Tests go haywire as substandard chemicals used

A restriction on import of 12 categories of lab chemicals prompted widespread use of low-grade substances in private diagnostic laboratories and hospitals, leading to false and inaccurate diagnoses.

Brokers have allegedly been smuggling in adulterated chemicals to supply them to the wholesalers in Hatkhola and BMA Bhaban on Topkhana Road since the restriction was slapped in March after over 100 people died from drinking methanol for addiction about four years ago in Gaibandha and Narisingdi.

The majority of diagnoses, mostly biochemistry and histopathological tests, are highly likely to give incorrect or false conclusions, including microscopic examinations to confirm biopsy of tissues as in the case of cancer.

The concern came to a head after a series of wrong diagnostic

tests was detected. A patient in a leading diagnostic centre in Dhammoldi tested positive for urine infection and the same person got a negative test result from a research laboratory after he went there to reconfirm the test.

A biopsy test for suspected cancer at a diagnostic centre was positive, but a second examination confirmed that the patient had tissue damage, not cancer. Another patient at a Dhammoldi laboratory tested positive for thyroid cancer, but a second test showed a negative result.

"We use ethanol, methanol, acetone and toluene for chemical reaction called staining in biochemistry and histo-pathology laboratories. If low-grade chemicals are used with reagents, the possibility of getting a false outcome is almost 99 percent which is a dangerous practice," said a bio-chemist of a research laboratory.

Probes into sensational cases fizz out

Probes into three sensational cases in recent times -- arson attack on a double-decker bus at Sheraton Hotel crossing, assassination of frontline opposition lawmaker Ahsanullah Master and attempt on writer Humayun Azad's life -- appear to have been thrown into wilderness.

The government was quick to put the blame on the opposition activists, but its law-enforcement agencies so far have failed to prove its claim. The opposition hit back to say that the ruling coalition lacks the political will to unearth the motive behind the occurrences and catch the culprits and the masterminds.

The investigators keep claiming

that much has been done to arrest the people behind the grisly incidents, yet they have failed to dig out the clue let alone arrest the people responsible.

ARSON ATTACK ON RTC BUS

The Department of Explosives has failed to identify the object used in the June 4 arson attack on a RTC double-decker bus at Sheraton Hotel crossing that left 10 people killed and at least 15 injured. In the June 7 report, it said 'a liquid chemical' mixed with low-power explosives like gunpowder or guncotton was used to set the bus on fire.

In their last major 'breakthrough', the Detective Branch (DB) of Police on Wednesday arrested Jahangir of Nilkhel area whom police identified as a profes-

sional bomb-maker and supplier. "We've taken him on a five-day remand and are interrogating him to see whether he is anyway involved in the act," investigation officer of the case, DB Inspector Saud Hasan told The Daily Star yesterday.

The DB police arrested Awami League (AL) activist and contractor Abdul Mannan from his home at Free School Street in Kanthalbagan on June 8 on suspicion.

The DB also arrested Dinesh Chandra Sarker, peon of AL's youth wing Jubo League's office, on June 6 reportedly acting on the information of Shakhatipu, a youth caught while trying to set fire to a taxi cab at North-South Road in

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Mayors want more power, single authority

Paradox of poverty and unspent funds

Tk 60,000 crore lies in aid pipeline, banks, coffers, yet vital areas lack money

A paradox in Bangladesh's economy is that huge amounts of money remain unused whereas 40 percent of its people live below poverty line.

According to one estimate, around Tk 60,000 crore lies with the government whereas public hospitals lack medicine, run-down roads

remain without repair for years and schools close down because of fund crisis.

The estimate says Tk 10,000 crore is lying idle with the country's commercial banks in excess liquidity. A total of \$6.2 billion, equivalent to Tk 36,000 crore, is in the foreign aid pipeline. And, the foreign currency

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African catfish poses threat to ecosystem

Carnivorous alien species African catfish is spreading out in the natural ecosystem, posing a great threat to local and indigenous fish species of the country.

Rain pelts Dhaka

Much of the city was reeling from water after daylong driving rains virtually clogged the drainage system yesterday.

The capital experienced 49 mm of rainfall that caused waterlogging in several places. Lanes and by-lanes went under water as the drainage system was cramped with dumped rubbish.

Some parts of the city came to a standstill for a couple of hours with hundreds of vehicles stranded in the roads.

A Wasa (Water and Sewerage Authority) expert says the 260km network of storm sewers in Dhaka is in 'a bad shape' as city dwellers and sweepers and cleaners of Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) dump rubbish onto roads.

"The major problem is the amount of solid rubbish and dust dumped into storm sewers," a Wasa official said.

Whenever the DCC street cleaners sweep the streets, they dump all rubbish into the drains through the 'catch pits'. The catch pits as a result get blocked and the flow of rainwater into the drains is hindered.

Much of the country experienced torrential rains in the last two days.

The monsoon arrived in Bangladesh several days ago. The rain may subside tomorrow, as the monsoon wind will drift away," said Arzumand Habib, deputy director of the meteorological department.

The rainfall was recorded at 120mm in Noakhali, yesterday's highest in Bangladesh, 113mm in Cox's Bazar, 44mm in Chandpur and 20mm in Mymensingh.

Anthrax found in dead elephant

Deadly anthrax virus has been found in the carcass of an elephant in Lama upazila, officials confirmed yesterday.

Experts at Chittagong Veterinary College confirmed the existence of anthrax in the elephant. Prof Dr Nitish Das said he found anthrax spore positive in the elephant's body after a blood test.

The elephant was lying dead since June 10 in Yangcha spreading stinky smell. It was sent for a laboratory test later. Local administration yesterday admitted the elephant was carrying the virus.
