

"Coaches like myself have to keep calm in these situations so that we see objectively what goes on in the game.


Woolmer brushed side Pakistan's loss to Sri Lanka as a blip.

wickets for 45 after deciding to bat first but they staged a remarkable recovery thanks to a 196-run third wicket partnership between



More than just a dasher

Mohammad Ashraful reserves his best for Sri Lanka and Colombo seems to be his happy hunting place. The talented cricketer, who scored 114 on his Test debut against Sri Lanka at the SSC ground two years ago, also played his career best one-day knock against the same side, this time at the R Premadasa Stadium on Friday. His 66 against all odds was nothing like what one expects from the little right-hander. Rather it was a matured innings from someone who loves to play adventurous shots. The 19-yearold's knock might have had little bearing in the lop-sided affair, but that was certainly a strong statement that Ashraful's talent and performance were finally combining on the field. The exciting batsman was quite animated while talking about his fighting innings at the lobby of Hotel Taj Samudra on Saturday.

Excerpts of his interview: Question (Q): What would you

Mohammad Ashraful (MA): I have played such an innings under pressure for the first time. After being reduced to 31-4, I never though we would be able to reach 190. I had no total on my mind. But honestly, I did not take the pressure on myself. If I had a specialist batsman as company, we could have score more runs because the wicket was really good.

Q: Do you mean that the other batsmen could not take the advan-

MA: I think in all four matches we played on good wickets but unfortunately we could not score big totals.

Q: How would rate Manzarul's contribution in the match? MA: It was very important. After

Asian cricket has turned to highprofile mercenaries long ago and two of the best in the business will lay their best possible plans against

each other. Today's India versus Pakistan clash in the Asia Cup at the Premedasa Stadium will also pit two master coaches John Wright and Bob Woolmer against each other. The former Kent colleagues will be keen to take their respective teams into the final of the regional tourna-

While Wright has found the missing link in the Indian team which is their failures to convert their performances into matchwinning ones despite having natural talents

On the other hand, Woolmer is best known as the pioneer of hi-tech cricket coaching, while working with the South Africans for number Before the eagerly awaited face-

"All our encounters with them have been reasonably close. They probably have more batting form going into the clash but I don't think there will be 300-plus totals here like the series in Pakistan," remarked the New Zealander although the Pakistani batting was tore apart by Sri Lankans in their last game.

About his counterpart, Wright said: "He is an experienced international coach. He is a great student of the game. I've known him from the time I was playing second eleven for Kent and the first team. I have a lot of respect for him. He hasn't been with Pakistan for long. But I'm sure he will be having a look."

C'paul helps WI avoid follow-on

Shivnarine Chanderpaul and Omar Banks ensured West Indies crussed past the follow-on against English in the first Test at Lord's there

At tea on the third day West Indies

were 398 for six in reply to England's first innings 568, a deficit of 170, with left-hander Chanderpaul 123 not out and Banks unbeaten on 45. Off-spinner Banks, 22, dropped on 21, had faced just 63 balls with 34 of his runs in boundaries (one six

and seven fours). Together with Chanderpaul he had added 71 runs in 119 balls.

West Indies started the second session on 304 for five, with Chanderpaul 91 not out and his fellow left-hander Ridley Jacobs unbeaten on 20.

England soon took the new ball and Jacobs, dropped on five, edged Yorkshire quick Matthew Hoggard through to wicketkeeper Geraint

At that stage, West Indies were Chanderpaul, 29, then endured two maidens from fast bowler
