Use savings of migrants to boost economy

Speakers tell workshop

The country can boost its economy by mobilising the savings of migrant workers through productive investment, said the speakers at a workshop

yesterday.

They said in stead of spending on consumer goods, the migrant savings should be invested for the greater interest of the people and the nation.

The two-day workshop on 'Strate-

gic Planning, Research and Practical Approaches on Migrant Savings and Alternative Investment' was organised by the Welfare Association of Repatriate Bangladeshi Employees in the city.

Association President Syed Saiful Haque Asif said normally the families of the migrant workers spend huge amount of money in buying goods for entertainment and other luxurious commodities instead of saving the remittance for income generating investment.

He said in many cases, a repatriate person becomes penniless after returning home and cannot do any income generating business due to lack of fund.

Saiful urged the government to utilise the wage earners' fund for the welfare of the migrant workers.

Speaking at the workshop, Bien Molina, programme coordinator of migrant savings for alternative investment of Asian Migrant Centre (AMC) presented some models for proper utilisation of migrant savings in the Philippines and other Asian countries.

He said Bangladesh can also set up such model suiting the needs of its people.

Established in 1997, the association has been conducting awareness programme among its 5,000 repatriate members in 13 upazilas across the country.

It is going to start soon migrant saving programme both at home and abroad for Bangladeshi expatriates and repatriates through joint collaboration with the AMC.

The association is also providing skill training to 135 repatriated women, mostly cheated by the fraud manpower exporters, in Gazipur and Savar. They are now earning their livelihood through sewing, embroidery and tailoring works, said Laila Sazid, women affairs secretary of the association.

Rahima Khatun, a repatriate from Bahrain, said " I was deceived by a manpower exporter and got back home. I had no skill, but I am now earning money after learning sewing work from there."

Shefali Aktar, a Kuwait-return repatriate, also expressed similar view.

DEATH OF SUST TEACHER Proper investigation demanded

Shahjalal University Teachers' Association (SUTA) and Bangladesh Mohila Parishad (BMP) yesterday demanded proper investigation of Fahmida Farah Islam Munni Murder.

An associate professor of Shahjalal University of Science and Technology (SUST), Fahmida Farah Islam died in Dhaka on May 27. Mystery shrouds her death.

At a press conference at the Jatiya Press Club, the speakers said Fahmida came to Dhaka from Sylhet with a good health and soon after her arrival she went to her husband's house. But within three hours her family was informed that she was seriously ill. Fahmida was first taken to the

ICDDR, B Hospital and from there she was shifted to Shamarita Hospital where she died at the operation theatre.

Mohila Parishad General Secretary Ayesha Khanam said from the viscera report and the activities of Motaokkal Billah (Fahmida's husband) and his business partner Mituli Mahboob, it is easy to understand that it was a murder in the name of treatment.

Sushanta Kumar Das, Johiruddin Ahmed, Dr Zafar Iqbal of Shahjala University and Hena Das, Advocate Masuda Rehana Begum of Mohila Parishad also spoke.

Fahmida's mother Hosne Ara Islam, and brother AKM Mujahidul Islam Noman were present.
