Plan again to ban rickshaws on two Dhaka roads in Aug

Two major city roads -- Kalabagan crossing to Azimpur and Science Laboratory to National Press Club to College Road (next to Bangabazar) -- will now be out of bounds to rickshaws from August.

Dhaka Transport Coordination Board (DTCB) officials said this at a press briefing in Dhaka yesterday. The DTCB earlier failed on several occasions to get rickshaws off the two roads and ply roadside lanes.

Tongi Diversion Road including the stretch from Kakrail, Maghbazar and Mohakhali will become out of bounds to rickshaws soon, Rokeya Sarani to Farmgate, New Eskaton Road, Banglamotor, Moghbazar,

Mouchak, Malibagh and Rajarbagh in May next year and Progoti Sarani to Rampura road in July next, said Md Akhter Hossain, director (admin) of the DTCB.

DTCB Executive Director Quamrul Islam Siddique said main roads are to be free of rickshaws under the Dhaka Urban Transport Project (DUTP), a Tk 834 crore World Bank financed scheme to improve the capital's road infra-

About the ongoing study on Strategic Transport Plan (STP), he said the study conducted by the DTCB will prepare a long-term transport plan for the next 20 years for Dhaka that will include transport policy and institutional issues,

public transport issues, planning and transport issues and others.

Representatives from the WB Traffic Department of Dhaka Metropolitan Police, Roads and Highways Department, Bangladesh Road Transport Authority, DUIP project directors were present.

Navaid A Qureshi, senior urban transport specialist of the WB, said time has come to push nonmotorised vehicles, in particular rickshaws, to use side lanes of the main roads.

Mohi Uz Zaman Quazi, senior transport engineer of the WB, however said the DUTP will fail to bring about qualitative change unless the traffic management system is

Ministries differ on Liberation War history

Two ministries have published two versions of Bangladesher Swadhinata Juddho Dalilpatra that translates as the Documents of Bangladesh Liberation War within three months of each other, triggering a national outcry.

Former information minister Tariqul Islam on April 13 formally opened the cover of the book in 15 reprinted volumes, popularly known as Dalilpatra published by the information ministry.

The edition of Dalilpatra, published by the Ministry of Liberation War Affairs on July 8, has warped historical facts by adding a chapte

on the proclamation of Bangladesh's independence. The reprint has taken out the

original proclamation of independence through a message by Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman and contains an inserted text that names the late president Ziaur Rahman as the first proclaimer. LGRD Minister Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan was the chief guest at the launch of the book.

The first edition of Dalilpatra, product of a project initiated by Zia himself, does not have 'planted' information. The book first came out in 1982 with poet and journalist Hasan Hafizur Rahman as its editor.
