only 10 percent of the city's sewerage service needs, it was also revealed.

Bangladesh Paribesh Andolan (Bapa), an environment watchdog, organised the seminar on 'Method and Management of Converting the Excreta into Resources' in the seminar room of the civil engineering department of Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology (Buet).

The city's lack of means to treat excreta of its 10 million dwellers has given rise to a very high-risk health and hygiene situation, the seminar

participants observed.

Managing Director of Dhaka Wasa ANH Akther Hossain said, "Recently a number of extremely harmful viruses and bacteria, including *Escherichia coli*, have been detected on several occasions in the groundwater of Old Dhaka."

Escherichia coli, commonly known as *E. coli*, is a rod-shaped bacterium which inhabits and attacks the large intestine of both

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Rumsfeld makes surprise Iraq trip

2 US soldiers, 3 Iraqis killed in clashes

US Defence Secretary Donald Rumsfeld yesterday made a surprise visit to Baghdad, flying into the eye of the storm over Americans torturing prisoners that has sapped Washington's credibility in Iraq.

Hours after US lawmakers viewed "sadistic" new photographs of US troops torturing Iraqis, the embattled secretary met Lieutenant General Ricardo Sanchez, the US commander in Iraq, and Major General Geoffrey Miller, the new head of US prisons there.

Iraqi prisoners gave US Defence Secretary Donald Rumsfeld a frosty reception when he toured the nearby Abu Ghraib jail. Hundreds of

Iraqi security detainees watched from behind a concertina-wire perimeter fence as Rumsfeld toured the facility in a Rhino Runner armoured vehicle.

Some of the prisoners gestured a thumbs-down to their surprise visitor; others held aloft a tattered Iraqi flag. Most stood in silence with their arms folded as they were paraded for their US guest.

His trip looked like a robust answer to critics who say Rumsfeld, one of the architects of the Iraq war, should resign, six months before President George W. Bush seeks re-election.

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Change of power in India won't affect ties: FM

Foreign Minister Morshed Khan yesterday welcomed Indian people's electoral verdict for a new government, saying that Bangladesh will work together with whoever holds power in New Delhi.

In his initial reaction to reporters over the Indian election results, he said Dhaka-New Delhi bilateral relations would not be affected with any change of power in India.

"India is our neighbour and we attach much importance to our relation -- we are willing to work together with whatever party forms the government, for the benefit of the two peoples and South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation (Saarc)," Khan said.

Fertiliser traders decry fare hike by light cargo vessels

Bangladesh Fertiliser Association (BFA) yesterday protested the arbitrary fare hike by the light cargo vessels which carry bulk items from the outer anchorage of Chittagong Port.

The vessel owners almost doubled the charges on different routes without any convincing reason and new rates were made effective from May 7, alleged Kofil Uddin Ahmed, chairman of BFA, and one of leading fertiliser importers, Ainal Haque, were also present.

The association leaders alleged that the vessel owners also imposed a number of pre-conditions which, they believe, will create problems in transportation of goods from one place to another. The new system stipulates that an importer will have to pay 60 percent of the fare in advance and the rest on delivery of the goods, they explained.

The association demanded reasonable rates and feared, other-

wise, the retail fertiliser prices will go up significantly.

"The lighter cargo vessel owners increased the bulk item-carrying charges without discussion with the government or any other organisations related to the export-import business," Kofil said.

Mosharraf Hossain, director (import) of BFA, and one of leading fertiliser importers, Ainal Haque, were also present.

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"In the past, we used to pay the

charges on transportation and delivery of goods," Kofil said.

The vessel owners, however, told The Daily Star that they grounded the hiked charges on impending monsoon season when sailing in rough weather is risky. They maintained that the charges were increased only 15 percent, but would be reduced again during winter.

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"By introducing the new rates, we are trying to establish a system in the trade, diminishing middlemen," said Kofil.

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New images shock US lawmakers

UK set to dismiss prison pictures as fake

Members of the US Congress saw new images of violence and sexual humiliation from a US-run Iraqi prison on Wednesday in a closed viewing one lawmaker likened to a descent into "the wings of hell."

Lawmakers said images showed inmates apparently being coerced to commit sodomy, wounds possibly from dog bites, a number of dead bodies, and examples of "sadistic torture" and "sexual humiliation."

Some top Republicans urged that the still pictures and video not be released publicly, saying they could endanger US forces overseas.

"What we saw is appalling. It is consistent with the photos that you've seen in the press to date. They go beyond that in many ways in terms of the various activities that are depicted," said Senate Majority Leader Bill Frist, a Tennessee Republican.



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BCL activist shot dead; father, brother hurt in JCD attack

An activist of Bangladesh Chhatra League (BCL) was shot dead and his father and elder brother were injured in an armed attack on their house allegedly by Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD) cadres at Amtoli village in Bhojpur Union of Fatikchhari upazila early yesterday.

Witnesses said seven armed men attacked the house of Saleh Ahmed and shot his two sons--BCL leader Mohammad Zakaria and BCL activist Osman Gani--as they came out of their house.

Both were rushed to Chittagong Medical College Hospital where doctors declared Osman dead, police said.

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Tk 11 lakh mugged in Ctg

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12 killed in Gaza raid

Israel killed 12 Palestinians in southern Gaza yesterday after back-to-back ambushes claimed the lives of 11 of its soldiers in the worst blow to the Middle East's mightiest army in two years.

The new spiral of violence intensified debate between proponents and opponents of Israeli Prime Minister Ariel Sharon's plan to evacuate settlers from Gaza, now stalled by rightist hard-liners in his own Likud party.

Witnesses said 11 Palestinians, four of them militants, were killed in helicopter missile strikes in Rafah refugee camp, near the area where militants blew up an explosives-packed truck carrier on Wednesday. Five soldiers in the vehicle were killed.

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
