
Living in death traps

NOAB slams new duty

The Newspaper Owners Association of Bangladesh (NOAB) has strongly protested the pro-posed increase in import duty on newsprint in the proposed budget from 22.55 percent to 25 percent at a time when the newspaper indus-try is already struggling hard to

In a statement on behalf of the NOAB Executive Committee, President Mahfuz Anam and Vice-President Golam Sarwar feared the new tax proposals would substantially increase the cost of newsprint and seriously affect the newspaper industry and those working in it as

Rab at ZIA to check terror threats, human trafficking

The home ministry yesterday ordered deployment of Rapid Action Battalion (RAB) at Zia International Airport (ZIA) to check human trafficking and carry out primary probe into any possible terror activity.

Currently, 19 intelligence and security agencies are deployed at ZIA, but they proved largely inef-

A meeting at the ministry with State Minister for Home Affairs Lutfozzaman Babar in chair made the decision.

The minister said if any citizen goes abroad using fake passport and visa, he or she is subject to harassment and deportation. Such an event also tarnishes the image of the country, he told the meeting.

Babar instructed the elite force to monitor the ZIA and inform authorities prior to any possible terrorist attack.

The government is ready to stop people travelling abroad with fake passport and visa, Babar said, adding, they are serious to check human trafficking.

Home Secretary Omar Farooq, inspector general of police (IGP), chief of RAB Anwarul Iqbal and high officials were present.

The US on Monday blacklisted Bangladesh among 10 nations for failing to adequately fight international sex trafficking, opening the way for possible sanctions.

It said Bangladesh is not doing enough to combat human trafficking and will be subjected to sanc tions unless the country demonstrably improve its records by

Tourist plan in critical ecological areas in Cox's Bazar rejected

An inter-ministerial meeting yesterday rejected a proposal to hand over two ecologically critical areas in Cox's Bazar to Bangladesh Parjatan Corporation (BPC) for building exclusive tourist centres.

The Ministry of Civil Aviation and Tourism made the proposal to hand over to the BPC the tiny Sonadia and Cheradia islands but the inter-ministerial meet turned it down to protect the bio-diversity and reserve forests of the two areas,

meeting placed sources said. Sonadia, an island of 2,965.37 acres of land located in Kutubihum under Moheshkhali upazila of Cox's Bazar, has already been officially declared an ecologically

Some 2,122 acres of the total land have been given to Forest Department for developing reserve forest. The island already has natural forest on 1200 acres and another 400 acres have been brought under afforestation.

Cheradia comprising 18.70 acres of land is part of Saint Martin's Island. It is a coral sanctuary having 89 species of fish and no human habitation on it.

LGRD and Cooperatives Minister Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan attended the meeting as chief guest while State Minister for Civil Aviation and Tourism Mir Mohammad Nasiruddin chaired it.

State Minister for Environment and Forest Jafrul Islam Chowdhury, State Minister for Land Ukil Abdus Sattar and high

officials of the ministries of LGRD and Cooperatives, communications, home, land, finance, environment, energy, shipping and cultural affairs and the BPC attended the meeting.

The two state ministers had a debate over the proposal for building tourism centres, the sources

The state minister for environment opposed the proposal and said his ministry has declared 965.37 acres of land in Sonadia island an ecologically critical area and the process is on to declare it as

a reserve forest. He mentioned the environment ministry with financial assistance from Global Environment Facility (GEF) has been implementing since 2002 an eight-year-project to

protect the forests and biodiversity of entire Saint Martin's Island, Sonadia, Cox's Bazar and Teknaf beaches and Hakaluki

Jafrul said Sonadia island is rich in mangrove forest and is a sanctuary of guest birds and sea tortoise. The environment ministry has taken steps to conserve its ecosystem, forest and overall environ-

Moreover, the ministry is implementing a project with ecotourism component, he said, adding there is no need to build a tourism centre there.

But Nasiruddin argued the island has bright prospect for

Tk 2.738-cr supplementary budget passed

Home, defence ministries take lion's share

The Jatiya Sangsad yesterday approved a Tk 2,738-crore supplementary budget for the current fiscal, with home and defence ministries coming off as the two highest additional revenue spend-

The extra expenditures were made in around 60 sectors under 44 ministries and departments. Of them, 14 ministries needed the money for development schemes.

"Budget revision is nothing new in Bangladesh. During the Awami League regime, the government used to demand even bigger supplementary budget," said Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman in his concluding speech in the House on the supplementary budget.

He reported that the Tk 51,980crore original budget for fiscal year 2003-04 ultimately came down to

An advanced team of Singapore is now in the capital. The team held meetings with Bangladesh officials to finalise the details of the tour

The official talks between the two sides are expected to take place on June 24. Prime Minister Khaleda Zia will host a banquet for her Singaporean counterpart Goh

During the visit, Goh is scheduled to call on President Iajuddin Ahmed.

Two suspects held for attack on Tarana

Dhaka Metropolitan Police yester-day held two alleged leaders of an organised gang of thieves in the capital, suspecting their involve-ment in the attack on TV artiste Tarana Halim.

The detainees are leaders of notorious Akkas-Nantu gang of syndicated burglars, police said.

Sub-Inspector Mostaq Hossain, investigation officer of the case, said they nabbed Akkas in Jigatola and Nantu in Mirpur in pre-dawn raids

"We've arrested Akkas and Nantu as Tarana suspect they might have attacked her to avenge handing over of some gang mem-bers to police when they looted her gold ornaments two months back, he added.

Tarana suffered cuts in her fingers when three masked crimi-nals knifed her in her parents' house in Dhanmondi early

Abducted man rescued from DU hall, JCD men held

Police yesterday rescued an abducted man and arrested three students including a Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD) leader from Surya Sen Hall of Dhaka University (DU).

Acting on a tip off, a team of Ramna police carried out a predawn raid on the hall and rescued Ranju Ahmed Khan Bashar, a resident of Pallabi, from room No. 2004. Police also arrested Kamal Mahmud Shohag, a JCD leader of the hall, Al-Mamun and Shafiullah.

Sources said some JCD leaders including Shanta of Salimullah Hall and Salahuddin and Sohel of Surya Sen Hall abducted Bashar and beat him up at room No. 211 of the hall. They demanded Tk 50,000 for his release and threatened his family members to kill him if they did otherwise.

Bashar, who owed money to Mamun, went to the DU hall for the sum when the JCD leaders confined him in a room, the sources

Bashar's family, meanwhile, learnt about his fate and informed SEE PAGE 11 COL 5

Ankara wins OIC top post race

Turkey's Ihsanoglu bags 32, SQ Chowdhury and Malyasia's Agam bag 12 votes each

Bangladesh lost its bid for secretary-general of the Organisation of Islamic Conference (OIC) late Tuesday night despite its muchtalked-about 'strong' campaign, as Turkey's candidate Ekmeleddin Ihsanoglu was elected with 32 of 56

Bangladesh's candidate Salauddin Quader Chowdhury and Malaysia's Tan Sri Hasmy Ágam received 12 votes each in the election where all member countries, except for Guinea-Bissau, were

As Ihsanoglu was short of six

votes to get a two-thirds majority needed to win, Bangladesh and Malaysia decided to withdraw and allow him to hold the post for a four-year term from January next

"The Bangladesh candidate was the first to announce his withdrawal," Egyptian Foreign Minister Ahmad Maher, who proposed the formula of withdrawal, told AFP.

The OIC members voted on the second day of the International Conference of Foreign Ministers largest city of Turkey.

Elected rather than selected by

consensus as before, Ihsanoglu, a 61-year-old historian, will succeed Morocco's Abdelwahed Belkeziz, whose mandate expires at the end

"It is the first time that the OIC has voted in a secret ballot to elect its secretary general," AFP quoted Turkish Foreign Minister Abdullah Gul as saying and describing it as a sign of democratisation.

The result came as a shock to Bangladesh that launched a oneand-a-half-year campaign, with Foreign Minister M Morshed Khan repeatedly claiming that

How they see Dhaka's defeat

Different political parties, former diplomats and social organisations have slated the government for what they said is wasting an opportunity for Bangladesh to secure the post of secretary-general of the Organisation of Islamic Conference (OIC) by nominating a controversial person' for the post.

The government's 'misdirected and failed' foreign policy deprived Bangladesh of the prestigious post It wasted state funds on the campaign for an 'unacceptable candidate' and tarnished the image of the country, they said.

Leader of the Opposition in the Jatiya Sangsad and Awami League (AL) President Sheikh Hasina said Due to narrow political considerations, the coalition government nominated an unacceptable candidate, who is anti-liberation and is accused of unlawful activities. That is why Bangladesh could not secure the post, she added.

The former prime minister said during the tenure of the AL government, they had received assurances from the OIC about B a n g l a d e s h
