## Big Sangakkara century

Kumar Sangakkara scored his sixth Test hundred as Sri Lanka posted 303 for three on the first day of the second Test against South Africa on Wednesday.

Sangakkara, playing as a specialist batsman in the series, was 157 not out after sharing in important partnerships with Sanath Jayasuriya (43) and Mahela

Jayawardene, a double centurion in the first Test in Galle, provided the support role for Sangakkara with 82 before he was bowled late in the day by a Makhaya Ntini inswinger, Chaminda Vaas was not out on four at the close.

Sangakkara and Jayawardene shared a record 192-run third-wicket stand for Sri Lanka against South Africa, surpassing the 168 they scored at Durban in

Both were fortunate as Jacques Kallis missed Sangakkara at slip on 57 and wicketkeeper Mark Boucher dropped Jayawardene on 16 off a thick edge from

#### Hildreth defies **junior Tigers**

An unbeaten 151 by James Hildreth put England U-19 on course for a good first innings lead shortly after lunch on Day Two of the second Test against Bangladesh at Taunton in Somerset

The home side who were overnight 33 without loss, reached 325-6 in reply to Bangladesh's 273 when this report was being filed. The lead is already 52.

Number four Hildreth added 177 runs for the sixth wicket with wicketkeeper SM Davies (71) after the young Tigers had tasted early success.

Fast bowler Shahadat Hossain Rajib sent back both openers and leftarm spinner Nadif Chowdhury took the next three as Bangladesh reduced the Englishmen to 142 for five before Hildreth and Davies' heroics.

Somerset's Hildreth, who dominated the first two sessions, had smashed 24 boundaries and one six in his strokeful 228-ball stay so far.

On the first day, 16-year-old wicketkeeper Mushfiqur Rahman top scored 88 in the Bangladesh innings with ten fours and three sixes in 147 balls. The number seven batsman also defied the rival attack during a 45-run stand for the last wicket with Shahadat.

England paceman Mark Turner captured the last five wickets for 57 to mop up the Bangladesh tail.

England lead the three-match series 1-0.

Only a month or two ago, Sanaa Abu Bkheet was running across rough sand and through rutted streets in pursuit of a dream.

The determined teenager, who will become the first woman to compete for a Palestinian team at the Olympics, possessed just one pair of running

She had no proper track to train on

Gunfire posed an ever-present danger and a temporary Israeli-

imposed ban on Palestinians aged 16 to 35 leaving the fenced-in Gaza Strip also cast a shadow of uncertainty over her preparations for the Athens Games

The road from a refugee camp to

Athens has been difficult and dangerous but now, with the dream about to come true, things are looking up. The 19-year-old has several pairs of shoes for a start. And a sponsor, who

helped facilitate a month's training on the Greek island of Kos, has also materialised. Appearing with two team mates at a

presentation in Athens on Tuesday, Abu Bkheet thanked those who had helped her battle against the odds to compete for a country which does not officially exist.

"In Gaza I trained in very different

conditions, usually running on the beach or in the streets in very bad conditions," she said, speaking

through a translator. "I know that other athletes here have had four years training for these Olympics. I have trained properly for one month and it was difficult after running on the sand to get used to the

hard surface. "It was so difficult to run on the sand by the sea, it's so soft and so deep that you can sink 10 centimetres. And it is so difficult to go from sand to the

Abu Bkheet last competed on a real track at the pan-Asian Games in Iran last February, finishing sixth, and her

best times are way off the world's best.

The world's largest luxury liner Queen Mary 2 arrived early Wed-nesday at the Athens port of Piraeus, where it will accommodate hundreds of highranking spectators of the Athens Olympics, including several heads of

around 8:30 am," said Panayiotis Skalkos, spokesman of Greece's Merchant Marine ministry. The 150,000-tonne ocean liner is part of an Olympic flotilla serving as

floating hotels for around 10,000 The Queen Mary 2 is the fifth cruise ship to arrive in Athens, Skalkos said. At least another three are expected to arrive before the Games start on

According to Games' organisers ATHOC, the Queen Mary 2 has a total 1,310 cabins, with an average daily cabin price, excluding suites, of nearly 600 euros (720 dollars). ATHOC had initially booked 30 percent of ship's cabins for Olympic officials. But on July 9, organisers turned over to the general public spare capacity on the ship left unbooked by Olympics officials at a cost of between 800 and 2,350
