Mob damages 40 vehicles

Three people were killed in separate road accidents in the capital yesterday, sparking violent crowd protests in Fulbaria and Malibagh

A speeding bus knocked down Abul Hossain, 35, an employee of a Fulbaria under Motijheel Police Station early in the morning. He was admitted to Dhaka Medical College Hospital where he died,

Angry shopkeepers of City Super Market took to the street at about 9:00am protesting Abul's death. Transport workers of Fulbaria bus stand pelted brickbats at the procession, prompting a series of chase and counter-chase between shopkeepers and trans-

However, transport workers alleged that shop employees indiscriminately pelted at them from market rooftop, injuring at least 13

Experts warn against centralised school student assessment

Educationists yesterday expressed concern over the potential pitfalls, including dropout, of a centralised evaluation system the primary and mass education ministry plans to introduce to the students of classes

The ministry that organised a workshop on the issue at the Directorate of Primary Education believes the centralised evaluation system like SSC and HSC examinations will raise the quality of primary education.

But Professor Moniruzzaman Miah, chairman of the National Education Commission, told the inaugural session of the workshop: "Policymakers should make sure these examinations do not become

out at the primary level.'

"The exams should aim at evaluating whether students achieved desired qualifications at the primary level," said Professor Miah, former vice-chancellor of Dhaka University, adding the objectives of the two examinations need clarification

"The failure of students in exams discourages their parents from sending them to school, especially in rural areas.

He doubted whether the existing primary education management would be able to hold such large-scale examinations across the country.

"We need to consider whether teachers can hold such public

said Rasheda K Chowdhury, director of the Campaign for Popular Education, a non-governmental

"Before going for public exams at the primary level, the government should ensure five teachers for as many classrooms in every primary school," she added. She also emphasised the need for keeping educational institutions out of politics for better education.

Nazrul Islam, director general of the Directorate of Primary Education, said: "If we fail to raise the quality of education in rural areas, education will be urbancentred.

BTRC acts to end telecoms interconnection hitch

Telecoms watchdog Bangladesh Telecommunication Regulatory Commission (BTRC) has prepared a guideline to resolve the nagging interconnection issue blamed for stunting the growth of 'standard telecommunications' in the coun-

The guideline has been sent to the authorities concerned for gazette notification, the chairman of the telecoms regulator said.

Standard telecommunications according to UN telecoms body International Telecommunications Union (ITU), means mobile phones that allow

"It was a vital issue to resolve the interconnection problem before the new PSTN (Public Switched Telephone Network) operators launch their service," BTRC Chairman Syed Marghub Murshed told The Daily Star yesterday.

PSTN is a technical jargon for fixed phone connectivity.

The proposed guideline recom-mends that every incumbent fixed and cell-phone operator should have adequate interconnection from the commencement of ser-

About 90 percent of the coun-

try's 2,300,000 cell phone connections only offer 'mobile-to-mobile access due to lack of interconnec-tion, a system that enables one telecoms operator to connect its subscribers to another through an

Bangladesh's teledensity is the lowest in South Asia with only 1.56 of 100 people having access to telecoms facility, according to the ITU. The figure rises to 2.15 per 100 phone if mobile-to-mobile con-nections are included. A standard phone should have both cell-phone and mainframe fixed phone connectivity, according to ITU

2 GIs, 2 Iraqis die in attacks

US troops clashed yesterday with Shia militiamen in fighting that killed two US soldiers and strained a ceasefire called last week around the holy cities of Kufa and Najaf. In Baghdad, a car bomb exploded near US coalition headquarters, killing at least two people and injuring more than 20.

Two other American soldiers died over the weekend in separate attacks, the US military said.

Ambulances rushed to the ene of the blast in Baghdad's Harithiyah district, about half a

Governing Council, Izzadine Saleem, was assassinated in a car bombing May 17. It was not clear whether yesterday's bombing was caused by a suicide attacker.

The blast showered the area with debris and bits of human flesh. At least one body lay on the street, covered with plastic sheets. US troops fired into the air to disperse the crowds

"It felt like our house was lifted into the air and came down with a bang," said resident Faleh Hassan. Hours later, US troops blocked a


Crusaders observe anti-tobacco day

FM reaches Delhi with PM's letters

Foreign Minister M Morshed Khan yesterday promised to look to the future after his arrival in New Delhi on a four-day goodwill visit amid indications that Bangladesh and India may shed the baggage of the

Prime Minister Khaleda Zia's special envoy, Morshed told reporters that all bilateral issues with India could be solved through

He was carrying two separate letters from Khaleda for Prime Minister Manmohan Singh and Congress President Sonia Gandhi 'expressing desire to work with them for "a better future for South

Asia and its people" and inviting both the Indian leaders to visit Bangladesh

On whether "illegal immigration" from Bangladesh and "presence of Indian insurgents" there -the issues raised by India in the past -- would figure in talks with the Indian leadership, Morshed said: "Nitty-gritty of such subjects

would not come up for discussion.' His visit marks the first high political-level interaction with the new Indian leadership.

"At times differences crop up even among brothers. But as brothers, we should solve them amicably through discussion." he said.

Asked to comment on the issues to be sorted out with India, he said without going into specifics:

"There is no issue which cannot be solved through dialogue.

The visiting foreign minister said regional, international and other issues of bilateral interest would come up for deliberations with Indian leaders.

Morshed said agreements would be of little value unless mindsets are changed, adding: We should not sweep issues under the carpet and rather place them on the table."

South Asian countries should chart a new roadmap for development of the region, he said. "The full potential of Saarc (South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation) is yet to be tapped and this could be done by further

Hasina, also president of the Awami League (AL), was addressing the opening session of the triennial conference of Dhaka district Jubo League, youth front of the main opposition party, at Mahanagar Natya Mancha in Dhaka. Pegging the government as

'communalist terrorists', she said: "The entire country is now hostage to criminals patronised by the government.

She accused the BNP-Jamaat coalition of transforming the peaceful country into a land of
