Made in dream factory

What is a dream? Just ask Fidel Henderson Edwards because for this 22-year-old Bajan, they keep coming true over and over again. He had played only one first-class game when in mid-2003, Brian Lara saw something very special about this slight in stature round-arm yet pacey youngster when he was bowling to the West Indies batsmen during a practice session in Barbados. A call-up followed and the rest as they say, is history. 5/34 on Test debut against Sri Lanka at Jamaica gave the Windies a series win. In his first away match, He took 5/133 against Zimbabwe and given his first one-day international outing, ran through Zimbabwe with 6/22 including a wicket off his first legitimate delivery. Edwards comes from the same Boscobel village that has produced West Indies pacemen like his half-brother Pedro Collins and Corey Collymore before him but is fast developing as the leader of the pace resurgence, although his innate modesty won't allow him to admit that. RABEED IMAM Of Daily Star Sport spoke to Edwards, 'Castro' to his mates, at the Queen's Park Stadium in Grenada on Saturday.

Daily Star Sport (DSS): Your breaking into the West Indies side was like a fairytale. Tell us how it all

Fidel Edwards (FE): I was at the academy for three months then I was with the Barbados team but never got a game, mostly through injury. Then while I was at the practice with the West Indies team in Barbados, Brian (Lara) saw me and I got the call up.

DSS: Did you bowl to him?

FE: I just bowled about three balls to him. But I had bowled to the other DSS: Those three balls to Lara

must have been pretty quick? FE: They were at a good pace I guess. I can't tell you they were

pretty quick. Just about at the normal pace I bowl. DSS: What was your reaction when you first heard that you have

been called up for the second Test? FE: I felt very happy. Being called up was such a surprise for me. At

first I thought it was a dream. DSS: Five wickets on home debut, five wickets in first away Test and six wickets on one-day interna-

tional debut. You must be running

FE: Yeah, the dreams are real. I just hope I can carry on from where I'd left off, get a lot fitter and do whatever I have to do.

'He should've sued PCB'

Pakistani cricket legend Imran Khan lashed out at Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) for challenging the integrity" of express pacer Shoaib Akhtar by holding an inquiry into his injury in last month's deciding Test against India.

"They (the PCB) have challenged the integrity of Akhtar by having a medical inquiry even though Akhtar's medical reports confirmed he was injured," said Imran, a veteran of 82 Tests and 175 one-day games for Pakistan who is now following a career in politics.

"Had I been in place of Akhtar I would have sued the PCB for defamation," he told reporters here Saturday.

PCB set up a medical commission to probe whether Akhtar

feigned an injury during the third and final Test against India at Rawalpindi last month.

Akhtar fell in his follow-through and did not take field on the third day of the crucial Test but batted without any sign of discomfort on the follow-

Rival wicketkeepers Brendon McCullum and Geraint Jones presented a powerful argument on Saturday for the value of stumpers with genuine batting credentials.

McCullum, who succeeded Robbie Hart in the New Zealand team, scored an unbeaten 72 at number three on Saturday to keep the Kiwis afloat in the first Test against England at Lord's. His combative innings followed a valuable knock by Jones, who

contributed 46 to a seventh-wicket

partnership of 105 with Andy Flintoff

in England's first innings 441. With McCullum also making the highest score of his fledgling Test career, New Zealand were 134 for one at the close of play. Both players progressed to their national teams because of their batting ability. After replacing Hart, McCullum scored two 50s in the drawn three-Test series against South Africa for an average of 36.75
