

Khulna editor bombed to death by outlaws

Janajuddha claims responsibility; journalists in the southwestern city call hartal for tomorrow

Dainik Janmabhumi Editor Humayun Kabir Balu was killed and his elder son injured in a bomb attack yesterday apparently by a leftist extremist posing as a peanut vendor in southwestern Khulna City, police and witnesses said.

Balu, 58, also president of Khulna Press Club, suffered critical injuries to his back and legs at 12:15pm in front of his house-cum-office on Islampur Road soon after getting down from his car and died at Khulna Medical College Hospital (KMC) at 1:50pm, sparking protests.

13 journalists killed in SW in 10 years

Of the dead, five were in Khulna, four in Jessor, two in Bhola and one each in Chittagong and Sathkhira.

Bruised body of 6-year-old girl found in Mirpur

The body of an unidentified girl of about 6 was retrieved from a sack at West Shewrapara in Mirpur yesterday.

Mirpur police found the body in a plastic fertiliser bag, which was covered with a cloth, at about 12:00pm, sources said.

The inquest report said some bones of the victim's hands and legs were broken while the body bore bruises all over.

The body was sent to Dhaka Medical College Hospital morgue for autopsy at 3:30pm, police said.

Morgue sources suspect the girl died due to severe beating.

MR Akhter Mukul laid to rest

Eminent journalist and freedom fighter MR Akhter Mukul was laid to rest at the Martyred Intellectuals Graveyard in capital's Mirpur yesterday.

Mukul, famed for his radio programme 'Charampatra' during the country's liberation war, died of cancer at BIRDEM hospital on Saturday at the age of 75.

Earlier, his body was taken to his Bally Road home from BIRDEM mortuary at 8:00am where the first namaz-e-janaza was held. The second janaza was held at the Jatiya Press Club and the third at Mukti Joddha Sangsads office in New Eskaton.

The body was taken to the Central Shaheed Minar where people from all strata including Awami League President and Leader of Opposition in parliament Sheikh Hasina, journalists, writers, intellectuals and politicians paid last respect to the valiant freedom fighter who inspired countrymen during the liberation war in 1971.

His last janaza was held at Baitul Mukarram National Mosque after Zohr prayers.

DHAKA-10 BY-POLLS Mannan again files writ petition for army deployment

Abdul Mannan of Bokalpa Dhara Bangladesh (BDB) and three other candidates for July 1 Dhaka-10 by-election yesterday filed a writ petition again with the High Court (HC) seeking a directive on the government for army deployment in each polling centre.

The latest petition sought the directive in light of the Election Commission (EC) decision to ask the government for deployment of troops to ensure a free and fair vote.

The HC division bench of Justice MA Matin and Justice Tarik Ul Hakim will hear the petition today.

The High Court in an order on

June 20 on a similar writ petition said the earlier petition was premature and that no-one had declined troops deployment in the constituency. The court however expected of the government to take necessary steps, including the deployment of army, to hold the vote in a free and fair manner.

But after the High Court order,

BDB candidate Mannan and three others apprehended that the authorities would not provide sufficient security and deploy army personnel in the constituency in line with the EC decision.

Rather, ruling BNP's young deputies were allowed to speak on the issue, who accused the past Awami League (AL) government of vote rigging, triggering tension in the constituency.

Ministers skirt army deployment demand

RISING DEBT BURDEN

Interest payment gobbles up 20pc of revenue spending

Interest payment on government borrowings lately has turned into a major burden on the economy, as it alone consumes around one-fifth of the revenue budget.

The proposed budget for fiscal year (FY) 2004-05 has allocated Tk 6,533 crore or 19 percent of the revenue budget for interest payment on government borrowings, compared to Tk 5,832 crore or 21 percent in current year's revised budget and Tk 5,574 crore or 19 percent in FY 2001-02.

Back in FY 1990-91, the nation spent only Tk 662 crore or 11.68 percent of the revenue budget for

the same purpose.

Until FY 1994-95, the government had to pay roughly equal amounts of interest for domestic and foreign loans. But now, domestic borrowing claims 83 percent of the total interest paid.

Economists fear this trend is pushing the nation into a 'debt trap' that, if the issue is not addressed immediately, will become a major impediment to its development.

If we fail to implement the appropriate reforms, this will turn into a debt trap for the government," says M Hafizuddin, chairman of the Public Expenditure Review Commission (PerC).

On implementation of reforms, a

high official of finance ministry says, "It is not possible to execute reforms overnight. They are being implemented slowly. Like, in recent times, several ministries have been merged with the view to gradually reduce the loan burden."

On the country's debt burden, economist Zaid Bakht notes, "The level of borrowing had increased at the end of the previous government, when it introduced some populist moves into the budget. After the present government had taken over, it tried to streamline the borrowing. But now, once again, the elections are coming and so possibilities of undertaking populist

WOMEN, CHILD TRAFFICKING 6 steps suggested to curb crime

An inter-ministerial meeting yesterday suggested six steps to significantly reduce the crimes related to trafficking in the wake of a possible US sanction if Dhaka fails to stop trafficking in women and children.

The six suggested steps aimed to reduce the rate of trafficking in women and children include revival of the police anti-trafficking unit, appointment of a special prosecutor for dealing with trafficking cases in 'speedy court' and institution of a referral mechanism for the victims to avail services offered by NGOs.

US State Department on June 15 blacklisted Bangladesh and warned it of economic sanctions if it fails to improve the situation within 60 days from that date.

The meeting, held at the home ministry and chaired by State Minister for Home Affairs

Lutfuzzaman Babar, discussed ways to prevent trafficking in children and women. The state minister ordered quick disposal of 17 cases relating to trafficking in children and women.

A five-member committee headed by the joint secretary of the home ministry was formed to submit a report in 15 days.

"We are serious about the problems and trying to solve it," Babar told newsmen after the meeting.

He said police are trying to prepare a list of the people behind the illegal trade and action would be taken soon according to the list.

The meeting ordered mounting watch and prompt action on six trafficking routes namely Dhaka-Barisal, Dhaka-Benapole, Dhaka-Satkhira, Dhaka-Chapainawabganj, Dhaka-Darshana and Dhaka-Dinajpur that the human traffickers

Shujaat interim Pak PM

Pakistan's parliament will elect a new leader of the house tomorrow following prime minister Zafarullah Jamali's surprise resignation, officials said.

President Pervez Musharraf accepted Jamali's resignation and summoned a special session of the National Assembly (lower house) on June 29 to elect a new leader of the house to replace the premier who also held the post, they said.

Jamali announced his resignation on Saturday in the wake of persistent rumours that Musharraf wants to bring in a new figure to carry out his political agenda.

He said his cabinet had been dissolved and Chaudhry Shaukat Hussain, president of the ruling Pakistan Muslim League (PML), has been nominated as his caretaker successor.

Hussain said he would hold the post for two months before handing over to Shaukat Aziz who served as finance minister in Jamali's cabinet.

Aziz, a former Citibank official, is architect of the country's economic

German FM arrives on July 16

German Foreign Minister Joschka Fischer will arrive on July 16 for a two-day official visit at the invitation of his Bangladeshi counterpart M Morshed Khan.

Foreign Secretary Shamsher M Chodhury will receive him at Zia International Airport.

The two foreign ministers will hold talks in the morning at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs on July 17, an official source said yesterday. Bilateral issues and regional and international matters of common interest are expected to be discussed at the talks.

Joschka is likely to meet the press briefly after the talks with the foreign minister.

He will make a courtesy call on Prime Minister Khaleda Zia at the Prime Minister's Office in the afternoon.

Leader of Opposition in Parliament and Awami League chief Sheikh Hasina is scheduled to call on the German foreign minister.

Controversial RU recruits threaten VC for job confirmation



Controversially recruited employees of Rajshahi University (RU) yesterday stormed the office of vice chancellor and threatened him with dire consequences if the authorities did not confirm their jobs immediately.

Hundreds of 'illegally' appointed employees have been agitating for the last two days after the authorities in compliance with a court order asked them to refrain from reporting for duty. In a notice on Saturday, the authorities asked all its departments and offices not to assign the 544 employees anyway.

Earlier on June 23, a Rajshahi court cancelled the recruitment of 544 employees and termed it illegal
