RMG sector sends SOS to

Madrasa man with 'Taliban link' under sharp watch

JULFIKAR ALI MANIK, from Sylhet

A madrasa principal with a history of working to establish a Taliban-style rule in Bangladesh came under sharp intelligence watch in the wake of Friday's bomb blast at Hazrat Shahjalal Shrine in Sylhet.

Mowlana M Habibur Rahman, who runs Jameya Madania Madrasa in Kazirpar in the northeastern district, is believed to have had close ties to the now-routed Taliban in Afghanistan for years and travelled to the southwestern Asian country during its Islamic militant rule, sources say.

Police turned the spotlight of investigation on several Islamic institutions, including Rahman's, after the bomb blast injured British High Commissioner to Bangladesh Anwar Choudhury and killed three.

A special bulletin, Islamic Revolution, published Rahman's interview in 1998 after he returned from Afghanistan.

3 days gone, no rescuer comes for **MV** Digonto

While all eyes were focussed on MV Lighting Sun, one of the two launches capsized in a stormy Meghna Sunday, no salvage operation commenced for the other motorboat, MV Digonto, three days into its sinking.

Abul Hossain Peyada, a leading businessman of Gournadi, told The Daily Star yesterday morning, "We have decided to block the Barisal-Dhaka Highway and close Gournadi and Torki river-ports, if the salvage operation of Digonto does not start

A twister caught the 125-foot double-decker vessel and overturned it in an area between the river-ports of Ekhlaspur and Kanudia at 3:30am Sunday, 12 hours after it had left Torki of Gournadi upazila for Narayanganj with about 60 passengers on board. Witnesses claim at least 40 passengers of the launch remain missing.

Scotland Yard team leaves Sylhet

Police nab 3, hunt a suspected beggar

The three-member Scotland Yard team left Sylhet yesterday afternoon, after a two-day investigation into the Friday's bomb blast at Hazrat Shahjalal Shrine, while police nabbed three and were busy hunting a shrine beggar.

Before their departure, the British criminal investigators held a one-hour meeting from 12 noon with Deputy Inspector General (DIG) of Police, Sylhet Range Ali nam Chowdhury in his office.

Rescue ships lack 15 more bodies salvation ability

The capacity and equipment of the two rescue ships -- Rustam and Hamza -- prove to be too inadequate to cope with salvation of sunken launches.

Each of these two ships can lift only 60 tons and together they can rescue vessels weighing up to 120 tons. Most big launches plying the major routes weigh close to 1,000

22 NGOs spotted for fund theft

The primary and mass education ministry has blacklisted 22 nongovernmental organisations (NGOs) and relieved 40 others of their designated tasks for low performance and alleged fund embez-

A meeting of the parliamentary standing committee on primary and mass education ministry at the Jatiya Sangsad Bhaban, revealing the latest development, recommended stern action against the NGOs, including money refund,

registration cancellation and legal action, if necessary.

"The ministry has warned other NGOs to make them work better. If they fail, they will also be blacklisted," Professor Jahan Ara Begum, advisor to Prime Minister Khaleda Zia on mass and primary education, told The Daily Star after the meeting.

Ministry officials told the meeting that the local NGOs in 23 districts were designated to provide educational material, teachers' salary, training and furniture for teaching centres, but the quality of SEE PAGE 11 COL 8

PM, WB president meet in Shanghai


World Bank President James D Wolfensohn has highly appreciated Bangladesh's success in microcredit programme and said the success can be a role model for other countries of the world.
