



## Floodwaters eddy down to centre, recede from north

Diarrhoea breaks out, death toll now 329; capital reeks of sewage

Floodwaters continued to roll down to the centre of Bangladesh, swamping much of the capital and pushing the official death toll to 329 yesterday as river waters started receding from northern and northeastern districts.

Diarrhoea and other waterborne diseases and starvation loomed large for the flood-hit people in 41 districts, where the flooding turned catastrophic, destroying crops on hundreds of acres, overflowing roads, railroads and flood control dams.

Executive Engineer Selim Bhuiyan of the Flood Forecasting and Warning Centre told The Daily Star that floodwaters are gradually receding from the north and northeast, piling pressure on the central districts.

The flood situation may improve when the water level in the fast-rising Meghna river in Chandpur comes down, he said, adding the Meghna is flowing 92 cm above the danger mark, overtaking records.

Overnight river navigation to the south became unsafe as most rivers

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## 150km embankments under deluge threat

Tk 120cr needed for damage repair

of which northeastern zone appears to be the worst affected, said a WDB official.

The preliminary report prepared by WDB said 102 km of dam was damaged completely while 504 km of embankment partly. Floods have caused damage also to 85 km of protective work. The WDB urgently needs Tk 50 crore to repair those damages.

Meanwhile, the parliamentary standing committee on water resources ministry yesterday discussed the prevailing situation and asked the ministry to initiate rehabilitation work immediately.

Committee chairman MA Matin presided over the meeting held at the Jatiya Sangsad Bhaban. Committee members and Water Resources Minister Hafizuddin Ahmed, KM Anwarul Islam, Matia Rahman Talukdar and officials concerned attended the meeting.

Traffic snarls up as city roads go under water

Commuters in the capital yesterday witnessed severe traffic congestion as some roads in Tejgaon and Gulshan submerged by knee-deep floodwaters.

The traffic approaching towards Farm Gate from Gulshan faced the congestion in Mahakhalil when commuters tried to avoid Gulshan Shooting Club crossing, witnesses said.

They said the road stretching from Aarong shop to Gulshan Shooting Club submerged due to a rise of water level in nearby Rampura wetland.

The road in front of Mahakhalil inter-district bus terminal suffered acute congestion after raging floodwaters inundated a vast area inside the terminal, a senior official of the traffic department told The Daily Star.

He said transport operators were compelled to park buses along the road in front of the terminal slowing down vehicular movement on the road.

The traffic also slowed down in Motijheel Commercial Area after floodwaters inundated some roads, the official added.

## Living by selling out everything

Kamrangirchar dwellers part with their cattle, poultry to get by

In Kamrangirchar, close to the capital, the flood has not only made poor old women like Asiya Begum homeless, but it is forcing them to sell their last resources such as cattle and poultry for survival.

For traders like Abdul Rafiq, the flood has brought windfall profit as they are buying cattle cheap and selling them at a high price.

The flood-affected people in Kamrangirchar are spending their days amid uncertainty and without any relief.

Villagers like Asiya Begum were rendered homeless by a dramatic rise in flood water on Saturday.

Asiya, 65, took shelter at the Al-Hera Community Centre in Kamrangirchar's Sirajnagar area

along with her six goats and two chickens.

The goats have posed another problem for her as she cannot find fodder for them. She had to sell one goat at a throwaway price for her own survival. Yesterday she was trying to sell the remaining five goats.

"I don't have food or shelter for myself. Where shall I keep these goats?" says Asiya.

When she moved to the community centre on Saturday night by a rickshaw-van, she did not have the money to pay for the trip. She sold two of her chickens for Tk 120 to pay him.

"In normal times, I would have sold just one chicken for Tk 120. I sold the goat for Tk 1,000, which actually would have fetched me

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## World responds to flood plights

UN to appeal to int'l community; Britain provides Tk 110cr; IDB 1.2cr; ADB forms monitoring unit; govt plans to assess damage with top donors

The world has responded to the humanitarian plight of about 30 million flood victims in Bangladesh with the United Nations (UN) set to appeal to the international community for urgent assistance.

The UN has come up with a

proposal for a help plea worldwide against the backdrop of the government's decision not to make such an appeal by itself.

The British government yesterday announced to provide Tk 110 crore (10 million pound sterling) aid for flood-hit people while the Islamic Development Bank (IDB)

approved an emergency grant of nearly Tk 1.20 crore (\$200,000).

"Bangladesh is experiencing severe monsoon flooding, the worst since the 1998 floods. The UK is concerned about the deteriorating flood situation in Bangladesh and stands ready to assist, in support of

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PM monitors flood round the clock

Prime Minister Khaleda Zia has started round-the-clock monitoring of overall flood situation through a monitoring cell opened at her office for properly guiding rescue and relief operations across the country.

"The government is conducting relief operation and other necessary tasks in the flood-affected areas without any negligence and coming up with all-out measures responding to the need to overcome any situation in the affected areas," the prime minister said.

She assured that the government would do whatever necessary for the people.

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## Diarrhoea epidemic breaks out

Diarrhoea outbreak in the flood-affected areas has reached an epidemic proportion although the health ministry is yet to admit it.

The waterborne disease has struck 14, 17,669 people since the beginning of the month, including 3,658 people yesterday, and claimed 14 lives, according to a government estimate. But unofficial estimates put the figure at five to six times higher and the death toll no less than three times the given number.

Private medical practitioners in many districts said they are unable to cope with the increasing rush of patients. Private clinics in many

districts and upazilas are submerged while an increasing number of patients had diarrhoea.


"There is no reason to declare a diarrhoea epidemic," Professor Mizanur Rahman, director general (DG) of health services told The Daily Star yesterday.

"We have sufficient quantities of oral and intravenous saline and today I have ordered for doubling the production."

The DG, however, said the worst form of the diarrhoeal attack is yet to come.

"Soon as the floodwater recedes the chances of large-scale diarrhoeal attack will increase. This is common as the bacteria

Five to die for Lalbagh triple murder

A Dhaka court yesterday sentenced five to death in the Lalbagh triple murder case.

The convicts are Syed Obaidul Akbar, Ahmad Hossain, Mohammad Abdus Sattar, Mohammad Dulal Mia and Mohammad Nasir Uddin -- all are cousins.

The court also acquitted two others -- Syed Mohammad Ali alias Kala Chand and Mohammad Basir Mia -- as the charges brought against them were not proved.

Judge AR Masud of the Speedy Trial Tribunal 4 gave the verdict in a jam-packed courtroom for killing Shazedunnissa alias Sazeda, 57, her daughter and son Sabiha Begum, 28, and Mursalin alias Swapna, 20, on November 23, 1999 in the city's Lalbagh area.

Akbar, Ahmad and Sattar were present in the court, while Dulal and Nasir were tried in absentia.

The convicts can appeal to the High Court against the verdict in 30 days, the judgement said.

Earlier, the prosecution and the defence completed their arguments and the court recorded statements of 22 prosecution witnesses.

The ministry assessed that agriculture losses in 38 flood-affected districts stood at Tk 2,291 crore till


July 25 while it was Tk 1,400 crore till July 21.
