Govt ditches plan to rein in unruly bank unionists

The government has budged from its stance on reining unruly trade unionists in as it ditched proposals from the recently approved amendment to the Bank Company Act on stopping their abuse of property in government-owned banks.

The act approved last week also aimed to bring an end to malprac-tice by bank directors, but it faced stiff resistance from the bank owners who found its newly inserted clauses 'unacceptable' and are trying to get them dropped, sources

Politically backed trade union activists however did not need to put in much effort to resist the latest move. The government dropped the clauses carrying stringent measures against them during the amendment, the sources added

One of the proposals that was dropped was the first sub-clause of

union leaders will not be allowed to use bank cars and telephones for running trade union affairs. Another one stipulated a maximum three years' jail term with Tk 1 lakh penalty if a trade union activist was found guilty of physically harassing a bank official. Besides, the guilty would have to pay Tk 500 each day for defaulting on the penalty pay-

"But the cabinet meeting did not approve these two amendments in the face of opposition from some cabinet members," said a source in the cabinet, adding "It is clear that moneyed bank owners exert less power than a handful of unruly politically backed union leaders

Bankers, the owners apart, initially welcomed the amendment.

AL's 12-hour hartal today

Ballot rigging added to issues

Awami League enforces a dawn-to-dusk countrywide hartal today to protest what it said was unprece dented rigging in Thursday's by-polls in Dhaka-10, bomb blast at a meeting of Suranjit Sengupta in Sunamganj, murder of a Khulna editor and killing of policemen by Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal cadres in the capital.

However, to facilitate smooth filing of nomination papers by intending candidates to Gazipur-2 parliamentary by-election billed for August 1, the major opposition party has kept Gazipur Sadar and Tongi areas out of the hartal's purview.

The hartal decision was taken at an urgent meeting of AL's Working Committee at the party's Dhanmondi office on June 22 with Sheikh Hasina in the chair. The party later added the issue of Thursday's vote rigging as a point to intensify its shutdown call.

Earlier, AL had directed two of its front organisations to withdraw their hartal on June 30 and enforce it on July 3.

To drum up support for today's bartal, different AL front organisa-tions yesterday brought out proces-sions in the city's Muktangan and Bangabandhu Avenue areas amidst strong police resistance.

DHAKA-10 BY-POLLS

60pc votes cast were false, say observers

At least 60 percent of the votes cast in Thursday's Dhaka-10 parliamen-tary by-election were false, said election observers of Bangladesh Manobadhikar Somonnoy Porishad (Bamasop), a coalition of 300 rights groups, yesterday at a press conference at Dhaka Reporters Unity.

Rampant anomalies like fakeballoting, lawlessness at polling centres amid overwhelming presence of ruling alliance activists and laxity of both polling officials and law enforcers marred the by-polls, said Bamasop President AHM Nouman, whose two teams observed 15 polling stations in Shere-Bangla Nagar, Farmgate, Dhaka University campus and Tejgaon

At the polls, no long queue of voters was found until noon, as at best 15 percent voters turned out in those areas, Nouman noted in a written statement. While genuine

four-party alliance activists were found casting ballots time and again, he added

The statement also said supporters of election symbol paddy sheaf were found roving about the polling centres unobstructed by law enforcers and canvassing for their candidate, while the presiding officers did not accept agents of kula symbol when they reported in the morning. Polling agents of kula were found only at one centre.

Nouman said Assistant Presiding Officer Hasnain Khan at the Bangladesh Institute of Ceramics centre had told him that the balloting was going on in an appropriate

"But immediately after, Md Murad Ali, voter No 09184, alleged someone else had already cast his vote," Nouman said. "When I brought the matter to Hasnain Khan's notice, he hurriedly wrapped

it up and pretended to be busy.'

"Our high hope for a fair election was frustrated each time we entered a polling centre with depressing sights of irregularities," the

Bamasop president said.
"The by-polls has not been free and fair," said Nazmul Ahsan Kalimullah, chairman of Jatiyo Nirbachon Parjobekkhan Porishad (Janipop), which has been working as an election-monitoring organisation since 1995.

No polling official seemed ready to respond when observers pointed out anomalies in the election process, he said.

The Janipop chief said excessive use of money, particularly by the two principal contenders, corroded the moral basis of the election.

In a written statement, the Janipop said the parliamentary byelection was marred by high instances of fraud -- enough to call into question the validity of its final

Guardians weary of high fees

Most private English medium schools in Dhaka charge guardians high fees for their children's education in the absence of a government

Most schools of good repute justify the fee hike, citing the rising cost of living and maintenance.

"We increase fees in school as the cost of electricity, essentials and stationery is rising by the year," says Yasmeen Murshed, chairperson of Scholastica, the largest private English medium school in

But guardians do not believe these were any justification for such hike. "The increase in schooling cost outpaces the price hike of essentials or electricity. The rising cost of living and maintenance as the reason for such increased fees sounds absurd. Schools don't even pay tax as we pay," says Mahmud Chowdhury, who finds it hard to ensure good education for his son.

Pre-school admission fees range between Tk 5,000 and Tk 40,000 in different schools, which were less

than half a few years ago. Most reputed schools are increasing the students' yearly fees. Guardians now pay Tk 8,000 to Tk 15,000 in yearly fees for a student in addition to monthly tuition fees of Tk 800 to Tk 5,000 or even higher.

Over 1.5 lakh students study in several thousand private English medium schools across the country.

"These schools are charging whatever they wish as there is no regulation," says Hasan Mohammad Zahid, a guardian, whose wards study in an English medium school in Dhanmondi.

"The school authorities know we cannot take our children out of school even if we want. High fees are common to all schools," Zahid says. Samira, a mother of two, points

out that the schools impose additional fees now and then, piling pressure on the guardians of limited income. "They charge us for class parties. Why do we need class parties every month? Why do we have to pay additional Tk 200 for that?"

The high fees do not reflect the infrastructure of most schools. The Daily Star correspondent found students attending classes in overcrowded rooms shut out of sunlight. Some schools built classrooms on the landings of staircases and have

no playgrounds or appropriate

Guardians question the quality of teachers in general. Many schools provide O and A levels tutorials under the Cambridge University and University of London, but do not follow standards of teacher recruitment as they do not have any managing committee.

A managing committee, elected by guardians, is mandatory for private educational institutions to run, according to a government rule. "The school authorities fear the

schools will lose control of their money-making strategy and have to ensure transparency if such committees are formed," says Arif Hossain, a parent. "Many schools operate like businesses. They earn high not only

from fees but from book and statio-

nery sales. Buying uniforms from the schools for children is a must." A school in Dhanmondi made blazers compulsory as wintertime school uniform and asked guardians to have the blazer tailored from the shop on the school premises. Guardians were forced to buy fabric from the shop as the school selected SEE PAGE 11 COL 7

93 rescued from traffickers

The government has launched investigations into a recently detected scam pointing to huge financial losses to Bangladesh Biman's cargo operations in Dubai. A threemember probe team led by Joint Secretary M Shahabuddin left Dhaka

Wednesday to diginto the racket. Sources said frauds committed by some cargo sub-agents in Dubai in connivance with Biman staff have deprived the national carrier of crores of taka in revenue. A number of documents obtained by The Daily Star indicate the sub-agents have been recording and paying for far less volume of goods than were actually shipped through the airlines. HOWITWORKS

Biman's general sales agents (GSAs) for passenger and cargo are Dnata in Dubai and Transworld in Sharjah.

When a customer who wants to ship a cargo approaches these agencies, they try to book space with Biman. Biman official concerned refuses and says there is no space available. But, at the same time, Biman tells the customer to make


booking and give customer-details

to keep him on waiting list.

Then, within a few hours, the customer gets a call from a cargo operator saying they can ship the cargo. These operators take the business and send the cargo, while the conniving Biman officials get kickbacks.

Separate documents are then prepared -- one for the Dubai office, where the lesser volume is recorded, and another for Dhaka office, where the actual volume is shown for
