

Twenty20 Cup goes to Leics

Leicestershire beat holders Surrey by seven wickets with five balls to spare to win English cricket's Twenty20 Cup at Edgbaston on Saturday.

Leicestershire's Australian captain Brad Hodge guided his side to victory with an unbeaten 77 from 53 deliveries, and former England off-spinner Jeremy Snape struck the winning boundary to finish on 34 not out.

Surrey, who had never lost a Twenty20 match in the competition's two-year history, made 168 for six in their 20 overs, former England one-day batsman Alastair Brown top-scoring with 64 from 41 balls.

Surrey beat Lancashire by one run in the first semi-final earlier on Saturday and Leicestershire defeated Glamorgan by 21 runs.

Heartbreak for Chumki

Asif seeks a miracle

Bangladesh's top women sprinter Shams-un Nahar Chumki is set to miss the Olympics bus to Athens.

Chumki's dream of running at the world's biggest sporting showpiece in Greece was shattered after she was diagnosed with appendicitis on Saturday.

The 20-year-old informed that doctors have advised her to take at least two weeks' rest before they operate on her.

"I felt pain in my abdomen during training yesterday (Saturday) morning. I had the problem checked at a private hospital in Dhanmondi and the report confirmed I had appendicitis," a grim

Chumki told the Daily Star at the Bangladesh Krira Shikha Protisthan (BKSP) where the Games bound athletes are camping.

"I have notified the officials of my condition. I am not sure what their decision will be but I am certain that I will not be in a position to run even if I go," she added.

An 18-member Bangladeshi team that includes more officials than players (five to be precise; two athletes, two swimmers and one shooter) will leave Dhaka tomorrow for Athens, the birthplace of Olympics, to take part in the 28th edition of the modern Games which begins on August 13.

Not even the most patriotic of sports fans in Bangladesh expect anything from the athletes in the Olympics but for the participants, it is a life-long dream come true just to stand and compete side by side with the most famous names around the world.

April, when he replaced ill left-arm spinner Ashley Giles and saw West Indies captain Brian Lara score a world record 400 not out.

England have an unbeatable 2-0 lead in the four-Test series following two crushing wins by more than 200 runs apiece and are chasing a sixth straight Test win as well as their ninth in 10 games.

Giles has already had a major impact in the series so far with 18 wickets.

Batty's inclusion takes England's squad up to 13. He looks like being in competition with fast bowlers Simon Jones and James Anderson for a place in the line-up if the selectors stick with a policy of four specialist bowlers plus all-rounder Andrew Flintoff.

Surrey's Mark Butcher, England's regular number three batsman, has not featured in the series so far because of injury and was again omitted because of a thigh problem.

"As far as Mark Butcher is concerned, the selectors have decided that, as he ruled himself out of the Twenty20 Cup final day on

Mashrafee could be back in Oct

Bangladesh speedster Mashrafee-Bin-Mortuza is expecting to return to international cricket in October when New Zealand tour Bangladesh.

Mashrafee, who was injured during the Chittagong Test against England last year, underwent a double knee operation in Australia. But now the 20-year-old has started bowling at the BKSP high performance unit in Savar.

"I've been using short run-ups now and hopefully I believe I can make a full recovery by September. And since I'm not experiencing any problems at the moment, it's possible I'll be available for the coming home series," said the 'Narail Express' yesterday.

There was even better news for the Tigers as young fast bowler Talha Jubair was declared fit to join the Under-19 team now in England.

Talha last played in the ICC U-19 World Cup in Bangladesh in February before being ruled out due to a back injury.

Talha, due to leave Dhaka on August 18, will feature in the three one-day internationals against the English youths to be played on August 24, 26 and 27.

Naturally, the young bowler was excited at the prospect to tour England where he will be able to test his match fitness.

"It's a dream for me because conditions in England will suit my bowling. I think after recovering from injury, it would be an ideal place to tour," said the lanky seamer who has played six one-day internationals for Bangladesh and as many Tests.

"I'm not just thinking about a place in the national side. I want to utilise this opportunity to get back my rhythm."

Nafees cracks double ton

Opening batsman Nafees Iqbal smashed his first ever double hundred in a competitive match to help Bangladesh U-19 pile up a massive 535 on the opening day of a two-day tour match against Development XI on Saturday.

Nafees, who has wasted a number of good starts in the ongoing England tour, scored 266 at the Oakham School ground at Rutland as the Bangladesh youths plundered the rival attack before being booked in 99 overs.

The right-hander, who played in two one-day internationals against England during their tour of Bangladesh last summer, got fine assistance from Dhamim Ghosh (84) and Nadif Chowdhury (55).

The U-19s, who have lost the first Test, will play their second Test against England at Taunton, Somerset from tomorrow.

MSC ride on Farhad

Striker Ariful Karim Farhad slammed the second hat-trick in the Fourth Nitol-Tata National Football League as Mohammad Sporting Club marked their third leg appearance with a rousing 5-1 victory over Bangladesh Air Force (BAF) at the Khuila Stadium yesterday.

The victory also set the last year's runners-up on the winning track after their disappointing draw with Sheikh Russel Krira Chakra in the previous round in Rangpur.

The no-hoppers BAF on the other hand remained stuck on their previous collection of three points from as many

games.

On a heavy outfield caused by continuous rain, Mohammedan pushed forward early against the rank outsiders with Farhad opening the floodgate in the second minute.

The shaven headed striker stabbed the ball home after Nakib headed down a cross by Amin Rana before placing it neatly past BAF keeper Masud Rana.

There was no respite for the airmen as Mohammedan captain Jewel Rana doubled the lead in the 18th minute with a trademark header off a Manju right flank corner.

Farhad got his second goal with a spectacular volley four minutes later off a neat centre by Amin Rana.

The BAF keeper, who had a miserable day under the bar, was also responsible for the fourth goal. He did not even move as a feeble effort from midfielder Pappu rolled harmlessly into the net in the 30th minute.

The four-goal cushion allowed Mohammedan to take their foot off the gas after the break. All that was left was

to see if Farhad could complete his treble.

After squandering two sitters in the second half, man-of-the-match Farhad finally got his third goal in the 77th minute. He raced down the middle to win a ball inside the box and rounded the keeper to complete a happy hunting in the mud.

Panchgarh Brothers Union's Mantri scored the first hattrick in the qualifying round.



Smith inspires SA

Sri Lanka's spin attack, led by Muttiah Muralitharan, was thwarted as South Africa put up a determined effort and salvaged a draw in the first Test of a two-match series here on Sunday.

Muralitharan's haul of 82 wickets in 10 previous Tests at the venue stood for nothing as the off-spinner struggled to get the breakthroughs his team was looking for on a pitch that took slow turns.

South Africa, set a target of 325 in a minimum of 93 overs, scored 203-3 at close of the final day's play at the Galle International Stadium after starting the day at seven for no loss.

Jacques Kallis (52) and Jacques Rudolph (27) were the not out batsmen

directions from the International Cricket Council, proved ineffective as first Graeme Smith (74) and then Kallis batted solidly for half-centuries.

"It was surprising to see the slow turn on this pitch," said captain Marvan Atapattu.

"Murali too did not bowl very well in this match but we hope to see him back among the wickets soon."

Sri Lanka were left frustrated and even Kumar Sangakkara, who is a wicket-keeper but playing this Test as a specialist batsman, got to bowl for the first time in international cricket.
