Tigers set off for Colombo today

Bangladesh captain Habibul Bashar said that his side is determined not to play the role of a B team anymore at the Asia Cup next month.

The 32-year-old also said it was time not to be the whipping boys in the past six editions of the regional cricket carnivals, but rather throw a few punches of their own.

"It will not be easy for any team to beat us like the past because gone are the days when we have just played and hoped for the best afterwards," said a confident Bashar on Tuesday, a day before the 15-member team flies to Colombo.

Growing in confidence after the series in West Indies early this month, Bashar however showed total respect to the big three -- defending champions Pakistan, India and hosts Sri Lanka -- in the meet.

"May be they are world beaters but we also want to gain some respect from them. I also feel that in this part of the world it is essential to have 300 runs in the bank if you want to win matches," said the batsman of the country.

Although the task ahead for Dav Whatmore's men is tough to say the least but Bashar believes on a given day his fast improving side can turn dream into reality provided that every member plays to his potential.

The Bangladesh captain was banking on two young members of the team Mohammad Ashraful and out-form Alok Kapali to fire in the competition.

New Zealand left armer James Franklin took five wickets to help dismiss a sorry-looking England for 101 in a triangular NatWest Series one-day international at Chester-le-Street on Tuesday.

Franklin recorded one-day career-best figures of five for 42, taking advantage of slightly overcast conditions to swing the ball both ways.

England, who were all out for 147 in the seven-wicket defeat to West Indies on Sunday, played some thoughtless shots against some good New Zealand bowling and crumbled to their sixth lowest one-day total in just 32.5 overs.

Captain Michael Vaughan (12) was Franklin's first scalp, off a swinging delivery that hit off stump.

Paul Collingwood (2) on his home ground, chased a wide Franklin ball and edged to debut-wicketkeeper Gareth Hopkins.

Police arrest Army

National Football Championship runners-up Bangladesh Army crashed out of the fourth Nitol-Tata National Football League when they lost to Bangladesh Police in tie-breaker yesterday.

Police, who eliminated Bangladesh Rifles in the first round, kept their cool against their mighty opponents in the nerve-wrecking shootout to win 3-1 after the services zone qualifying match was locked at 1-1 in the regulation time at the Kamalapur Stadium.

This was the first time that the soldiers failed to qualify for the final rounds after playing in all three previous editions of the competition. They were in for a surprise when Police went ahead in the 25th minute through Wasim.

The match entered the shootout phase after Ashish Banwary pulled off the equaliser for the armymen in the 67th minute.

Police will take on Bangladesh Air Force in tomorrow's zonal final at the same venue for a place in the 12-team finals, which kick off on July 10 in Mymensingh.

The tournament organising committee earlier wanted to start the finals at Chittagong but they had to change the decision. The Chittagong League is scheduled to end on July 7 and the MA Aziz Stadium ground will need some time for repair works.

Elsewhere, hosts Jhenidah Mohammedan Sporting Club blanked Zia Smriti Sangsads of Magura 3-0 to reach the zonal final. Bashir scored twice, his fourth goal in two outings, and Obaid added the other for the winners at the Jhenidah Stadium.

Another local side Najarpara Krira Chakra moved into the zonal final with a 4-3 tiebreaker-win over Noakhali's Rising Star after the regulation 90 minutes ended goalless at Chandpur Stadium.

At Bagerhat, Nozu's 51st minute strike was enough for home side Unmochon Club to book a place in the zonal final with a 1-0 victory against Pratyasha Club of Jessore.

In the Narshingdi zone, Kacharpara Football Club of

Jamalpur recorded a comfortable 3-1 win over Shuktara Juba Sangha of Narayanganj to set a zonal final clash against hosts Kararchar Krira Chakra.

PORTUGAL v NETHERLANDS



Let's talk art

Fear of further semi-final failure is all that stands in the way of a classic when slick-passing Portugal meet a fast-improving Netherlands side on Wednesday with a place in the Euro 2004 final at stake.

The Dutch have settled on their best team, led by Arjen Robben and Ruud van Nistelrooy in a classy forward partnership, and feel a repeat of their 1988 European Championship win is on the cards.

Portugal, inspired by the artistry of Deco and bolstered by the defensive partnership of Jorge Andrade and Ricardo Carvalho, have quality running through their side and the benefit of passionate home support.

Wednesday's game at the Jose

Alvalade stadium will be as much a test of nerve as a trial of skill, though, as the two beaten semi-finalists from the last European Championship bid to avoid a similar fate.

This will be a fifth semi-final for the Dutch and they have won just one, when they went on to take the title in 1988.

Portugal have lost both their previous semi-finals and they are well aware that the hosts have gone out at the semi-final stage in the

last four championships.

Those factors, coupled with the blazing heat in Lisbon, could lead to an over-cautious approach and there is a distinct air of tension in the Portuguese camp, perhaps primed by the enormous expectations of the country's 10 million people.

"I believe we'll go on to reach the final because I think we are a better side," Deco told reporters.

"It would be a huge disappointment to miss out on the final now,

or to reach the final only to lose it."

The Portuguese do have some history on their side, with the Dutch having won only one of their eight previous meetings.

Paulo is available again after suspension but Nuno Gomes is likely to continue up front in an unchanged team.

Deco, Carvalho and defensive mid-fielder Costinha are just a yellow card away from missing the final.

Moon landing awaits

Portuguese coach Luiz Felipe Scolari, bidding to become the only man in the history of the game to coach teams to World Cup and European Championship glory, Tuesday warned his side to beware counterpart Dick Advocaat's dastardly Dutch in their Euro semi-final.

Scolari's interpreter, in explaining the coach's thoughts on Manchester United hitman van Nistelrooy, made a Freudian slip in referring to the forward as 'van Baster' after peerless former AC Milan star Marco Van Basten, whose stunning goal in the 1988 final helped to see off the then Soviet Union.

With the level of expectation among the home fans having reached a boiling point following an enthralling penalty shootout win over England, both Scolari and skipper Luis Figo called for calm, while the former said his charges had to be aware the Dutch have a few tricks up their sleeves.

"The statistics show we are a similar team," said Scolari, who led Brazil to the 2002 World Cup before taking the reins of that country's former colonial power with a clear lead.

"I don't know their team particularly. I am with Portugal and I know my team."

"But Holland is a very strong team which plays well on the wings and is very attack-minded."

"The Portuguese must not think we have reached our objective. As yet we have won nothing. We have a good opportunity to go further, but we have to think about Holland

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Oranje sans skipper

Dutch captain Frank de Boer will almost certainly play no further part in the Netherlands' bid to win Euro 2004.

The former Rangers defender was told the worst after an x-ray on his damaged right ankle at a Faro hospital on Monday.

"He's damaged a ligament and will almost certainly not take any further part in these championships," the Dutch team's medical department reported.

The 34-year-old, who limped off in the second half of Saturday's penalty shoot-out quarter-final win over Sweden, sat out training here late Monday.

The setback could not have come at a more unkind time for de Boer who had fought his way back into the team against strong competition from Wilfried Bouma, 26.

De Boer, who holds a special place in the Dutch team, boasting a record 112 caps for his country, has left Rangers and is eyeing a lucrative curtain call to his career in the gas-rich Gulf state of Qatar where his brother Ronald is already based.

He sat on the sidelines while the rest of the squad trained here late Monday.

The Oranje, champions in 1988, must overcome hosts Portugal in Lisbon on Wednesday to seal a place in Sunday's final.

Championship surprise package Greece face favourites the Czech Republic in the other semi in Oporto on Thursday.

Surviving by winning

Dutch coach Dick Advocaat had a lot on his mind 48 hours before the Netherlands' Euro 2004 semi-final against Portugal - not least just what he needs to do to win over the critics back home.

Advocaat by all accounts has been subjected to a barrage of at times fairly personal criticism from the Dutch media along the lines of what the British tabloids' meted out to Graham Taylor in his days as England manager.
