

Bashar scare for Tigers

A training ground injury to his troubled right thumb will keep Bangladesh captain Habibul Bashar out of action for at least ten days.

Bashar was struck on the thumb while batting during yesterday's nets at the Bangabandhu National Stadium. It was a similar injury to the one the Tigers skipper had suffered while playing against England in Chittagong last year.

"There is evidence of fracture in the X-ray," Bashar told The Daily Star last night after he had consulted trainer Justin Cordy with the report.

"I will continue to train with the team but I will not attend the batting or fielding sessions," Bashar said adding that there was pain and swelling in the area where he was hurt.

Cordy however termed the fracture

as of "minor" proportions and was confident that the country's number one batter will be fit in time for the ICC Champions Trophy in England next month.

"He will take ten days to recover and we might not risk playing him in Bangladesh's practice match in

Scotland prior to the Champions Trophy. But he is not a worry for the tournament," said Cordy.

All-rounder Manzarul Islam Rana complained of back pains after the squad's weight training session in the morning. Manzarul did not participate in the nets later. But Cordy, who himself had rejoined the camp on Monday after recovering from illness, said that there was nothing to be concerned about in Manzarul's case too.

Cordy has opted for a more relaxed fitness programme for the England tour compared to the tough physical workout the cricketers endured before the Asia Cup in Sri Lanka.

There were whispers too that some players were not pleased with the 'excessive' load and had blamed the over-emphasis on fitness as a reason for their lacklustre showing in the regional event.

Under-19s call the shots

Having lost the first two Tests and the series, Bangladesh U-19 cricketers hit back in the third and final Test against England when the junior Tigers shot out the home side for 185 in the first innings on the opening day at Glamorgan yesterday.

The tourists wiped out 58 of those runs at tea losing the wickets of Shahriar Nafees and Aftab Ahmed. Opener Nafees Iqbal was batting on 39 and Shamsur Rahman on 4.

England elected to bat first and lost Joe Denly for a duck when the opener was run out with just one run on board. England never recovered from that early damage as paceman Rubaiyat Haque picked two wickets to reduce England to 23-3.

Captain Alastair Cook tried to steady the innings with a 66-ball 36, but gave in to the Bangladesh spin duo -- Ashim Chowdhury and Nadif Chowdhury -- who got on top to wrap up the England essay inside 50 overs.

Ashim went on to take 3-30 from 10.1 overs while Nadif and Rubaiyat also chipped in with a couple of wickets each.

Fiery paceman Shahadat Hossain, who joined the party late, was expensive and conceded 70 runs for his two wickets.

Beijing bonanza

China is in the grip of a gold rush. Olympic fever is keeping tens of millions of Chinese awake and watching television into the early hours as their sports heroes leap to the top of the medal standings, amassing 10 golds in just four days at the Athens Games.

Colour pictures of athletes fill the newspapers, sports writers pump out fulsome biographies and interviews with medal winners and television serves up a rich diet of Olympic programming, sweeping aside popular soap operas and game shows.

Every few minutes the Chinese national anthem rings out on one of the many state-run television channels along with yet another shot of China's red flag rising above a Greek stadium.

"Due to the five-hour time difference, millions of Chinese sports fans have to sit before their televisions sometimes until day almost breaks," said the China Daily newspaper on Tuesday.

"But each gold medal Chinese athletes win comes as a prize for our loud shouts of 'come on' from thousands of miles away."

Thorpedo hits Australia

Prime Minister John Howard was quick to congratulate him:

"It's a huge honour to be the greatest Olympian in Australia ever," he said.

"It is a tremendous performance."

In a nation where sport ranks above



Bleary-eyed Australians hailed swimmer Ian Thorpe on Tuesday after he won the 200 metres freestyle in Athens to become the sports-mad nation's greatest Olympian with five gold medals.

They had set alarm clocks and drunk coffee to stay awake through the night to cheer Thorpe as he took on the cream of world swimming in what was billed as the "race of the century".

Making a weary way to work Australians were greeted with front-page photographs of Thorpe punching the air and the words "I'm Not Done Yet", an ominous warning that the Australian is already eyeing the Beijing Games in 2008.

"Thorpe wins the race of his life" and "Thorpe stands alone in history", declared the newspaper headlines.

Talk radio burst with nationalist pride and Internet chat rooms were buzzing with discussion of Thorpe's Olympic feat.

all else, Thorpe was already a national hero after his three gold medals and two silvers at the Sydney 2000 Olympics. His fifth gold, after earlier taking the

Hosts Greece grabbed their first gold medal of the Athens Olympics on Monday when Nikolaos Siranidis and Thomas Bimis won the men's three-metre synchronised diving after the Chinese pair suffered a no-dive.

The Greek duo were lying fourth going into the springboard final round when leaders Bo Peng and Kenan Wang from China failed to execute their final dive properly and the judges declared a no-dive, awarding no points.
