SC upholds HC stay order

The Supreme Court (SC) yesterday rejected the appeal petition the Election Commission filed against the High Court (HC) stay order on Dhaka-10 parliamentary by-poll, ending the prospect of June 6 election to the seat.

The SC full bench headed by Chief Justice Syed JR Modassir Husain upheld the HC stay order or the high-profile election symbol dispute case after three days of hectic hearing.

The bench directed both parties to move to the High Court which will now hold a hearing on June 12 on its rule upon the Election Commission and the returning officer (RO).

Security concerns to be addressed, says Morshed

Bangladesh and India have agreed to address each other's security concerns and sought to dispel the perception that a bilateral free trade agreement was off, said Foreign Minister M Morshed Khan yesterday.

"We have to change the mindset and address the issues and sensitivities of each other. Security issues of both sides need to be addressed," Morshed said, a day after his wideranging talks with Indian Prime Minister Manmohan Singh, External Affairs Minister Natwar Singh, Congress President Sonia Gandhi and other senior leaders.

Terming his talks with the Indian leaders friendly, he said: "The ambience was great and friendly. The attitude was not of confrontation but of cooperation.'

Delhi offers to double diesel export to Dhaka

India yesterday offered to double diesel exports to Bangladesh to help ease a 2.3 million tonnes shortfall of petroleum a year, but Dhaka did not make any commitment to selling natural gas to its biggest potential

At a meeting between Bangladesh's visiting Foreign Minister M Morshed Khan and Indian Petroleum and Natural Gas Minister Mani Shankar Aiyar in New Delhi, India offered 60,000 tonnes of diesel a month from next year.

"We are looking at the potential for larger cooperation (with India) as our requirement (of diesel) is SEE PAGE 11 COL 7 : going up. I will leave it to the officials

Morshed told reporters after the

The state-run Indian Oil Corporation is supplying 230,000 tonnes of diesel to Bangladesh Petroleum Corporation (BPC) over April-December this year.

India has offered to supply 0.7 million tonne diesel a year on a fiveyear contract beginning in 2005. Morshed, now on a goodwill visit

to India, said: "If we have exportable surplus, if Bangladesh (ever) exports natural gas, India is the natural choice because of the proximity."

Dhaka included in pvt landline operations

Telecoms regulator Bangladesh Telecommunications Regulatory Commission (BTRC) has decided to clear the way for private operators to launch fixed phone service in capital Dhaka setting aside a

dispute with WorldTel BangladeshLimited. The capital has been out of bounds to the licensing process for fresh fixed phones, technically known as Public Switched Telephone Network (PSTN), in the wake of a dispute with WorldTel that obtained licence to run fixed phones in the capital in

"We hope to open Dhaka to private operators to run fixed phone service," a key BTRC official told The Daily Star. An announcement will be made in this month to enable private operators to apply for fixed phone licence, said the official, speaking on condition of ano-

WorldTel Bangladesh served a

legal notice on the Ministry of Post and Telecommunications in early January asking it not to open up Dhaka city to the other com-panies. But the huge unmet demand for fixed phones in the capital has prompted BTRC to

decide otherwise.

WorldTel, however, has also agreed to commence service in the capital to run 300,000 fixed phones on a build-operate-own

Earlier, the BTRC awarded Bashundhara Communication & Network Limited (BCNL) first licence to run fixed-line phone services in four zones except

central zone on May 13. The BTRC has segmented the country into five zones namely Central, South-East, North-East, South-West and North-West zones. It awarded licences for four zones except the central zone comprising Dhaka city, Jinjira, Savar, Narayanganj district headquarters, Gazipur district headquarters and Tongi.

Police hunt on for Ctg training camp mastermind

The police kicked off a hunt for a madrasha teacher for his suspected links to a clandestine arms training centre in the hilly Hathazari area yesterday, a day after uncovering the camp believed to be of an Islamist outfit.

Police said they were looking for Mir Anis, teacher of a local women's madrasha and the cousin of a state minister, for running the Alipur camp allegedly of Harkatul Jihad as its director.

Police believe the arrest of Anis and two trainers appointed by him to the camp of madrasha students would help them

unpack the mystery. Two suspects -- Mohammad


Iskander and Enamul Hug arrested after the sweep of the training centre, were placed on five-day remand by a local court yesterday.

Hathazari police said they found out some important leads, but declined to give details in the interest of investigation.

Sources said the local police were under pressure from higher quarters to suppress the issue.

Police uncovered the training facility on Tuesday and seized 24 dummy Ak-47 rifles, spears, a pair of binoculars, tents and other training equipment from there.

Sources said the arrestees might be taken to Dhaka for questioning by a joint interroga
