

DUS builds illegal kitchen at TSC

The food shop Dhaka University Snacks (DUS) is 'illegally' constructing a permanent kitchen inside the Teacher and Student Centre (TSC) premises posing a threat to its architectural heritage and environment.

Although Dhaka University (DU) does not own DUS, its proprietor apparently managed to get permission from the authorities to build the kitchen beside the TSC branch of Janata Bank. Parts of the TSC's boundary walls too have been utilised for construction work. The place was end portion of a flower garden before.

The TSC has a glorious tradition of creative works and movements against oppression and injustice. It is also a popular place to hang out

for students. Naturally, the DUS kitchen has already raised a few eyebrows.

"The authorities have not informed me about the establishment. The proprietor of DUS also sought no permission for building the kitchen," said Amir Hossain, chief engineer of DU.

"We have already issued a notice to stop construction. We are going to take more official steps in this regard," he added.

An official concerned preferring anonymity however informed that the construction work was being done with the permission from the University's estate department.

Alamgir Hossain, director of TSC meanwhile claimed that nothing illegal was being done.

"It is not a new establishment at all. The DUS is only re-constructing,

The kitchen will not change the architectural characteristics of the TSC. We have re-arranged the internal design of the centre to ease the pressure of students," said Hossain.

The director also said that the cyber centre, main kitchen of TSC cafeteria, office of the DU Journalists Association etc. were not part of the original architectural plan of the TSC.

Sources said that the construction of the DUS kitchen has received the green signal from the top authorities. Tk 1,00,000 was reportedly deposited at first. The DUS has to pay Tk 2,000 per month as rent of the kitchen.

Some DU officials alleged that DUS owner Takdir Hossain Jasim, a former Jatyatabadi Chatra Dal (JCD) leader, had gone on to establish a permanent kitchen despite only receiving permission to build a makeshift one. Jasim could not be contacted for his comments despite repeated tries on his mobile phone.

"The kitchen had existed since the establishment of DUS in 1986. A few years ago it was shut down. We are now re-launching it with the permission of the authorities," said DUS' manager Sharif.

General students have strongly condemned the construction of the kitchen.

"We cannot encourage it. It is not acceptable as the TSC will become congested. This is the heart of the campus and a favourite spot for the students. The authorities should remove the kitchen," said Abul Kalam Azad, a student of Department of Sociology.

Titas blames low revenue take on floods

Revenue collection of Titas Gas has seen a slump which officials believe is a consequence of the flood in Dhaka and its adjacent areas.

"It has not been a tendency all over Dhaka but many people living in

flood-affected areas have failed to pay our bills probably because they do not have the financial ability at the moment," said a highly placed source in Titas.

Titas has more than 10,00,000 subscribers in the city. According to sources, revenue collection

decreased by nearly 20 per cent in the low-lying areas of Dhaka.

"Revenue collection in the badly affected areas like Mughdapara, Rampura, Goran, Khilgaon, Basabo etc. have fallen well short of the expected mark," said a high official of Titas Gas.

"These are densely populated places and we have a large numbers of customers there. If we have one or two subscribers inside a one bigha area in Gulshan, there are at least 40 in Goran," he explained.

The official said in most cases, people of lower and middle-income

groups who buy gas from Titas, had to leave their homes in search of shelter during the deluge. Some tenants also left their houses without notifying the landlords.

"That is why most of the bills have remained unpaid," he said.

Titas sold gas worth Tk 240 crore to its domestic, industrial and heavy industrial customers in the month of July, according to sources. Along with current dues, Titas normally collects arrears from subscribers which at present stands at around Tk 1,000 crore.

"The current bills have not been paid entirely, let alone the arrears," said an official of Titas adding that they had targeted six per cent more revenue collection for July.

Aminur Rahman, director operations and head of the flood-monitoring cell of Titas said the company did not suffer too much during the flood.

"There have been certain damages but that did not disrupt our supply," he said.

However, Rahman added that the flood had affected a number of the 700 industrial units in Munshiganj, Narayanganj, Rupganj and Savar areas.

"We will run a check to see if there were any damages in those industries," he said.

Rahman also feared that the gas regulating and Metering Stations (RMS) that went under water might have been affected.

"We are examining them as we need to change some parts and machinery," he said.

First int'l food fair begins in Dhaka Sept 17

Agro processed food products are of international standards but have failed to reach the global market as buyers could not be attracted.

Dhaka International Food Fair-2004, organised by the Export Promotion Bureau (EPB), will be held from September 17-19 at the Sheraton Hotel.

The fair, the first of its kind in Bangladesh, will aim at promoting exports of agro-processed food products of the country.

EPB Vice-Chairman Meer Shahabuddin Mohammad hopes the fair would explore new opportunities to expand sales of this potentially fast-growing sector to the global market.

"Our food products are of international standards but failed to spread as we could not attract buyers with our items," he said.

About 50 companies, including producers and exporters, are

expected to participate in the fair.

Invitations for foreign-buyer participation have gone out to different countries through all Bangladesh missions overseas.

"Foreign missions in Dhaka and Bangladesh missions abroad are being briefed to make the fair a success," the vice-chairman said.

EPB authorities said they are receiving good response from the buyers.

"We will be able to justify standards of our agro-processed food products and be able to take necessary steps to improve quality in production," said EPB official Toufig Khan Mozilish.

The government has given agro-processed food products top priority in the export sector.

"We hope the fair will help increase worldwide export of

food products," he added.

A steering committee on the fair is working out a strategy to make the fair effective and fruitful, the EPB vice-chairman said, adding he hopes to arrange such fairs regularly depending on the response.

"Discussion sessions arranged with prospective buyers will help producers exchange views and give buyers an opportunity to measure standards of the products," he added.

Dry and processed food items like juices, jam, jelly, chanachur, pickles and chips will also be exhibited at the fair.

Bangladesh earned \$3.58 million from exports of agro-processed food products in the last fiscal year.
