

More dengue patients crowd city hospitals

The onset of monsoon is bringing more Dengue patients to different city hospitals and clinics.

Till 6:00pm yesterday evening a total of 1485 people, including 38 newly admitted patients during the last 24 hours, have been diagnosed for Dengue fever in various city hospitals and clinics.

The total number of Dengue-infected patients now under treatment in different city hospitals and clinics stands at 233 as of yesterday.

According to hospital sources, a few people suffered from the DHF and DSS this season.

A leading entomologist, on condition of anonymity, said transmission of the disease would continue this season as recurring rain has greatly favoured Aedes mosquitoes to lay eggs mostly in containers and flowerpots close to households.

Seeking anonymity, a physician of Dhaka Medical College Hospital yesterday said, "Many people already infected with the dengue virus may have been infected without falling sick. However, if they are infected with a different type of the four identical but distinct from one another virus, they may suffer deadly illness like the DHF."

Spraying of insecticide in and around the households in the capital has slowed down largely due to the deluge in many of the worst affected areas.

"We have enough larvacide and adulticide, but our spray teams are unable to reach many areas due to floodwaters," said a senior official of Dhaka City Corporation.

BSF, Indian criminals kill 297 in 4 yrs

As many as 297 Bangladeshis were killed inside Bangladesh territory by Indian armed hoodlums and Border Security Force (BSF) in the last four years, said a survey of Odhisha, a coalition for human rights.

The survey is made to public at a time when top officials of the BSF and Bangladesh Rifles (BDR) are holding a three-day conference started Tuesday in Comilla to improve law and order along the border.

The survey, which was carried out on basis of reports of national dailies, said Indian criminals and BSF violated human rights in 1,585 incidents from July 1, 2003 to July 31 this year.

The incidents including murders, abduction and snatching repeatedly took place in the north and southeastern border areas following intrusion of the BSF and Indian criminals into Bangladesh.

Most of the victims were innocent peasants killed by the BSF and criminals, the survey said.

During the same span of time, 37 people went missing, 407 people

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Man shot dead, businessman hurt in Mirpur

Unknown assailants gunned down an unidentified youth while another gang shot and wounded a businessman in the capital's Mirpur area yesterday.

Four criminals forced the unidentified youth, aged around 30, to Road No. 2, Block-D of Mirpur Section-2 amid heavy downpour at around 4:30pm and shot him in the head point blank, police said.

Police admitted the man to Dhaka Medical College Hospital where doctors declared him dead.

However, police failed to arrest any of the murderers till 7:30pm.

In the other incident, criminals shot and injured businessman Atiqul Islam Rony at around 10:30am.

A gang of three encircled Rony, 35, soon after he reached his packaging factory at West Kazipara and shot him in his left hand, an officer of Mirpur Police Station quoted a witness as saying.

He was undergoing treatment at Orthopaedic hospital, he added.

The motive behind the attack could not be known immediately.

16,000km road, 285km rly links flood wrecked

The on-going flooding is feared to have already damaged about 16,000km of national road network and 285km of railway tracks, dealing a severe blow to the economy.

Nearly 20,000 meters of bridges and culverts also have been destroyed, according to primary estimates of the Local Government Engineering and some other organisations.

The actual extent of flood damage could be ascertained once floodwaters recede completely, but a colossal fund might require to put the communication network back on functional stage, authorities feared.

The transportation of passengers and goods face great deal of danger every day in many city and rural areas as some 13,000km roads are totally damaged and 42,485km partially, says the Food and Disaster Management Department.

Initial survey shows 10,000km rural

roads, and 3,494 bridges and culverts have been totally or partially damaged.

The most affected communication systems are in Sylhet, Sunamganj, Habiganj, Moulvibazar, Jamalpur, Mymensingh, Netrokona, Kishoreganj, Sirajganj, Tangail, Manikganj, Munshiganj, Narsinghdi, Dhaka, Narayanganj, Shariatpur, Pabna, Gaibandha, Kurigram, Bogra, Naogaon, Barisal, Comilla, Chandpur and Kushtia.

The flooding, heaviest since Bangladesh's worst-ever floods in 1998, also caused vast damage to the communication system in the capital. The Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) has already found damage to 492.80km roads and 32.70km footpaths, repairing of which might cost at least Tk 50 crore. But the DCC has no budget for the unscheduled repair.

Engineers of different departments fear that total cost for repair to national communication network might be far

more than what has been allocated in the present ADP (Annual Development Program).

As the floodwaters continue to recede, the government and the donor agencies are now busy assessing damages. According to a preliminary information, the estimated cost for temporary and permanent rehabilitation of the damaged railway network alone is Tk 120 crore.

The World Bank is waiting for the government report on actual damage and the cost required for rehabilitation. The World Bank (WB), Asian Development Bank (ADB), Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) and Department of Fund for International Development (DFID) would jointly give assistance to avoid any repetition in aid to repair communication system.

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Teenage girl detained for 1yr sans trial

A 14-year-old girl held under Section 54 of the Criminal Procedure Code (CrPC) has been detained in jail without trial for more than one year.

Police arrested Shama Nishat on July 20 last year in the house of her foster mother, Rahatunnesa, on Road 6/A, Dhamondi, Dhaka, after Rahat had filed a general diary with Dhamondi Police Station accusing Nishat of trying to kill her with a boti (kitchen machete).

The next day police produced Nishat before a court that put her in jail custody.

The law dictates that if the investigation officer (IO) does not press specific charge against one arrested under Section 54, the arrestee has to be set free.

But, the teenage girl is still languishing in prison, although the IO of the case, Police Sub-inspector Abdul Mannan Munshi, has not submitted any charge-sheet despite repeated instructions of the Chief Metropolitan Magistrate's Court of Dhaka to do so.

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Aman withers in parched lands

District agriculture offices still hopeful to meet production target

Broadcast Aman plants in some districts are withering because of heat amid a drought-like situation at a time when most regions are reeling from devastating monsoon flooding.

District offices of the Department of Agriculture Extension (DAE) said farmers in Jessor, Lalmonirhat, Rangpur and Gaibandha feared crop failures because of the unfavourable weather system.

"The situation is not unusual in Bangladesh," said Arzumand Habib, deputy director of the meteorological office. "Some districts unaffected by the flooding are lacking rain. The drought-like situation has parched the land and will affect farmers like the floods."

But the monitoring section of the DAE is yet to estimate the losses caused

by the weather.

Farmers in eight upazilas in Jessor have been irrigating their farmlands with about 5,000 deep and shallow tube-wells and power pumps to scrape through the typhoon.

Putting on a brave face, the district agriculture offices said it was confident of brining 1,28,100 hectares under Aman cultivation and achieve the production target.

Fissures cover a large swathe of farmlands in the wake of the recession of floodwaters in Lalmonirhat.

Local agriculture office said Aman plants on 3,000 hectares in Aditmari, Kaliganj, Hatibandha and Patgram upazilas were damaged by the drought-like weather.

The worst affected areas are Hajiganj and Bhelabari of Aditmari upazila,

Lohakuchi, Goral and Chandrapur of Kaliganj upazila and Doikhawa of Hatibandha upazila.

After the recession of floodwaters, farmers sowed Aman seeds with high hopes investing their last resources, but the sun parched their fields with a vengeance, agriculture officials said.

The Rangpur agriculture office said rice plants in 500 hectares in the district were now drooping.

"Although farmers have been operating 120 pumps to irrigate their stony rice paddies, the district is likely to achieve 85 percent of farming target," an official said.

An official of the monitoring section of the DAE said they were yet to determine the drought loss.

"We are busy with post floods rehabilitation of farmers."

At least 14 Iraqis were killed and 26 wounded in a roadside bomb blast and fierce clashes between Iraqi police and insurgents in the main northern city of Mosul, medics and police said.

"The hospital received 12 bodies, including two women, and 26 injured, most of them civilians," said a doctor at Mosul's Medical City hospital, after the violent clashes broke out between insurgents and police.

"Earlier a man and a woman were killed when a roadside bomb exploded in the path of a US military convoy, police said.

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Oil prices hit new record

Oil prices notched up fresh record highs yesterday, shuddering world financial markets and fanning concern that consistently high prices are denting global economic growth.

Brent crude rose 35 cents to \$40.99 a barrel, its highest level since London's International Petroleum Exchange launched trading in Brent futures in 1988, before edging back to \$40.86. US crude struck \$44.30 a barrel, 15 cents up from Tuesday's settlement and the highest since oil futures were launched on the New York Mercantile Exchange in 1983.

"The oil price is of course a con-

cern," said Germany's Finance Minister Hans Eichel. "It could slow economic growth."

Oil prices have risen by more than one-third since the end of 2003 on worries that accelerating global demand has left supplies tightly stretched with little leeway for disruption. Some analysts fear that the relentless rise could take prices above \$50 a barrel, with more damaging repercussions for the global economy.

Allowing for inflation, prices are near the level hit during the 1973 oil embargo and just over half those during the oil price shock that followed the 1979 Iranian revolution.
