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Banglabandha land port still dysfunctional on lack of Indian support

The country's only export-oriented land port Banglabandha could not be made fully operational even after its formal opening in May this year, mainly due to lack of co-operation from New Delhi, sources concerned said.

According to shipping ministry sources, the inefficiency of the land port in northern Panchagarh district results from the absence of an agree-

ment between Dhaka and New Delhi on transportation of goods to and from Nepal through a 52km Indian corridor.

New Delhi did not respond to Dhaka's proposal for reaching an understanding to facilitate Bangladesh-Nepal trade, sources alleged. Indian customs now allows only two hours a day to Nepal-bound trucks from Bangladesh for crossing the Indian territory.

"The warehouse built at the land

port at a cost of over Tk two crore remained unused since its opening," said a high official in the ministry.

According to sources, all necessary infrastructures at the port were developed temporarily to boost trade with the land-locked Himalayan Kingdom Nepal. But no support came from India, which lies between the two South Asian neighbours.

The government formally

opened the land port on May 22 this year with a hope that India would increase the transit time for using its corridor and improve infrastructures for transportation of goods to and from Nepal through Indian lands.

Bangladesh set up customs, immigration, banks, police camps, warehouses and all other necessary infrastructures for the land port. There is also a plan to build a

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Dhaka calls for regional water co-operation

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Proshika chief gets bail in sedition case

A division bench comprising Justice Nozrul Islam Chowdhury and Justice Farid Ahmed passed the order making the rule issued earlier absolute.

Qazi Faruque faces at least one and a half dozen criminal cases filed one after another since he was arrested on May 22.

Another division bench comprising Justice Nazmun Ara Sultana and AKM Asaduzzaman granted ad interim bail to Shahidul Alam, director general of BIAM for three months when he appeared in the court.

He sought the bail in apprehension of implicating him in smuggling of secret documents from the Prime Minister's office (PMO) along with AHM Nurul Islam who was sent into forced retirement as acting secretary to the prime minister.

Red tape delays first DNA lab

Indecision of the authorities and bureaucratic tangles have delayed by six months establishment of the first DNA (deoxyribo-nucleic acid) analysis laboratory that could help precise investigation into crimes, sources said.

All equipment and apparatus for the Tk 3 crore laboratory to be set up at Dhaka Medical College (DMC) Forensic department arrived in December last.

The proposed laboratory, a gift from the Danish government, would be used to precisely identify people accused of rape, murder and other crimes.

DNA analysis is now widely used across the globe to identify criminals because it is reliable and also cost effective.

The DNA laboratory will comprise a forensic pathology wing for anatomical examination of human remains like body fluid, blood stain, hair and nail, a forensic biology section for DNA typing and some other functions and a DNA analysis wing with automatic gene analyser,

gene scan software, genotyper, digital pipettes, computer, auto-clave machine and a freezer.

According to officials, preliminary work for the laboratory was completed in August last. But six biochemists and six technicians needed to carry out DNA analysis are yet to be recruited and trained. Moreover, some staff selected for laboratory work have been transferred elsewhere.

"We need a professional biochemist, and not a doctor, to manage the laboratory. This is another problem facing the authorities," one official said.

Allocation of funds for laboratory staff is now awaiting approval of the Prime Minister's Office.

When set up, the laboratory will have five branches in divisional headquarters for collection of samples to be sent to it.

The government had taken up plan for setting up the laboratory under a DANIDA-funded three-year multi-sector programme on violence against women that ended last year.

Chechnya's acting president survives landmine attack

A landmine has blasted a convoy carrying Chechnya's pro-Moscow acting president, killing one person, though he himself escaped unscathed, Russian news agencies say.

Itar-Tass news agency said yesterday the blast hit Sergei Abramov's convoy as it sped through Grozny, regional capital of the rebel Russian region.

One member of his staff was killed, two were injured, but Abramov escaped unscathed, it said.

Abramov took over as interim leader in the turbulent territory after its pro-Moscow president Akhmad Kadyrov was killed by a bomb attack on May 9 during public celebrations.

Elections for a new president are being held on August 29, though Abramov, 32, a former Chechnya prime minister, is not standing as a candidate.

An interior ministry official said the person who was killed was a bodyguard of Abramov.

Aids fight must match war on terror

Annan tells US

The United States must lead the fight against Aids with the same commitment it shows to financing the battles against terrorism and weapons of mass destruction, UN Secretary-General Kofi Annan says.

Terrorism could kill thousands but "here we have an epidemic that is killing millions", he said in an exclusive interview with the BBC.

"We hear a lot about weapons of mass destruction. We hear a lot about terrorism, and we are worried about weapons of mass destruction because of their potential to kill

thousands of people," Annan said in an interview with the BBC yesterday.

Annan appealed to the US to devote more money to tackling HIV/Aids.

But President Bush's Aids adviser said the US was already by far the biggest contributor to anti-Aids campaigns.

Annan who is attending the International Aids Conference in Bangkok, said the US was spending huge amounts to tackle terrorism and weapons of mass destruction but had failed to deliver on its promises to combat the spread of Aids.

He expressed disappointment

that some of the \$15bn earmarked by President George W Bush to tackle HIV/Aids was not yet going to the global fund - the body set up to raise money for Aids programmes.

"The global fund is ready to go. If individual governments begin to set up their own initiatives, they start from scratch, it takes longer, the money that they hold will not be spent for a long time," he said.

Annan said he had hoped the US could at least contribute \$1bn a year through the global fund, with the EU putting in another \$1bn.

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Israel now rerouting West Bank barrier

Jihad chief in Jenin shot dead

Israel is redrawing the route of its West Bank barrier closer to its borders to ensure Palestinian are not cut off from their lands in keeping with a High Court order, security sources say.

The World Court, the UN's highest judicial arm, branded the barrier illegal and called for its removal in a non-binding opinion last week rejected by Israel and hailed by Palestinians.

Two senior US security envoys were to see Prime Minister Ariel Sharon shortly about the repercussions of the World Court decision, unauthorised Jewish settlement

outposts in the West Bank, and his plan to withdraw settlers from occupied Gaza.

In the northern West Bank town of Jenin yesterday, a local leader of the radical Palestinian movement Islamic Jihad was killed by Israeli troops.

Numan Tahaineh, 38, was killed in his car in an "assassination operation" by Israel, which has carried out numerous targeted killings of Palestinian militants during the latest Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

Another man in the same car suffered gunshot wounds and was arrested by the army along with another three men.

The attack followed a raid by

Israeli armored vehicles in Jenin earlier in the day, with troops storming the hospital and other buildings, according to an AFP correspondent and Palestinian security sources.

Meanwhile, an Israeli security source said yesterday redrafted Defence Ministry guidelines for the barrier -- a 100-metre (330-foot)-wide swathe of razor-fenced fencing and concrete walls -- would have it run "as close as possible" to the Israeli-West Bank boundary.

The barrier henceforth should not isolate nearby Palestinian farmers from olive and citrus groves or maroon villages in enclaves without free access to essential services like
