Robbers take businessman Caribbean flood toll nears 2,000

The death toll from devastating floods and landslides in Haiti and the Dominican Republic rose to at least 1,950 on Wednesday with the discovery of more than 1,000 bodies in a Haitian town.

The toll rose dramatically when the bodies were found in Mapou, a rural southeastern Haitian town where communications are poor, said Margareth Martin, the head of the civil protection office for Haiti's Southeast region.

Rescue workers dug through mud and debris for bodies three days after torrential rains sent rivers of mud and swirling waters through

shared by Haiti and the Dominican Republic

Haiti's death toll stood at 1,660, including 1,000 in Mapou, 500 elsewhere in Haiti's Southeast region, 158 in the riverside town of Fond Verettes, and two in the south, at Port-a-Piment.

Authorities in the neighboring Dominican Republic said they had recovered 300 bodies, mostly from the disaster in Jimani near the Haitian border, where a river overflowed its banks before dawn and swept homes away as people slept.

In Haiti, troops from a US-led peacekeeping force flew helicopter loads of bottled water, fruit and bread to the town of Fond Verette where the storm washed out the winding mountainside road from Port-au-Prince and cut off ground transportation to the town of 40,000,

The floodwaters flattened fields of crops and ripped apart crude shacks fashioned from sticks and sheets of iron. Residents pulled furniture and other belongings from the streets, where they had been swept by the flood, and assembled mud-caked possessions in stacks along the sides of the roads.

BOU students in Masrurul made textbook trouble

Students of BA and BSS fifth semester of Bangladesh Open University (BOU) are yet to get their textbooks about five months after the semester began.

Another student who works a the Secretariat alleged, " Since the first semester, we never received our textbooks in time due to indifference of the BOU authorities."

We go to Dhaka Regional Centre office for textbooks, but officials there ask students to copy textbooks from their respective teaching centres."

Many other students also alleged the BOU authorities show indifference to their problem despite repeated reminders.

The BOU authorities are supposed to supply books on political science, sociology, Islamic studies, philosophy, history and geography in the current semester, they men-

Iraq cleric offers truce, US silent

Three Marines killed in action

AGENCIES, Najaf/Baghdad

Moqtada al-Sadr pulled his Shia militia from strongholds in Najaf yesterday and a US-appointed Iraqi official said American forces had agreed to a truce offered by the radical cleric in the holy city.

But U.S. officials in Iraq refused to say whether they would accept a deal which would mean withdrawing from the city without meeting their previous conditions -- that Sadr be arrested and that he completely disband his Mehdi Army guerrilla force.

Hundreds of Mehdi Army fighters left frontline positions to parade in the city centre while three Shia members of Iraq's Governing Council, including Ahmad Chalabi, held talks with aides to Sadr in an attempt to negotiate an end to

Chalabi said the U.S.-led admin-

istration had given tentative approval to a ceasefire and there would be more negotiations on the ground with commanders of the U.S. 1st Armoured Division. "The momentum of a ceasefire is

already there," said Chalabi, a former U.S. favourite who has criticised the military offensive against Sadr's men in the holy city.

Iraq's U.S.-appointed national security adviser, Mowaffaq al-Rubaie, said Sadr had agreed that fighters not normally resident in Najaf would return to their homes and had demanded in return the suspension of a murder warrant on which he is wanted.

Sadr also called on U.S. forces to stay in bases near Najaf.
